I'm thankful for my family because they have provided me with food, shelter, and clothes. They are always there when I need them, They are kind and supportive.


Friends

400 Year Anniversary

What: Mayflower Compact

Who: The Pilgrims

When: November 11, 1620 (Julian Calendar), November 21, 1620

(Gregorian Calendar)

Where: Plimoth Plantation, Plymouth Massachusetts

Why: Christian

The Mayflower Compact...Did you realize that this is the 400th year with all of the rest of the turmoil going on across the nation? You probably didn't.

We're linking all of these sources for you to read on the actual websites, but in a nutshell, when you research the history of the Mayflower ship and the Mayflower Compact, you will find that the Mayflower was a couple months late in leaving Europe. They actually were intending to set foot in the Virginia Colony but winds and storms changed their course and path due to their late departure. When they began to go further south upon their arrival at Cape Cod, they stopped and turned around to go back to Cape Cod because they felt the Lord speaking to them to stay in the Cape Cod area instead of settling in the Virginia Colony. So, they listened to God and found themselves on the original land of the Wampanoag tribe where the band of the Patuxet of the Wampanoag had lived. The Wampanoag had been struck by a virus or plague and succumbed to it. Tisquantum (Squanto) had arrived back at his homeland prior to the arrival of the Pilgrims after he had been kidnapped twice during the previous 15 years and discovered that he was the sole survivor of his people. During his capture by King George Weymouth, he and 4 others were taken to England and taught English so they could act as interpreters and answer questions to the English explorers about the New World. After 9 years, Captain John Smith took Squanto back to New England. He

was quickly kidnapped again and taken to Spain and intended for slavery but he escaped to England living in the home of a wealthy merchant in London. (Can you imagine the things that Squanto was exposed to during his life on two continents as a potential slave, interpreter, and living the lifestyle of the rich and famous)? Arrangements were made for Squanto to sail home with Captain Dermer. When he got back home, he discovered that his entire village had been devastated by a plague. Samoset, also kidnapped by the English told Squanto about the Pilgrims in his home

Samoset had discovered the Pilgrims (actually a term used to identify the Mayflower occupants and settlers about 200 years **after** the colony was established). Samoset had walked into a common area of the Pilgrims and stood and looked at them for quite a long time before saying "Welcome". Startled that a Native knew English, they finally responded with "Welcome". Squanto asked them if they had any beer. They were astounded. They told him that they were out of beer but offered him brandy, biscuits, pudding, and roast duck. Squanto said that he educated the Pilgrims on the Pawtuxet band of the Wampanoag and then he told Squanto, "These families are kind and generous and treated me with respect. But they probably won't live on your land for long because they have very little food with them and only seeds to plant wheat and barley." Upon hearing this, Squanto wanted to meet the Pilgrims and set out to make sure he met and educated them on how to live off the land. And the rest, as they say, is history. Well, not quite yet anyway.

Below is a copy of the Compact. We hope you'll take the time to read through all of it. At that time, there were no rules for spelling so the people spelled phonetically and they did not necessarily spell the same word the same way each time they wrote it. Evidently, there were no such things as a run-on sentence for Mrs. Krows to correct either. Ha! A passenger list is also included in the historical document itself.

Historic Documents

The Mayflower Compact

In the name of God, Amen. We, whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord, King James, by the grace of God, of Great Britaine, France and Ireland king, defender of the faith, etc. having undertaken, for the glory of God, and advancement of the Christian faith, and honour of our king and country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the Northern parts of Virginia, doe by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one of another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politick, for our better ordering and preservation, and furtherance of the ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof to enacte, constitute, and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions and offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the Colonie unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names at Cape-Cod the 11. of November, in the year of the raigne of our sovereign lord, King James, of England, France and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fiftie-fourth. Anno Dom. 1620.

How ironic that on the 400th anniversary of such a great day in the history of our country that many cities and states are trying to tell the people of the nation that the citizens of their cities and states can't celebrate Thanksgiving with their extended family and friends. Is this the tyranny that our Founding Fathers warned us about?

The Mayflower Compact is especially important in our country's history because it is **one** of the documents that our founding fathers used to write our Constitution which we so dearly hold close to us.


