

Superintendent Report

The first two months have been very successful as we have been able to keep students in school five days a week for in person learning for most of the time. As of this writing, we currently have no cases of COVID 19 in the district and have not had any for over a month. RSU 12 is still rated in the green risk level by the Maine Department of Education. We hope this will continue. Thank you to everyone who has followed our safety precautions. We have been able to prevent the spread of COVID-19 by being diligent about mask wearing and social distancing. By being diligent about following these safety precautions that are unique to preventing this particular virus, we are able to keep students in school where the best learning can happen.

I remain hopeful that we will stay in school five days a week. However, we are seeing an increase in cases in Kennebec County. The Department of Education has stated that Kennebec County is still at a green risk level, but they are watching it closely. There is a chance that Kennebec County will be moved to the yellow risk level. The risk levels are reevaluated every Friday. Everyone should all be prepared to implement our hybrid model of instruction if the DOE designates Kennebec County a yellow risk level as early as this Friday. As a reminder, our response plan for the risk levels is below. These come from our RSU 12 Reopening Plan.

PLAN A: A categorization of "green" from the Maine CDC means that all counties in RSU 12 have a very low COVID-19 risk and that in-person instruction can be considered. **RSU 12 Response:** RSU 12 students may attend in-person instruction. An *OPTION 2: Fully Remote Online Instruction* option will be offered to students/caregivers that are interested. All staff will report to buildings. Robust Safety Precautions will be in place.

PLAN B: A categorization of "yellow" from the Maine CDC means that a county in RSU 12 has an elevated risk of COVID-19 spread and that a hybrid instructional model should be considered in order to have fewer students in the building at one time.

RSU 12 Response: All RSU 12 students may be split into two groups and follow an alternating model of instruction. Group 1 - Monday, Tuesday. Group 2 - Thursday, Friday. All students may learn remotely on Wednesday. An *OPTION 2: Fully Remote Online Instruction option* will be offered to students/caregivers that are interested. All staff will report to their buildings. Robust Safety Precautions will be in place. PreK Students will attend in-person Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday.

PLAN C: A categorization of "red" means that a county in RSU 12 has a high risk of COVID-19 spread and that ending in-person instruction should not be considered.

RSU 12 Response: All RSU 12 students may be doing remote distance-learning. All staff will report to their buildings. Robust Safety Precautions will be in place.

The county-level color designations are advisory for school administrators. Those administrators may consider local conditions and make their own decisions. For example, a school administrator in one corner of a large "red" county may decide it is safe to conduct some hybrid learning if a COVID-19 surge is concentrated in a distant part of the same county from which it is unlikely that staff or students will be regularly traveling.

Curriculum and Technology Report

Several of our staff attended the Fall conference put on by the Association of Computer Technology Educators of Maine (ACTEM) this year. For the first time, the conference was entirely virtual and free to all members. The sessions were held in the afternoon and evening after the student day and provided opportunities for collaboration and learning related to hardware and software products that can be leveraged for remote learning. RSU 12 attendees shared their learning with their colleagues back at their home schools.

The Maine Department of Education (MDOE) recently announced that it has cancelled its contract with Cognia, the vendor providing the State with the federally required testing in Math and ELA for grades 3 through 8 and the third year of high school. MDOE is in the process of designing a state assessment system based on formative assessments that ideally will allow for the immediate review and use of the data to inform instruction. In years past, the data from the State assessment has not been available until months after the test is taken and in the school year after the year in which students test.
