Midd-West School District Health and Safety Plan for Return to School

The intent of this plan is to provide Midd-West School District with a flexible, adaptable plan that allows their students, their employees, and their partners to return to school safely in the fall of 2020 for the start of the 2021 school year. The plan hopes to provide every member of our educational community the level of safety, the quality of education, and the amount of interaction that each family and individual desires. Within that, there will be families that have to make some difficult choices as to which form of instruction best meet their needs during this health crisis. The Health and Safety Plan for Return to School covers all instruction occurring in the Midd-West School District by school district personnel, outside contracted personnel, and outside personnel working as partners within our school district.

The plan creates three scenarios organized by a color system that parallels Pennsylvania's response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Although, it is similar to that state's overall plan, the Midd-West School District's level of intervention will not necessarily be based on the state's designation of the South Central Region or Snyder County. The decision to move between phases will be based on local data and health related issues particularly within the Midd-West School District. These decisions will be made by the superintendent and changes can be made for the entire district or an individual building based upon the data.

Scenario #1: PA HEALTH EMERGENCY LEVEL RED

Pandemic Description

Many cases of COVID-19 confirmed within the community and school buildings making it impossible to monitor, track, and communicate to the necessary individuals to take precautions about quarantining and the possible spread of the virus.

District Response

Entirely Remote Learning – MWSD Mobile Instructional Program

- Attendance Taken Daily
- Daily teacher(paraprofessional)/student interaction
- Grades collected, recorded, and reported
- Universal Screening Assessments Occur (MAP, LinkIt, etc.)
- Special Education Progress Monitoring Occurs

Pandemic Description

Active and known cases within our school district and community. It is becoming an issue in tracking and monitoring to the point it is in the best interest of staff and students to reduce the number of individuals in the school setting at one time.



Procedures for Suspected Case of COVID-19

- Notify all parents, staff, and students in building. There will be a special notification to families of a student with direct contact. Remind families that if any symptoms manifest to keep their kids at home and report any positive test results.
- Thorough cleaning of areas where the individual with the suspected case had been. If the suspected case involves an individual that has had contact with an individual with a confirmed case, the suspected case should be treated initially as a confirmed case until the negative test results are confirmed.
- Monitor, track, and follow up with all reports of confirmed or suspected cases. Clearly document all contacts and reports made on individual cases.

- Notify all parents, staff, and students in the building. There will be a special notification for those students and adults with direct contact. Remind families that if any symptoms appear to keep their kids at home and report any positive test results.
- Each student and staff member must be evaluated using the Midd-West School District's Direct Contact Guiding Questions to determine the approach to take with that individual regarding a recommendation to quarantine, to continue in the regular programming with monitoring from the school nurse, or to proceed with the regular program.



Return to Program with monitoring for symptoms from School Nurse for a five-day period.

Was the infected individual wearing a mask or shield? *No.*

Was the individual in direct contact wearing a mask or shield? Yes.

Was the direct contact with the infected person from more than six feet away at all times? *No.*

Was the direct contact for less than 10 consecutive minutes? Yes.

Were opportunities to share and exchange materials or resources between the two individuals limited? Yes.

Was there a significant space between the close contact and the infected individual during higher risk activities such as meals, chorus, or Phys. Ed? Yes. Quarantine at home for up to 14 days provided no symptoms are apparent. Individual may return to school upon the presentation of a negative COVID-19 Test result. Was the infected individual wearing a mask or shield? No.

Was the individual in direct contact wearing a mask or shield? No.

Was the direct contact with the infected person from more than six feet away at all times? *No.*

Was the direct contact for less than **10** consecutive minutes? *No.*

Were opportunities to share and exchange materials or resources between the two individuals limited? No.

Was there a significant space between the close contact and the infected individual during higher risk activities such as meals, chorus, or Phys. Ed? No.

Ultimately, the presence of symptoms takes priority over the questionnaire. If symptoms exist, the parents and child should quarantine for up to 14 days. Additionally, the parents are highly encouraged to take the child for testing and report the results of that testing to the school district. A negative test would allow for an immediate return. Students should remain on a virtual learning platform for 14 days in the event of a positive test assuming there a no longer any of the associated symptoms. If symptoms remain past the 14-day period, please consult a physician for a note about returning to school. Returning students will be screened for a three consecutive day period by the school nurse for signs of a fever.

- Consider not using that classroom area or space for three days and then providing a thorough cleaning where feasible. If not feasible, classroom must be thoroughly cleaned before reuse when there has been a confirmed case.
- If there are multiple confirmed cases in a building, that building immediately moves into the yellow phase of instructional plans. If there are more than 10 cases within a building that appear to have no direct connection through contact tracing that building should go to the red phase of applying instruction virtually.



Attestation Ensuring Implementation of Mitigation Efforts

Whereas, the commonwealth is experiencing its highest daily case counts since the beginning of the 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, resulting in increased hospitalizations, nearly 10,000 deaths, and heightened risk to the most vulnerable Pennsylvanians;

Whereas, the Wolf Administration has identified new mitigation efforts, including an attestation process for public school entities that elect to continue in-person instruction for students in counties designated as exhibiting "Substantial" transmission of COVID-19 for two or more consecutive weeks based on a disease incidence rate of 100 or more cases per 100,000 residents and/or a polymerase chain reaction (PCR) percent positivity rate of 10 percent or greater;

Whereas, as of November 23, 2020, 59 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties met one or both of these standards;

Whereas, Pennsylvania recommends that school entities in counties with Substantial disease transmission transition to remote-only instructional models;

Whereas, as of November 20, 2020, many public school entities have exercised their local discretion to continue in-person instruction for all or some students;

Whereas, the resurgence of COVID-19 across the nation, region, and commonwealth requires more consistent and intensive implementation of disease mitigation efforts;

Whereas, these mitigation efforts include an attestation process for any public school entity (a "public school entity" is defined as a school district, intermediate unit, charter school, cyber charter school, or a career and technical education center) that elects to continue in-person instruction as of November 30, 2020 while the county in which it is located is under a Substantial disease transmission designation for at least two consecutive weeks; and

Whereas, this attestation process supplements and does not supplant existing public health guidance issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Health and the Pennsylvania Department of Education;

AND NOW, THEREFORE, the president/chair of the school entity's governing board and chief school administrator, in accordance with the Order of the Secretary of Health dated November 24, 2020, entitled Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health Directing Public School Entities in Counties with Substantial Community Transmission to Attest to Health and Safety Protocols, attest to one of the following (SELECT ONE OPTION):

 (\bullet)

All or some of the students within the public school entity are currently receiving in-person instruction and:

1. We have read the <u>Updated Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health</u> <u>Requiring Universal Face Coverings</u>, effective November 18, 2020, including necessary exceptions and <u>associated guidance</u>, and affirm the public school entity is complying and will continue to comply with and enforce the Updated Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health Requiring Universal Face Coverings, including necessary exceptions and associated guidance; and

 We have read and agree to follow the Recommendations for Pre-K to 12 Schools Following Identification of a Case(s) of COVID-19, when cases of COVID-19 occur within the public school entity.

OR

The public school entity has transitioned to a fully remote learning model and will continue to use a fully remote learning model until the county (or counties) in which the public school entity is located is no longer experiencing Substantial disease transmission for two consecutive weeks.

*** A public school entity in a county with Substantial level of disease transmission that is currently providing a fully remote learning model and that elects to transfer to in-person instruction must resubmit this attestation prior to providing in-person instruction.
