For the first time in almost twenty years, a diocesan priest is a regular presence at St. Mary's High School. Ordained this past June, Fr. Brian Roeseler is the Parochial Vicar at Divine Redeemer parish. With the support of Bishop Michael Sheridan and DR pastor Jim Klein, he was also asked to devote some of his time to St. Mary's High School.

"Young people don't get to know priests as people," said Msgr. Don Dunn. "The blessing of having Fr. Brian on campus is that the

students will get to know him as a person and not just someone who says Mass."

SMHS Theology Department Chairman Michael Dillon agrees, "Aside from schools that are run by religious orders, most Catholic schools don't have faculty members who have chosen a religious vocation as a brother, sister, or priest. Seeing


seminary sent him to St. Louis University where he graduated with a degree in Philosophy and a Business Certificate. After that he continued his studies at Kenrick.

Fr. Brian is glad to be at SMHS. "I told [the Bishop] before I was ordained that I would love to help out at St. Mary's. When he and the Vicar General asked me to spend some of my time at

SMHS, I was extremely excited. I want students to see how much I love being a priest, and yet still enjoy doing normal things," Father Brian said.

Fr. Brian first thought about a vocation as a priest when he was in fourth grade at Queen of All Saints, his parish elementary

school. But it was during his first years of high school that the call became stronger. Then one day he answered a phone call that turned out to be a wrong number. The person on the other end was calling to ask another young man to check out the seminary. Fr. Brian

decided that perhaps he should inquiry about the seminary. He did, and it was the start of his journey to becoming a priest.

Dillon sees Fr Brian's contribution to the school as multi-faceted. "He serves a very obvious sacramental need. He will celebrate a majority of our masses," Dillon explained. That is an enormous help to Dillon, who in addition to his teaching and department chair duties, schedules already over-scheduled diocesan priests for school Masses. "Father Brian has also enabled us to schedule Thursday morning Mass, and he makes himself available at certain times for confessions," Dillon said.

"I appreciate his willingness to collaborate without a sense of trying to impose an agenda," he added. "He also relates well with students and has already attended many athletic events.

Jelinek Completes Journey

SMHS Theology Instructor Tena Jelinek completed her fiveyear quest this fall when she received her Master of Arts degree in Religious Studies from Regis University. Her professors at Regis were so impressed with her dissertation, "The Wisdom of Awe and Wonder Involving Religious Imagination for High School

Students," they placed it in the Dayton, Ohio, library data base.

It has not been an easy journey for Jelinek. Last year she was diagnosed with breast cancer and underwent surgery and chemotherapy. Throughout her treatment,

She especially enjoys watching students discover a whole new culture and all the history it takes to understand scripture, especially the Old Testament." Jelinek feels she also benefits from teaching. "I've grown so much in my faith and spirituality during my time as a youth minister and teacher."

Nine Pirates Inducted Into St. 1

INDUCTEES' FEATS SPAN SIX DECADES *Pirate Pride*—a phrase coined by Fr. Rawley Myers—as well as tradition, memories, honor, and gratitude filled St. Mary's gym on November 4, 2011, when the SMHS Athletic Hall of Fame inaugural class was inducted.

"It's the people—the teachers and coaches. We go out into the world to do what you taught us to do: be successful," said Inductee **Robert Steklein '59.** "I'm most proud of being a part of this St. Mary's family." Steklein is retired from a coaching and teaching career.

Kathy Dowling Cunha '87, who lives in Boston and works in financial services, echoed Steklein's thoughts about her alma mater and added," "some of my high school teammates are still my best friends."

KaityIn Burkett '06 agreed, too. "The St. Mary's community shaped the person I am today," she said in her acceptance remarks. "I'm grateful to call SMHS my home."

After graduating from St. Mary's Cunha ran track and played volleyball at Harvard. Burkett played volleyball at the University of Colorado at Boulder. She was coached by **Liz Kritza '95**, CU's head volleyball coach. She is now in graduate school at UCCS for a Masters degree in education.

Larry Ash '50 attended Notre Dame on a football scholarship and died in a Navy plane crash in 1956. He was remembered by his brother **Ken Ash '55** who accepted his award.

Henry "Butch" Pniak '59 was recognized for his feats on the football field. SMHS Athletic Director Ed Latimer, master of ceremonies for the induction, recalled that *The Gazette* called Butch Pniak's senior season "one of the finest years a high school athlete had around here." Pniak became an accomplished artist, but he was most proud of The Bay Street Boxers, an organization he founded to help at-risk high school boys. Pniak died in 1997. His daughter accepted his hall of fame award.

John O'Connell '63, who lives in Albuquerque, NM, was unable to attend the ceremony due to health concerns. His award was accepted by his classmate **Mickey Elliot '63.** O'Connell's skill on the basketball court made him the most decorated St. Mary's basketball player.


Bob Otto, the only coach in the inaugural class, was lauded with the words of former player **David Grenardo '95.** "He told us that our priorities should be, after God and family, first school, then sports, and last social life. If we strayed from that, things would go wrong."

Major Zach Ziron USAF '96 also remembers Coach Otto with respect and admiration. "He made a colossal impact on hundreds of student athletes. Mr. Otto was instrumental in students' character development—instilling the ideal of sustained excellence through discipline and hard work," Ziron said.

Father Rawley Myers was an ardent Pirate fan. His prayers with the football team, presence on the sidelines, and spiritual contributions made him a beloved St. Mary's figure. Fr. Myers passed away in 2009. His hall of fame award was accepted by his niece Jane Myers Bloise '74.

Long a dream of Athletic Director Latimer, the Hall of Fame honors Pirate athletes for their extraordinary achievements. They will be memorialized with plaques on the walls of the gymnasium.

"If only we had our own home field,"

was the lament of SMHS Pirates for decades. Football and soccer teams practiced in parks or borrowed fields or anyplace with enough grass and dirt. Every coach dreamed of playing at a real home field. Five years ago those dreams came true with the dedication of Grace Center on land donated by LeRoy Landhuis. For the first time the St. Mary's homecoming game was actually played at home.

"The Grace Center for Athletics and Community Service has proven to be a tremendous benefit to St. Mary's High School and the Colorado Springs community as a whole during its first five years,"

said Matt Walter, SMHS Director of Development and Alumni Relations.

It was Landhuis' wish that Grace Center, named for his mother Grace, would be a place many athletic groups could use, and it has been. His vision that it be used for nonprofit organizations as well as community and school groups has been fulfilled.

"It's busy almost every day," said Grace Center Manager Jim Cristelli. "Whether it has been SMHS sports teams, community youth programs, or local non-profits such as the American Cancer Society, the Grace Center has provided a much-needed venue for the

good work that these organizations provide. We are especially grateful on this anniversary for the generosity of the individuals, corporations and foundation who helped make the complex a reality five years ago and are looking forward to the next five years with equal enthusiasm," Walter said.





SMHS Art Students Paint Stations of the Cross

Last spring during Lent, SMHS Art Instructor Karen Simkiss, gave her Art II class an unusual assignment that challenged and inspired them. Each of the fourteen students looked at a 2" X 3" realistic painting of one of the fourteen stations. They read the story of the stations and discussed the way the mood changes with each station. Then Simkiss asked the students to paint one station. However, she instructed them for their first portion of the project, "Your pictures are not to be realistic but rather

non-objective. In other words, paint the emotions and feelings you have about that station."

After sharing their first pictures, the class discussed them and prepared for the final part of the project. They chose a color palette—brown for the cross, gold leaf for Jesus, purple, blue, green, maroon, white, black. The results are fourteen colorful interpretative pictures of the Stations of the Cross that represent the emotions and feelings each station evoked in the artist.

It was a deeply meaningful experience for the students. "While painting [my station], I had a feeling of sadness mixed with a sense of love," said Laina Salani '13.

Students liked sharing their own personal insight while keeping a central theme. "[I liked that] my art, school, and faith were combined with my classmates," Megan Harder '14 said of the collaborative effort.

Simkiss didn't know when she began the project how much it would inspire the class, but is extremely pleased with the results. "Each painting is a very personal expression of faith," she said. "The class achieved something together

they would not have been able to do individually. They are justly proud of what they did."

Simkiss is pursuing funding to frame the fourteen stations and the resurrection so they may be hung on campus in St. Leo's Chapel.

SMHS Adds Academic Support Center

At St. Mary's High School providing an environment in which every student can be successful is a goal of the administration, faculty, and staff. Recognizing the need some students have for additional help so they may meet the school's high academic expectations, St. Mary's added an academic support center this year.

Academic Support Center Instructor Mike Maiurro sees a variety of student needs. "Some students lack

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organization, some lack focus, some have bad study habits, and some have not yet developed self-responsibility," Maiurro said.

Maiurro works individually with each of the more than thirty students who are in the ASC for one class period three days each week.

Students receive weekly progress reports from their teachers and confer with Maiurro, noting if grades have gone up, remained the same, or fallen. Reasons for changes are discussed.

"We're trying to model what kids need to do when they get to college to succeed. If they can learn here how to ask an instructor for help if they're struggling, how organize their time, how to study efficiently, and how to get assignments turned in on time, their chances of succeeding in high school and college is much greater."

"I get my work done without distractions and I can work at my own pace," said Dennis, a junior. "My grades have improved."

"Mr. Moe [Maiurro] has helped me with my study notes and grades," another student commented.

"The Academic Support Center has exceeded our expectations," said

SMHS Counselor Pat Davis. "We have students in all four grade levels enrolled in the program, and they are finding success in organizational skills and time management."

Davis and Maiurro agree that freshmen, whose study habits are not yet firmly established, seem to benefit the most. "Freshmen, as they adjust to the new pressures and demands of St. Mary's rigorous curriculum and extracurricular activities, are getting support in managing the workload," Davis stated.

First quarter grades were encouraging. "We have fewer low grades," Davis said. "I think the ASC is doing what we had hoped it would. She gives much of the credit for the success of the ASC to Maiurro. "We were fortunate to find just the right person. He's the perfect mix of coach, teacher, and mentor."
