

- the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership that will help children achieve the state's high standards












Parents Right to Know

Elementary and Secondary Education Act requires all LEAs to notify parents of *all* children in *all* Title I schools that they have the right to request and receive timely information on the professional qualifications of their children's classroom teacher(s).









- Parent meetings, conferences, school events
- Communication through phone calls, email, Remind, newsletters, website
- Sharing educational resources such as websites and strategies to reinforce skills at home



- PTO and classroom/school-wide volunteering
- Parental input- Title 1 annual meetings, surveys
