I am honored to serve the Orangeville School District as your new superintendent. I am excited to begin a new school year and meet the students, staff and families of Orangeville. It has been wonderful to meet so many community members already and the support for the school has been amazing. Whether it be the support of churches, Lions Club, or the Orangeville Education Foundation, I can see the Bronco Pride wherever I go which is absolutely wonderful. Some of you may remember my husband, Aaron, and I from boys' basketball games years ago. Aaron coached the Varsity Boys Basketball team for a few years back in the early 2000s and loved every minute of it.

I grew up in Northwest Illinois with both of my parents originally from Galena, Illinois. I first attended grade school in Sycamore, Illinois and then later moved to Mount Carroll, Illinois where my late father, Wayne Greene, started teaching Industrial Arts and mathematics after serving in the Vietnam War. After graduating from Mount Carroll High School, I attended Illinois State University and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Education with a double major in Community Health Education and Health Education and a minor in Biology Education. At ISU, I served as the President of Eta Sigma Gamma Health Science Honorary Society and served as an undergraduate teaching assistant. I continued my education by completing my second Bachelor's degree from Illinois State University in Community Health Education and received the Distinguished Service Student of the Year at Illinois State University.

After college, I started teaching 7th grade science at Freeport Jr. High School in Freeport, IL. During my tenure at Freeport School District \#145, I taught students of varying abilities in science and English Language Arts, including the High Academic Potential Program (HAPP) and Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID). I also served as a member of the K-12 district-wide health curriculum, student council advisor, basketball cheerleading coach, and assistant play director at Freeport Jr. High.

In August of 2000, I earned my Master of Science in Education degree in Educational Psychology from Northern Illinois University. I then began teaching graduate and undergraduate classes at Northern Illinois University in the Department of Leadership, Educational Psychology, and Educational Foundations for elementary and secondary educators. In August of 2004, I earned my second Master's Degree in Educational Administration and began NIU doctoral work at the Illinois Math and Science Academy in Aurora, IL. In 2007, I presented my published research at the American Education Research Association (AERA) in Chicago, IL on "Self-Determination and Middle School Students' Perceptions of Teaching Practices in Problem-Based Learning."

Beginning in 2006, I began my administrative career at West Carroll High School as an assistant principal. In 2008, I was promoted to principal at West Carroll Middle School. In 2010, I was named the Illinois Principals Association Middle School Principal of the Year for the Northwest Region. I have served as an Executive Board Member for the Illinois Principals Association for ten years while I was a


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building principal from 2008-2018. On the IPA Northwest Executive Board, I served as a secretary, membership chair, and legislative chair. I am certified as an ISBE Gifted Trainer and I have served as the co-curriculum director for the K-12 gifted education curriculum at the Regional Office of Education \#8.

In May 2016, I completed my Educational Specialist (Ed.S.) degree at Western Illinois University. I obtained my Illinois State Board of Education Superintendent License and completed all three of my graduate degrees with a 4.0/4.0 G.P.A. As a member of the Illinois Association of School Superintendents (IASA), I served five years as the Superintendent of the West Carroll School District serving Mt. Carroll, Savanna and Thomson communities and serving as a member of International Rotary for the past fifteen years in Carroll County. I continue to work collaboratively with the region superintendents in professional development and programming as the past Chair of the Northwest Special Education Cooperative and the Career Technical Education (CTE) Board of Directors in JoDaviess-Carroll Counties. I also served on the Carroll County Preschool Board for five years. In August of 2022, I became a member of the PEO Sisterhood where women celebrate the accomplishments of other women.

Outside of my career, I enjoy being a mother of three college-aged children, Mariah, Brady and Marissa Katzenberger and the family's favorite chocolate lab, Wrigley. Mariah graduated from the University of Wisconsin- Green Bay as a student-athlete in 2015 where she majored in Biology and played Division I soccer at Green Bay all four years. I always wanted to work in education, but found myself in the corporate world, working as a commercial lines insurance underwriter before finally getting back into education. I've been working in education for almost 15 years and this is my 7th year as a classroom teacher. I absolutely LOVE teaching and am so glad to be here!

Hello, Orangeville families I hope you are having a wonderful summer and have gotten some much needed relaxation. As school time comes around again I would like to touch base on a few things. If your student takes medication here at school we need new doctors' orders every year for these medicines, this includes, epi-pens and inhalers as well as prescription medications. If your student is in $6^{\text {th }}$ grade and above they may carry their inhalers but they must have a doctor's order for it on file, these can be found on the website under medical information. Over the counter medications must be stored in the office and have a written consent form filled out, you must supply this medication and fill out a form for each individual one. Any medication that was left over from last year was discarded per district rules, emails and phone calls were sent out at the end of the school year about pickups for leftover meds. Any student entering preschool (the first year), Kindergarten, $6^{\text {th }}$ grade and $9^{\text {th }}$ grade or new to the district must have a physical on file at the school, this must be a state physical not a sports one. Kindergarten, $2^{\text {nd }}$ grade, $6^{\text {th }}$ grade and $9^{\text {th }}$ grade or new to the district need dental exams for this upcoming year. Eye exams for all students with IEPs, Kindergarten and $2^{\text {nd }}$ grade or new to the district must be turned for this upcoming school year. If anyone has any questions, please feel free to give me a call. I hope everyone has a great rest of the summer and I look forward to seeing everyone back at the end of this month.

There have been several "speed bumps" along the way, and there will probably be some bugs to work out even once it is live. So I'm asking for patience as you start using this system. Please feel free to reach out to myself or Miss Tonya with questions and we will do our best to help you.

Otherwise, I don't have much to put in this newsletter except pleading that if you are willing, please install the Box Tops for Education app and use it to scan your receipts when you purchase Box Tops branded items. The "clips" we all knew and loved growing up have all expired and no longer appear on packaging, so the only way we can earn Box Tops is by scanning our receipts. Three great things going on right now with Box Tops are:


First is the Cash for You, Cash for Your School sweepstakes. This began June $1^{\text {st }}$, and runs through November $30^{\text {th }}$, and when you scan a receipt with Box Tops items, you are entered into a sweepstakes to win $\$ 1,000$ for yourself and the school.
