he class of 2016 graduated on May 16, ready to embark on the next chapter of their journey. Two 2016 graduates will enter one of our U.S. military academies this summer, while two others will attend college on ROTC scholarships. Kaila Baca will enter the U.S. Air Force Academy and Jimmy Velten will begin the U.S. Navel Academy (Velten also received an appointment to the U.S. Air Force Academy). Grady Gosselin received an appointment to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, but chose instead to attend Gonzanga on an Army ROTC scholarship. Nick Baldwin will attend the University of Portland on an Air Force ROTC scholarship.

Three graduates signed on to participate in college athletics. This spring Dylan Tait and Ryan Englert committed to play football at Colorado Mesa and Andrew Maal committed to run for the University of Dallas. And many graduates will attend college on full ride scholarships.

Sam Pribyl was accepted into and awarded a scholarship to study film at Loyola Marymount University, one of the top three schools in the country for film that has a 12 percent acceptance rate for the School of Film.

In his homily at baccalaureate Mass, Bishop Michael Sheridan emphasized the role of faith in the lives of the graduates.

and through the Holy Spirit empowers our lives."

"I failed to accomplish my dream, but if I had to do it all again, I wouldn't change a thing," Chilton said. "Don't be afraid to change. Have dreams and pursue those dreams but know that sometimes dreams change and that's OK. Do your best in whatever you're doing. As a Christian it's your duty to do that."

Valedictorian Maggie Hartman said she learned so much on the class of 2016's journey to graduation. And through the highs and lows of high school she learned about the power of prayer.

"I believe everyone here has potential. Everyone has excellence that wants to be achieved, and has already started to be achieved," she said. "St. Mary's has helped us achieve excellence. Now it is up to us develop it."



Pirate Family Gathers for Gala to Support, Celebrate St. Mary's

the St. Mary's High School family from getting out to support the school at its Annual Gala on April 16. The snow started early that morning, piling up on lawns and grassy areas but leaving the roads clear enough for the party to go on. This year's Gala theme was 130 Years of St. Mary's, celebrating the school's lasting legacy.

Colorado Springs Mayor John Suthers '70, spoke to those gathered about the importance of Catholic education, and specifically St. Mary's role in the local community. Colorado Springs, Suthers said, is a great city, and every great city needs the citizens that Catholic education shapes.

"St. Mary's has played an incredibly important role in the history of Colorado Springs," Suthers said. "For the city's first 75 years, there were only three high schools in town—Colorado Springs, which is now Palmer, Cheyenne Mountain, and St. Mary's. St. Mary's has always produced good citizens."

Suthers said the foundation he received at St. Mary's has been tremendously valuable to him in the decision-making roles he has held, including mayor and Colorado Attorney General. He said his faith and his St. Mary's education helped him develop the values that have led to good decisions throughout his life and career.

"Given the cultural shifts we have seen in our country, religious education is more important than ever," Suthers said. "That's why our Catholic grade schools and St. Mary's are so needed in our community. When we begin teaching our children habits of the heart early on, these become a matter of reflection. They learn early to think about how to conduct their lives."

The Gala included all of the traditions that attendees have come to look forward to. The

night began with a silent auction and dinner. That was followed by the Dessert Dash, a live auction, and the Gift from the Heart special appeal. Before the Gift from the Heart, attendees heard four St. Mary's seniors—Kaila Baca, Ben Stockelman, Kathleen Resman, and Jimmy Velten—talk about what their Pirate experience has meant to them.

All four said that the faith aspect of St. Mary's is something they have enjoyed and cherished. Velten, who had attended a public charter school before starting St. Mary's as a freshman, said that being able begin and end each day with prayer is a special part of St. Mary's for him. Baca, who had also attended public school, agreed that the Catholic passion of St. Mary's sets it apart.

"Nothing compares with what you learn in theology," she said. "St. Mary's is a really special community—to able to come together with other Catholics and have relationships based on shared values." And while the students noted that it would be nice to have more updated facilities and additional extra curricular activities, such as choir and more drama, they said that the opportunities they've had to pursue interests in multiple sports and to learn about caring for others through community service adds even more value to their St. Mary's education.

After hearing from the students, Board Vice Chairman Steve Bodnar explained that the 2016 Gifts from the Heart special appeal was going to support exactly those things that the students mentioned they'd like to have more.

"We ask our teachers to do more and more with less and less," Bodnar said. "And despite that our students excel. We say no too often; with this special appeal we can say yes."

This year's Gala raised more than \$125,000, which will help St. Mary's continue its mission of equipping the next generation in their faith and learning. ●
