Title I, Part A Annual Meeting

- ► All schools receiving Title I, Part A funds are required to convene a Title I, Part A annual parent meeting. TEA requires at least two Annual Meetings on different days and at different times.
 - o to inform parents and families of their school's participation
 - to explain the requirements of the Title I, Part A program
 - to explain the right of parents to be involved
- ▶ Information can be found in Section 1116 (c) ESSA Section 1116 (c)

Title I, Part A Program

- Royal JH is participating in Title I, Part A (schoolwide or targeted assistance) –this program is intended to improve student academic achievement
- Quaify based on free and reduced lunch
- Parents are invited to be involved in the school's programs.
 - ► Example of Ways to Participate: volunteer, participate in decisions relating to the education of their children, assist in the review and revision of policy, compact, and Title I plan, serve on parent advisory board, etc.



The Title I Plan addresses how to use Title I, Part A funds within the school district. Typically, in Texas, requirements of the Title I Plan are incorporated into the District Improvement Plan (DIP) and the Campus Improvement Plan (CIP).

The Plan includes:

- ► High-quality student academic assessments
- ➤ Supplemental services to assist struggling students
- Coordination and integration of federal funds and programs
- Strategies to implement effective parent and family engagement
- ► Title I, Part A parents have the right to be involved in the development of this plan

Policy and Compact

- ► The role of the school is to provide the written parent and family engagement policy and school-parent compact.
- ► The role of parents is to help develop, review, and update these documents: the policy and compact as well as the Title I plan (which is usually included within the District Improvement Plan, DIP, and the Campus Improvement Plan, CIP)

- ► How the school will implement the parent and family engagement program. The program includes the following parts:
 - ► Convene an annual meeting
 - ▶ Provide a flexible number of meetings
 - ▶ Involve parents in an organized, ongoing, and timely way, in the planning, review, evaluation, and improvement of the parent and family engagement policy and program
 - ▶ Provide timely information about parent and family engagement activities
 - ▶ Provide information to parents about curriculum and assessment
 - ► If requested, provide additional meetings with parents to discuss decisions for the education of their child

The school-parent compact is a written agreement...

- That describes how parents and families, school staff, and students share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement
- That addresses high-quality curriculum and instruction to meet State academic standards
- The ways in which parents will support their child's learning
- That stresses the importance of frequent communication between school and home, and the value of parent-teacher conferences.
- Affirms the importance of parents and families in decisions relating to the education of their children
- Title I, Part A parents have the right to be involved in the development of the schoolparent compact

Reservation of Funds, 1% Set -Aside

▶ Any local education area (LEA) with a Title I, Part A allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by statute to set-aside at least 1% of its Title I, Part A allocation for parent and family engagement.



Parents Right-To-Know

- At the beginning of each school year, a local educational agency that receives funds, shall notify parents of each student that they may request information regarding the professional qualifications of the student's classroom teacher(s) including (at minimum):
 - ► If the teacher has met State qualifications and licensing for the grade level/subject area
 - ► If the teacher is under an emergency or other provisional status that has been waived
 - ▶ If the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and their qualifications

Additional Information Schools Shall Provide

- ► Information on the level of achievement and academic growth of the student on State academic assessments.
- ➤ Timely notice that the student has been assigned, or has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who does not meet applicable State certification requirements at the grade level and subject area in which the teacher has been assigned,

Evaluation, usually in the spring

Annually evaluate the content and effectiveness of the parent and family engagement policy and program (usually in the spring).

Identify...

- Barriers to participation in parent engagement
- The needs of parents to assist with the learning of their children
- Strategies to support successful school-family interactions

Data and input might include...

- Parent questionnaires and surveys
- Focus groups or other face-to-face meetings
- Parent advisory committee input
- Provide electronic evaluation tools, if available

Report findings to parents and families and use those results to revise the parental involvement policy and school-parent compact

PARENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT




Student Benefits

- ▶ Better attendance
- ► Fewer placements in special education
- More positive attitudes and better behavior
- Higher graduation rates
- Greater enrollment in postsecondary education

Parent and Family Benefits

- More confident in the school
- Increased confidence in their parenting skills
- Creates a home environment that encourages learning
- ► Encourages parents to advance their own education and skills in the workplace
