Day of the Dead, or Día de los Muertos, is a celebration of life and death, this holiday originated from Mexico but it is now celebrated all over Latin America. They celebrate with colorful calaveras (skulls) and calacas (skeletons). This tradition starts on October 31st, Halloween, and ends November 2nd. The Aztec started the tradition; it is not a gloomy or upsetting tradition rather a celebration of lives that have passed on and Mexican families remember and honor their family. The day of the dead is important to Mexicans because it demonstrates the love and respect for their deceased. In San Andres Mixquic, a community southeast of Mexico City, Day of the Dead is the most important celebration. They care so much about Day of the Dead, that the village and their church have become famous for the tradition, they often prepare Day of the Dead two to three months before hand.

When Day of the Dead comes, people have makeup on their face representing a skull, this makeup is called sugar skull makeup. This name began when a man named Jose Guadalupe Prosada created a print of a figure that is called La Calavera Catrina which in English is translated to "The Elegant Skull". Although they are celebrated on the same day Halloween and Day of the Dead are in no way related. During Day of the Dead, it is required by law that women wear head wraps, if you look at pictures that are taken on Day of the Dead you can see the flower head band that women wear and, in some photos, you can see them holding flowers, these flowers that are being held are Marigolds. Marigolds are also called flower of the dead or cempasuchitl. Marigolds are used on Day of the Dead to help guide loved ones to come visit during this celebration by following the vibrate colors.

Day of the Dead is a very important day for Mexican families, it allows deceased loved ones to see their family though the living cannot see them. Day of the Dead for the deceased allows them to visit during the celebration but it is believed that without a photo of them they have no way of passing the barrier. For Mexicans, once you have lost a loved one you are to put up a photo of them allowing them to pass and visit.
