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GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS


Language Arts (4 years)	20 Credits

Science (4 years to include Biology)	20 Credits
Social Studies (3 years* to include US History I, US History II, World Studies)	15 Credits
World Language (3 year)	15 Credits
Visual & Performing Arts (1 year)	5 Credits
Business & Career Technical Education (4 years)	20 Credits
Personal Financial Literacy (1 semester)	2.5 Credits
Additional Elective Credits	2.5 - 20 Credits

- Selection Level of rigor (Honors or AP) in:
 - History
 - Biology
- Select:
 - World Language (top 2 choices)
 - <u>either</u> 1 full year elective course OR 2 semester elective courses.
 - And "alternate courses"



PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

- Strength of Schedule
 - Make strong selections with your classes
 - Pay attention to which electives you choose
- Stay competitive *especially with certain majors in college*
- Register to take your SAT or ACT in the Fall or Spring of your Junior Year
 - www.collegeboard.org (SAT test)
 - www.act.org (ACT test)
 - You may be eligible to take the SAT or ACT for free if you qualify for free or reduced lunch.
 - Most schools are now test optional and are using scores for scholarship purposes/entrance requirements for more competitive majors.
- Monitor grades through Genesis to ensure you are on track academically.

PLANNING (CON'T)

Post Secondary Options:

- 2 or 4-year college
- Trade/Vocational School
- Military
- Workforce

College Process:

- Plan college visit / tour virtually or in person.
- Narrow down colleges and organize deadlines by return to school in September.
- Utilize Naviance to explore career options and the college application process.
- Familiarize yourself with the Common Application (universal college application used by most 4 year colleges) www.commonapp.org

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

- Complete application at <u>www.studentaid.gov</u> beginning October 1st of Senior Year.
- Parent / Student workshops at school in the Fall to be announced.
