Connected to the remarkable community outpouring of support for The Grace Center project was a very successful Annual Gala this past April. It was our most financially successful event in recent years, and you, the St. Mary's community, contributed \$100,000 to upgrade and improve our science labs. As we look to a future of growth and expansion, we are also taking care of our students today.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the continued faith excellence of our students and community. #### **Limb Participates in Architectural Program**

Jacob Limb '22 spent 10 weeks during the spring semester participating in an architectural program for high school students through RTA Architects, a premier architectural firm in downtown Colorado Springs. Jacob was the only St. Mary's student selected, and gave his final project presentation on May 1. His final project was the design of a regional transportation hub to be located on a vacant lot adjacent to the new Olympic Museum. He blended high speed rail with a building and access to local bus and taxi transportation. After his presentation, the lead architect from RTA complimented Jacob for his clear and articulate presentation, and stated there was no doubt in his mind exactly what Jacob's design and plan were. No other students received such high praise.

#### **Two Qualify for National Chemistry Olympiad**

In April, St. Mary's again qualified two students for the National Chemistry Olympiad; this year's qualifiers were Erin Berson '20 and Katie Morales '20. When Suzanne Tibbits began teaching at St. Mary's, she set a goal to qualify students for the National Chemistry Olympiad, which at times seemed daunting given the larger schools that usually qualify. St. Mary's qualified its first students for the National Chemistry Olympiad in 2010. Since that time, we have had 17 students qualify for the Olympiad, and have had only two years in which two students didn't qualify. Each school is only allowed to qualify two students each year.

#### **Pirate Theater Sells Out Spring Musical**

This spring our Pirate Theater group staged "Disney's Beauty and the Beast" as its spring musical. The cast played to sold out audiences each night. Ben Bodnar '20 and Daniel Zill '21 shared the lead roles of the Beast and Gaston, while Cynthia Trujillo-Castillo '21 and Rebecca Heimbuch '20 shared the role of Belle. #### St. Mary's Tops Manitou in Food Drive

In January the annual Senate-sponsored food drive competition against Manitou Springs wrapped up with more than 7,000 pounds of food being donated to Westside Cares' food banks. St. Mary's students collected 5,880 pounds of food. St. Mary's has never lost the food drive competition.

#### **Sports**

#### **Baseball**

The baseball team entered the Elite 8 of the state tournament with a 17-6 season record. They faced two tough opponents, falling to both in the double elimination tournament, finishing 19-8 overall and 8-1 in league play. Named first team 3A all-state are Josh White '19 (OF) and Anthony Depner '20 (pitcher). Samuel Baldwin '19 and Edwin Romo '19 received all-state honorable mention. Four baseball Pirates represented St. Mary's in the 2019 3A All-State Game and four played on the Tri Peaks All-Star Team at All-City Stadium in Denver. They are: White, Baldwin, Romo, and Nick Baca '19. Additionally, Coach Bill Percy was named Baseball Coach of the Year for the Tri Peaks East Division.

#### **Boys Basketball**

The boys basketball team had a successful season finishing 17-6 overall and 10-2 in league play. They beat Manitou Springs by two points to take third place in the Tri Peaks League tournament to advance to the state tournament, where they lost in the first round to Roaring Fork.

#### **Competitive Shooting**

In its second year in existence, the competitive shooting team claimed its first state championship. At the 2019 SCTP Colorado State Championships in June, St. Mary's took first in trap (Cole Ciccarelli '19, Andrew Sorensen '20, Mark Rysavy '20, Kaden Westfall '20, and Matt Raskob '20) and skeet (Westfall, Jack Rydland '20, and Raskob). In the individual events, Westfall placed first in the high overall score for men, and in trap and sporting clays. Both the varsity and junior varsity teams had great showings. Varsity team members placed second in sporting clays, third in skeet, and fourth in trap. In the individual events, Rysavy placed third in high overall for men, in trap and in skeet. Cassidy Sorensen '20 placed third in high over all for women, in trap, in skeet, and in sporting clays. The junior varsity team placed second in sporting clays and third in trap and in skeet.

#### **Girls Golf**

The girls golf team had a solid season, which culminated with Corinne Logeman '21 qualifying for the CHSAA 3A Girls Golf State Championship in late May. Earlier in the season, the team finished third overall and Lydia Yi '20 finished second individually at their first varsity tournament.

#### Lacrosse

The lacrosse team had a winning season overall at 8-6, but struggled in league play, finishing 2-4. Two lacrosse players received post-season honors. Luke Stockelman '21 was named to the all-state Lacrosse second team while Peter Stinar '21 was named honorable mention all conference this year. Stockelman played in the state game on May 23.

#### **Girls Soccer**

The girls soccer team went undefeated in league play, advancing to the state tournament. They beat The Academy in the first round of the state tournament, then tied Peak to Peak in the second round but lost on the tie breaker. They finished 12-5 overall.

#### **Swimming/Diving**

The swimming and diving team sent nine girls to the state swim meet this season. Caitlin Cairns '20 was a multi-event league champion and finished second at state in both the 50 freestyle and 100 butterfly, breaking her own school record in the latter. Adelle Rank '22 and Morgan Hughes '22 qualified for the state meet as alternates, showing the depth of the young team.

#### **Tennis**

The St. Mary's girls tennis team tied with Vanguard for the regional tennis title this season and sent nine players to the state championships in Greeley.

#### **Track and Field**

At the state championships, the boys 4x100 team (Joon Shin '19, Paul Elstad '19, Dom Hartman '19, and Owen Barton '22) placed second with a PR time of 44.48. Adam Maal '19 finished third in the 1600 M, and the boys 4x200 team (Elstad, Hartman, Barton, Maal) finished fourth.

#### **Boys Volleyball**

In its first year as a pilot program, the boys volleyball team advanced to state. This spring, boys volleyball was sanctioned by the Colorado High School Activities Association as a full high school sport for the 2020-2021 school year. The sport will return to St. Mary's again next year as a pilot program.

#### **More Spring Sports News**

In May, Mackenzie Pepper '19 was awarded the Rotary Champions' Softball Medallion, besting nominees from 20 area high schools. Fifteen St. Mary's students were nominated as Rotary Champions for the 2018-2019 school year. In March at the National Qualifying Tournament in Pueblo, Bodnar and Zill broke into finals in Duo Interpretation and were alternates to nationals, which was held in July. Thomas Jasper '19 qualified for nationals in Congressional Debate and together with Sydney Wilkinson '19 made it to semi-finals in Duo. Other members breaking into out-rounds included Katherine Chartier '20, Ronnie Hennessey '21, and Aston Medellin '21. Coach Jeff Borst was also recognized at the District Coach of the Year.

#### **Nuñez Elected Co-Captain of Rangerettes**

### **Girls Basketball Wins 2nd State Title**


The St. Mary's girls basketball team claimed its second consecutive state title in March, and made it look easy. In many ways the 2018-2019 season mirrored the 2017-2018 season with the team losing only one game all season. That loss again came at the hands of the Colorado Springs Christian School Lions.

The Pirates rebounded defeating CSCS 40-34 to take the Tri Peaks district title, avenging the earlier regular season loss.

Once they entered the state tournament as the No. 1 seed, they put on a show. They defeated Riverdale Ridge 82-22 in regionals, then topped Salida 77-27 in the Sweet 16, Alamosa 53-38 in the Great 8, and Eaton 54-20 in the Final Four to set up a rematch with CSCS for the state title.

The Pirates took the lead early in the state title game and easily defeated CSCS 56-34 to become the 2019 state champions. The team finished with an overall record of 26-1 and were 9-1 in league play.





## **Community Rallies for Turf,**

ince it was dedicated in 2006, The Grace Center has always been about community. In fact, the community aspect of the center was so important that it is part of the facility's proper name: The Grace Center for Athletics and Community Service.

Over the last 13 years, The Grace Center has provided an amazing venue for community gatherings, not just for the St. Mary's family but also for the greater Colorado Springs community. This year the St. Mary's community, as well as the local community, rallied to help keep The Grace Center in tip-top condition by helping St. Mary's fund its turf and track replacement project.

Work started on May 20, with some necessary landscaping to mitigate erosion on the hillside above the field. Removal of the existing turf started on June 10 and was completed that week. Then the track was resurfaced and the new turf was installed, with the project finished by the end of July.

St. Mary's President Rob Rysavy is thrilled with the updates and improvements

being made to the facility.


"Our family's journey at St. Mary's began in 2006, the year The Grace Center opened. Over the last 13 years, my two grads and two current students all competed at The Grace Center," he said. "With two more kids still on the way, my family is thrilled that The Grace Center will now remain one of the premier high school athletic facilities in the state of Colorado for many years to come."

The girls soccer team was both the first and the last to play on the original turf at The Grace Center. In the spring of 2006, the girls hosted Coorado Springs Christian School in the first game on the field in the facility. The stadium was added over the summer of 2006, and the facility officially opened in the fall of 2006. On May 2, the girls soccer team secured a 5-0 victory over James Irwin in the last athletic contest to take place on the original turf.

Through the exceptional stewardship of Jim Cristelli and his facility crew, the original turf exceeded the normal expected lifespan of the surface material. Most turf fields must be replaced after eight to 10 years of use, but St. Mary's turf has lasted more than a decade.

In January, St. Mary's asked our community to help fund the turf and track replacement project and you responded with overwhelming generosity. In just a few of weeks, almost 90 families committed to give \$205,470, helping us surpass our goal of \$200,000.

Then this spring St. Mary's learned that



### **Track Replacement Project**


for the first time in more than a decade, the El Pomar Foundation has chosen to partner with our school and has provided grant funds for a portion of the turf and track project. St. Mary's had also hoped to receive funds from the NFL to help with the cost of the project, but despite a strong grant application, the NFL did not award us a grant for the new turf.

As a result St. Mary's continues working to execute its strategy to secure the remaining \$200,000 for The Grace Center project through corporate sponsors, grant-making organizations, and individual donations. Rysavy is pleased with the efforts of the staff and community to make this project possible.

"The head of our development efforts, Joe Trechter, put a great plan together to ensure we could make these improvements. Once Joe put the word out, our St. Mary's family responded magnificently, and our community continues to respond as we secure the final dollars needed for the project," he said. "I do not have the words to adequately thank Joe and our entire community for making this important project possible."

The official dedication of the new turf is set for Sept. 27 when our Pirates host Manitou Springs in the first home football game of the season. •

ife milestones, such as graduating from high school, provide time to reflect on our past and look to our future. Family and faith were themes through baccalaureate Mass and graduation on May 20 for the class of 2019, as speakers encouraged the graduates to remember their roots while they strive for success in the future.

The class of 2019 has a lot to be proud of. They earned \$9.35 million in merit scholarships. Five members of the class received full-ride ROTC scholarships, including four graduates receiving Navy ROTC scholarships. Army Second Lt. Morgan (Baldwin) Kirchhoff '14 returned to her alma mater to present her brother, Samuel, with an Army ROTC scholarship. The four-year scholarship covers tuition, books, and fees and is worth \$230,000. Navy CDR Peter Catalano was on hand to present the four Navy ROTC scholarships to Joseph Sabish, Joe Clavenna, Jeremy Uhl, and Gabe Calhoun. Each received a scholarship that

will cover tuition, books and fees that is worth \$200,000.

Catalano said that in the region that covers Colorado, Nebraska, Utah and Wyoming four ROTC scholarship recipients at one school was the most that the Navy had awarded this year.

In his baccalaureate homily, Bishop Michael Sheridan reminded the graduates that each of them are known by God before the earth was formed, and that each is created for a specific purpose.



"As you move on to the next stage of life, I pray that each of you will remain steadfast in the faith, which is not always easy today," he said. "Catherine of Siena said, 'Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire."
