AGR101 Natural Resources

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: Students enrolled in this course are encouraged to join FFA.

"This course will provide a basic introduction to the field of natural resources management. Natural resources include both renewable resources such as soil, forests, water, and wildlife, and nonrenewable resources such as oil, metals, and minerals. Current issues dealing with the conservation and management of wildlife will provide most of the examples for illustrating concepts that are generally applicable to the entire field."

AGR131 Advanced Agriculture

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades

10 11 12

Prerequisite: At least one prior AG class and is encouraged to join FFA.

"This course is designed to provide students with leadership opportunities such as, public speaking, community service, and professional development. Students will complete job applications, create cover letters and resumes. It is expected that students participate in FFA. FFA members will focus on their Supervised Agricultural Experiences and FFA record book keeping."

ART111 Mixed Media I 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: \$20 materials fee required.

"This class is designed to explore a variety of interesting art mediums. The class will start by doing projects that will build simple design and compositional skills using the elements of art. The first part of the class will focus on a variety of traditional drawing and painting mediums. The second part uses things like paper, wood, wire and some clay. The goal is to introduce a variety of materials and encourage the student to mix and combine them into complex and interesting artworks. The course will also include the study of major artists, art movements and styles. Grades are based on participation, daily assignments, and projects."

ART121 Mixed Media II

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Creative Art -- Mixed Media I

NOTE: \$20 materials fee required.

"This is an intermediate art class, designed for students who want to explore traditional and non-traditional art mediums on a deeper level. The class builds upon the art techniques learned in Mixed Media I. Projects will encourage personal expression and artistic experimentation. Students will try out different art styles as they learn about historical and contemporary artists. We will explore a variety of drawing, painting, printmaking, and sculpting media. Grades are based on participation, daily assignments, and projects."

ART151 Yearbook

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades

10 11 12

Prerequisites: Students in grade 9 admitted with permission of instructor

"Members of this class will produce the school yearbook. Students interested in writing, photography, graphic design, online publishing, or marketing are encouraged to enroll. They will apply their skills in these fields to create a quality publication. Leadership is an integral part of this class and students should be able

to work as a productive team member. Grades will be based on class participation, completion of assigned pages and writing. "

ART301 Digital Imaging

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: \$20 materials fee required.

"In Digital Imaging, students will become fluent in Adobe Photoshop and will create projects simulating great painters, photographers and printmakers. The training and projects in this course include the mastery of camera operations and shooting skills, and the manipulation of photographic images through various assigned and student-generated projects. The students will be involved in taking pictures for the yearbook. Grades are based on participation, daily assignments and projects."

ART131 Independent Studies in the Visual Arts 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Successful completion of at least three previous courses in the visual arts and by teacher permission only.

NOTE: \$20 materials fee required.

"This course is designed for the skilled and motivated student who wants the opportunity to develop an individualized curriculum in the visual arts. Areas of study may include painting, sculpture, graphic design, digital photography, printmaking and professional portfolio development. Students may elect to use this class to satisfy their fine arts requirement. Grades are based on participation and projects."

BUS101 Computer Applications I 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

THIS IS A REQUIRED FRESHMAN CLASS

"In this course, students discover the skills they need to master the big three Microsoft Office programs -- Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. Even students who are unsure about computers will develop the know-how to be successful when writing personal, school, or career-related material. Students will also increase their speed and accuracy at the keyboard -- all in just 12 weeks!"

BUS301 Computer Applications II 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Computer Applications I or instructor approval

"In today's computer-driven, global economy, students need the skills this class offers. Students will expand their knowledge of Microsoft Office in Excel and Access. They will also develop their career skills and the expertise to create correctly formatted and professional looking documents for other classes at Columbia High School, in college, and in their careers."

BUS111 Accounting I 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: Earn three college credits (FREE) while taking this class at CHS. See Instructor for details. \$20 workbook fee required.

"This course is the foundation of any business career. Whether students plan to work for themselves, in a small business setting, or for a large corporation, this course will prepare them for a future career in the

business world. Accounting I will also help students better understand their own personal finances. College or career bound students will find this class valuable."

BUS211 Accounting II

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades

11 12

Prerequisites: Accounting I with B or better

NOTE: \$20 workbook fee required.

"This advanced accounting course is designed primarily for students who desire to continue their knowledge of accounting and are perhaps thinking about accounting as a profession. Students begin with a review of Accounting I fundamentals and proceed to broaden and improve knowledge about business procedures and the use of accounting records. Students will learn a computer-automated accounting system."

"Marketing Management courses typically cover the same scope of topics as Marketing-Comprehensive courses (purchasing and distribution systems; advertising and sales; and so on) but place a particular emphasis on business management and entrepreneurship, providing exposure to common techniques and problems of management."

ART601 Drama

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades

9 10

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: \$10 class fee required per trimester. Students must commit to some evening and weekend work. "Drama is a course designed to help students develop acting skills by participating in theater activities such as improvisation, scenes, monologues, set design, and production. Students will also learn about the origins of drama, study significant plays and playwrights, practice voice, movement, and characterization. Throughout the year we will work on various productions that will include all members of the class. These productions will require evening and weekend work."

ENG101 Language & Literature I

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English Open to Grades 9

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED FRESHMAN CLASS

"Students will read a variety of types of literature, including fiction, non-fiction, drama, and poetry, and will develop the skills necessary to interpret what they read. They will also develop their writing skills as they work on a variety of composition modes. In addition, students will be expected to give spoken presentations and participate in class discussions."

ENG121 Language &

Language & Literature I - Enrichment

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English Open to Grades 9

Prerequisites: As required by Student Learning Plan or teacher recommendation

"Students will read a variety of types of literature, including fiction, non-fiction, drama, and poetry, and will develop the skills necessary to interpret what they read. They will also develop their writing skills as they work on a variety of composition modes. In addition, students will be expected to participate in class discussions. This class will include an extra emphasis on skills needed for required standardized tests."

ENG200 ELL Language Enrichment

1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English
Open to Grades 9

Prerequisites: As required by Student Learning Plan or teacher recommendation

NOTE: Can replace Language and Literature as required English class.

"Students will focus on reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills by participating in class discussions, learning non-fiction reading strategies and practicing content specific vocabulary."

ENG131/ENG331

English I/II ELL-English III/IV ELL

3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades

9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: As required by Student Learning Plan or teacher recommendation NOTE: Can replace Language and Literature I, II, III, IV as required English class.

"Students will read a variety of types of literature, including fiction, drama, and poetry, and will develop the skills necessary to interpret what they read. They will also develop their writing skills as they work on a variety of composition modes. In addition, students will be expected to participate in class discussions. This class will include an extra emphasis on skills needed for the required standardized tests. This class is for emergent and progressing language learners."

ENG111 Language & Literature I - Honors

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English Open to Grades 9

Prerequisites: Teacher recommendation

NOTE: Can replace Language and Literature I as required freshman English class.

"The Language and Literature I Honors class is for students who are motivated to take an English course that is academically rigorous and challenging. All students in this class will be expected to perform at high academic levels. Students will read a variety of types of literature, including fiction, non-fiction, drama, and poetry, and work on developing complex and in-depth interpretations of what they read. They will also work to refine their writing skills as they utilize a variety of composition modes. In addition, students will be expected to give spoken presentations and participate meaningfully in class discussions. This course will help prepare students for other academically challenging language arts classes, including Language and Literature II Honors and AP English."

ENG201

Language & Literature II

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades 10

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Language and Literature I or equivalent

REQUIRED SOPHOMORE CLASS

"Students will read a variety of world literature from various regions and time periods, including myths, poems, short stories, nonfiction, and other works, and will continue developing skills to interpret and analyze what they read. Students will build on their writing skills as they work on a variety of composition modes. In addition, students will be expected to give spoken presentations and participate in class discussions."

ENG211 Language & Literature II - Honors

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades 10

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Language and Literature I Honors and/or teacher recommendation

NOTE: Can replace Language and Literature II as required sophomore English class.

"The Language and Literature II Honors class is for students who are ready for an English course that is academically rigorous and challenging. All students in this class will be expected to perform at high academic levels. The class will focus on world literature, and students will read a variety of types of literature from various regions and time periods, including myths, poems, short stories, novels, and other works. Students will work on developing complex and in-depth interpretations of what they read, and also work on refining their writing skills. In addition, students will be expected to give spoken presentations and participate meaningfully in class discussions. This course will help prepare students for other academically challenging language arts classes, including AP English."

ENG301 Language & Literature III

2 Trimester

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Language and Literature II or equivalent

REQUIRED JUNIOR CLASS

"In this two-trimester course, students will read a variety of American Literature. Students will read from different literary types, including fiction, drama, poetry, and nonfiction. Students learn about literary terms, which will enable them to analyze a variety of composition modes. Students will have the opportunities to work on their writing skills, and communication skills will be developed through class participation."

ENG311 Advanced Composition and Literature

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Honors Language and Literature II or teacher recommendation. NOTE: Juniors may take this class in place of Language & Literature III. This course is recommended for students who plan to take AP English.

"This course targets advanced college-bound juniors. Students will develop skills in writing for various purposes. Model essays are read and analyzed for elements specific to rhetorical mode. Students must produce multiple essays, taking the essays through all phases of the writing process. They will also practice the skills of the analytical process in the consideration of the formal elements of fiction, reading and writing about several novels. Students will work on their public speaking skills through classroom presentations."

ENG401 Language & Literature IV

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades

12

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Language and Literature III or equivalent.

REQUIRED SENIOR CLASS

"Language & Literature IV is designed to help students with the research paper and speaking aspects of their Senior Projects and to facilitate the continued development of literary analysis and writing skills. During the course, students will work on writing a research paper using MLA format and style. They will also work on their speaking skills, which will be needed for presenting their Senior Projects in the spring. Throughout the course, students will read and analyze a variety of types of literature and work on improving their writing abilities."

ENG421 AP: Literature and Composition

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades

12

Prerequisites: C or better in Advanced Composition & Literature or teacher permission.

NOTE: Seniors may take this class in place of Language & Literature IV. Students enrolled in this course may take the AP exam in May at a cost of approximately \$94. Financial assistance may be available for those who qualify. Possible college credit with exam passage can be earned.

"Students in AP English will actively discuss works which require careful, deliberate reading. The approach to analyzing and interpreting these works will involve learning how to make careful observations of textual detail and establishing connections among observations. Students will draw from those connections a series of inferences leading to conclusions about the work's meaning and value. Writing will focus on increasing the student's ability to explain clearly, cogently, and even elegantly what they understand about literary works and why they interpret them as they do. The AP English Literature and Composition course is a college-level English course that is demanding, rigorous, and challenging and should only be taken by students who enjoy reading and writing. Summer reading may be required."

Department: Health

HTH101 Health 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Health Open to Grades 9 Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED FRESHMAN CLASS

"Students will acquire knowledge and skills to promote health and prevent or reduce impact of accidents, illnesses, and injury."

Department: Mathematics

MTH221 Algebra Enrichment 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10

Prerequisites: Enrollment based on teacher recommendation.

NOTE: This class DOES NOT fulfill the math requirement needed for graduation.

"Algebra Enrichment is designed as a support course for Algebra I. The course provides students with additional time to build the foundations necessary for high school math courses, while concurrently having access to rigorous, grade-level appropriate courses. Students will review standards from the middle grades which include the following: relationships between quantities and reasoning with equations, linear and exponential relationships, descriptive statistics, and expressions and equations. "

MTH201 Algebra I 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics
Open to Grades 9
Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED FOR GRADUATION

NOTE: A scientific calculator is required."

"In Algebra I students will build on previously learned concepts in algebraic thinking while continuing to develop mathematical practices. Students will learn to use functions to represent relationships mathematically using words, concrete elements, numbers, graphs, and algebraic expressions. They will explore concepts in linear and non-linear equations and functions, systems of linear equations and inequalities, exponential and polynomial expressions and functions, and quadratic functions and equations."

MTH251 Geometry 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Algebra I

REQUIRED FOR GRADUATION

NOTE: Compass, protractor, ruler, and scientific calculator are required.

"Geometry is a college preparatory mathematics course. Students learn strategies in analyzing geometric figures such as points, lines, planes, angles, triangles, quadrilaterals, special quadrilaterals, parallel and

perpendicular lines, circles, polygons, polyhedrons, prisms, cylinders, cones and pyramids. Students study concepts of congruency and similarity, apply deductive and inductive reasoning, examine concepts from coordinate and transformational geometry, and apply their algebra skills and problem-solving techniques to geometric and real world problems."

MTH271 Honors Geometry 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: A or B in Algebra I

"Honors Geometry is a course designed for students who are advanced in mathematics. The students will learn basic strategies in analyzing geometric figures in real world problems as well as some advanced methods to better prepare them for future math courses. The students will study figures such as parallel and perpendicular lines, angles, triangles, quadrilaterals, polygons, polyhedrons, prisms, cylinders, cones, pyramids and circles. They will study concepts such as deductive reasoning, congruence, similarity, coordinate geometry and transformations. "

MTH241 Math -- Test Prep 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Successful Completion of Algebra I and Geometry.

"This course is designed for students who need to pass the Math SBAC. Assignments and activities will be designed to help students gain mathematical knowledge and reasoning."

MTH301 Algebra II 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Geometry

NOTE: This course or an equivalent third year of math is REQUIRED for graduation. A scientific calculator is required.

"Building on previous work with linear, quadratic and exponential functions, students will extend their study to include polynomial, rational and radical functions. Students will work with expressions and equations and improve their ability to model situations using all of these functions."

MTH311 Business Mathematics with Algebra 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Algebra I and Geometry

NOTE: This course or an equivalent third year of math is REQUIRED for graduation.

"Students apply algebra concepts to a variety of business and financial situations. Applications may include income, insurance, credit, banking, taxation, stocks and bonds, and finance."

MTH321 Algebra II - Honors 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: "Geometry with a B or better, or teacher approval."

NOTE: This course or an equivalent third year of math is REQUIRED for graduation. A scientific calculator is required.

"Algebra II Honors is a course designed for advanced, college-bound students. This is a fast-paced and rigorous course designed to better prepare students for the advanced math courses. It is a continuation of Algebra I but in much greater depth and detail. The emphasis is still on symbolism, functions and graphing, but the course has a unit in advanced probability. Linear and quadratic functions are studied in more depth, and polynomial, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions are introduced."

MTH341 Technical Mathematics

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Algebra, Geometry

NOTE: This course or an equivalent third year of math is REQUIRED for graduation.

"This course extends students' proficiency in mathematics, by applying these skills to technical and/or industrial situations and problems. Technical Mathematics topics may include rational numbers; systems of measurements; tolerances; numerical languages; geometry; algebra; statistics; and using tables, graphs, charts, and other data displays. Technology is integrated as appropriate."

MTH351 College Algebra 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Algebra II with a C or better.

NOTE: Graphing Calculator is needed; TI-89 preferred. College credit (5 quarter credits) is offered through Columbia Gorge Community College. See instructor for details.

"This course is an advanced mathematics course offered for joint high school/college credit through Columbia Gorge Community College. It corresponds to College Algebra (Math 111). Subject areas also enable the student to apply knowledge of college algebra to the social and physical sciences and business. Concepts covered will include the study of functions and relations of one or two variables with emphasis on polynomial and rational functions; exponential and logarithmic functions, and complex numbers."

MTH352 Elementary Functions

1 Trimester

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12 Prerequisites: College Algebra with Grade C or better

NOTE: Graphing Calculator is needed; TI-89 preferred. College credit (5 quarter credits) is offered through Columbia Gorge Community College. See instructor for details.

"Elementary Functions is a college level, honors mathematics class offered for joint high school/college credit through Columbia Gorge Community College. It corresponds to Elementary Functions (Math 112). Students study circular and trigonometric functions and their applications, trigonometric identities, right and oblique triangle solutions and vectors."

MTH371 Calculus I 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: College Algebra/Elementary Functions with a C or better

NOTE: Graphing Calculator is needed; TI-89 preferred. College credit (4 quarter credits) is offered through Columbia Gorge Community College. See instructor for details.

"This is an advanced mathematics course that is offered for joint high school/college credit through Columbia Gorge Community College. The course corresponds to Calculus I (MTH 251). Topics studied will be functions in calculus, limits, continuity, the derivative; additional topics on functions and their derivatives; applications of the derivative."

MTH372 Calculus II 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Calculus I with Grade C or better.

NOTE: Graphing Calculator is needed; TI-89 preferred. College credit (5 quarter credits) is offered through Columbia Gorge Community College. See instructor for details.

"This is a college level, honors, mathematics course offered for joint high school/college credit. This course corresponds to MTH252, Calculus II offered at Columbia Gorge Community College. Topics studied include

limits, continuity, derivatives and integrals. Applications are investigated from science, business and the social sciences."

Department: Music

MUS201 Concert Choir

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"Students will learn to read music and sing within the context of a choir. The ensemble will learn about music theory and how many styles of music are similar to one another, from folk to pop, from madrigals to Rhythm and Blues, from the blues to electronica, etc. Students will also learn and perform a wide variety of styles from different time periods for the community in a concert."

1 Trimester

MUS102 History of Modern Music 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"This course is intended for students with no music background but is also suitable for students with a background in music. In this course students will learn how popular music became the way it is today. A variety of genres will be covered such as Classical music, Blues, Jazz, Motown, Rock and Roll, and Rap. Students will listen to music in class and relate it to the music they listen to in their everyday lives. Minimal homework will be required for this class."

MUS123 Mariachi Band 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: Instrument rental and maintenance is \$25 per trimester if rented from CHS.

"This performance group is intended for beginners with no musical background. Emphasis will be placed on proper playing technique, musical literacy, Mariachi history, and Mexican Culture. Students will study varied repertoire of Mariachi music including bolero, ranchera and son music forms. Students will learn about Mariachi and Mexican culture in the form of music, cooking, dancing, singing, folktales, etc. This is a co-curricular class so students will be required to perform in at least 2 evening concerts a year and attend various festivals and community events. Grades are based on participation, concert attendance, and demonstrated knowledge of musical concepts."

MUS111 Acoustic Guitar 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: School guitar rentals will be provided on a first-come, first-served manner. If a student doesn't have access to a guitar, they will be required to drop the course. Instrument rental and maintenance is \$25 per trimester if rented from CHS.

"The objective of this class is to help students become guitarists who can read and play the music they enjoy listening to and even compose their own tunes. Basics such as guitar tuning, guitar anatomy, music reading, picking, strumming, scales, chords, and musicality will be covered in this course. Students are required to provide their own acoustic guitars for this course unless they have an arrangement with the instructor to rent a school instrument. "

MUS301 Concert Band 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: "At least 2 years prior band experience, or permission of instructor"

NOTE: In order to build on concepts and grow as an ensemble, students must enroll in Concert Band for all 3 trimesters unless approved by both Mr. Prosch-Jensen and Mrs. Hallead. Contact them if scheduling issues arise.

"This music ensemble will explore a wide variety of wind ensemble and pep band literature. Students will have the opportunity to perform for the community in four school-sponsored concerts, as well as football games, basketball games, festivals, competitions, parades, etc. Students will learn about music theory, music history, world music, and what it takes to be a professional musician. Concert Band is a year-round course."

MUS401 Jazz I 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Students must also be enrolled in Concert Band and have auditioned into Jazz I.

NOTE: This course is offered before school (7:15 AM-8:05 AM) M,W,F. "

"Jazz I is an auditioned group where musicians are expected to approach and perform their music with a professional attitude. Since this is CHS's most advanced group, we will be playing a wide variety of music with challenging rhythms and phrases. Outside practice is expected so that rehearsals won't be spent teaching individual parts. Jazz I will also cover improvisation and develop student ears on how to listen to Jazz. This ensemble will be difficult but highly rewarding. Jazz I will perform in 4 concerts and go on trips to festivals and competitions. "

MUS161 Jazz II 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Fine Arts

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Students must also be enrolled in Concert Band and have auditioned into Jazz II

"NOTE: This course is offered before school (7:15 AM-8:05 AM) T,TH. "

"Jazz II is an ensemble where musicians will be performing a variety of styles of Jazz, from Swing and Latin to Funk and Rock. We will also cover improvisation and develop students ears on how to listen to Jazz. Jazz II will perform in 4 concerts and go on trips to festivals and competitions. Outside practice is expected so that valuable rehearsal time will be used as efficiently as possible. Jazz II student will have the opportunity to challenge for a spot in Jazz I at the end of each trimester. "

Department: Digital Learning

DLD078 Digital Learning Department (DLD) 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"DLD offers hundreds of online classes. All classes are taught by online teachers who are certified in the specific subject area. Interested students should know in advance that online classes require a serious commitment and willingness to take responsibility for their learning. To be successful, students should have strong reading and writing skills, and be:

- * highly motivated and self-disciplined
- * organized, with the ability to prioritize tasks and plan ahead
- * proficient at web browsing and word processing
- * capable of communicating regularly with teachers via e-mail and discussion forums

There is a limit to the number of students who can take online course due to funding. Students can only enroll in courses currently NOT TAUGHT at CHS. Exceptions to this policy is with permission of the principal only.

Department: Physical Education

PED101 Physical Education 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: PE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"This class is designed to give students a background in indoor and outdoor activities they can participate in after high school. Activities may include volleyball, badminton, softball, frisbee golf, pickleball, basketball, and soccer. Emphasis of this program will be on lifelong fitness. Attendance and participation are vital components of a student's grade. "

PED301 Personal Fitness 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: PE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"In this 12-week course students will practice various exercise routines, with the goal of learning some that they can practice throughout their lives. Students will learn many ways to warm up and cool down in order to prevent injury. Each class session will include activities to improve cardiovascular fitness, core strength, and muscle flexibility."

PED201 Physical Conditioning 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: PE

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Sophomore class standing or higher, successful completion of Health/Fitness. Freshmen allowed by instructor permission only

NOTE: Sophomores and Juniors may take the course two trimesters. Seniors may take the course only one trimester, unless space is available.

"This course is designed for those students who have an intense desire to increase their overall fitness and/or improve their athletic performance. Workouts will be weight training based, and will feature core lifts such as squat, power clean, deadlift, and bench presses as the foundation. Secondary exercise such as work with dumbbells, selectorized machines and other strength training apparatus will also be incorporated. Special attention is given to flexibility, speed, agility, and quickness drills, and abdominal/core strength exercises as well. Attendance and participation are vital components of a student's grade."

Department: Science

SCI121 Physical, Earth and Space Science 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science Open to Grades 9 Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED FRESHMAN CLASS

"This course is an introduction to Physical, Earth, and Space Sciences. Students will perform inquiry-based laboratories and use mathematical skills to investigate phenomena of the natural world. Topics to be covered include motion and forces, waves and energy, energy in the Earth's system, and astronomy. Laboratory activities are also featured in this course."

SCI201 Biology 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

"This course is an introduction to general biology. Concepts selected are designed to aid students taking the Washington Comprehensive Assessment of Science (WCAS). The course will feature discussion and laboratory practice of modern biological topics. Some of the topics presented are: Scientific Methods, Cell Structure and Function, Cellular Transport, Basic Chemistry, Intro to Genetics and Heredity."

SCI301 Chemistry 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Algebra I and Physical, Earth & Space Science.

"This course is an introductory course of chemistry. The focus of the course is to prepare the student for further studies in the field of chemistry and other areas of science. The major components of this class will be on manipulation and computation of data, problem-solving, chemistry theory and laboratory practices. Laboratory activities and demonstrations will aid in solidifying the concepts in lecture and provide the student with basic laboratory practices."

SCI351 Advanced Biology

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades

11 12

Prerequisites: B or higher in Biology or teacher permission.

"Advanced Biology is a continuation of first-year biology. The material and pacing is geared to advanced students with an interest in Human Biology. This course is designed to be an introduction to the major human systems. Students wishing to enter a health-related or medical field of study would benefit from this course. "

SCI131 Animal Science

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science or CTE

Open to Grades

10

12

11

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: Students enrolled in this course are encouraged to join FFA.

"This course is designed to engage students in the various scientific fields which have a practical application in Animal Science. Students will learn anatomy and physiology of animals, reproduction, selection, digestion, nutrition, genetics, breed characteristics, and production. Students will participate in a variety of activities including labs, field work, scientific inquiry, debate, reading and writing. This course fulfills the laboratory life-science requirements for graduation."

SCI251

Exploratory Science

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades

11 12

Prerequisites: None

"Exploratory science will delve into science topics that are relevant to your current life and your future. You will use the engineering design process, engage in scientific practices, strengthen digital literacy, build 21st Century skills in order to make informed decisions about science topics such as; antibiotic resistance, genetic modification, climate change, and space exploration and colonization."

SCI401

Physics

2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades

11 12

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Algebra II; Chemistry is preferred but not required if you are willing to learn some topics independently.

"This survey course is geared toward students pursuing a post-secondary education. Topics to be studied include principles of work, energy, mechanics, waves and light. Mathematics is the language of physics; a strong mathematical ability is required to problem solve. Laboratory experiments will require written lab reports. A group project examining the relationships of the scientist, the discovery, the historical setting and the uses of the discovery will be required."

SCI611

AP Environmental Science

3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Science

Open to Grades

11 12

Prerequisites: "Algebra II, Biology and/or B or better in Animal Science, or teacher permission" NOTE: Students enrolled in this course are encouraged to join FFA. Students enrolled in this course are expected to take the AP exam in May at a cost of approximately \$93. Financial assistance may be available for those who qualify. Possible college credit can be earned with exam passage.

"The Advanced Placement Environmental Science course is designed to be the equivalent of a one-semester, introductory college course in environmental science that includes laboratory and field investigation components. Emphasis is placed on the scientific principles, concepts and methodologies required for understanding the interrelationships of the natural world, the identification and analysis of environmental problems both natural and human-made, evaluation of the relative risks associated with these problems, and examination of alternative solutions for resolving and/or preventing them."

Department: Social Studies

SSD201 World History 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies
Open to Grades 10

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED SOPHOMORE CLASS

"This survey course on modern history begins with the Renaissance and advances through modern times. In addition to the historical content of the course, students will learn important skills relating to success in the social studies, including research and writing, higher level thinking skills, and historical interpretation. In addition, students will use technology daily as they continue to develop general academic and 21st Century skills, which they can apply throughout their coursework at CHS."

SSD211 World History - Honors 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies
Open to Grades 10
Prerequisites: Teacher recommendation

NOTE: Can replace World History as required sophomore class.

"This honors course offers students who desire greater depth, challenge, and rigor to explore themes and world events from the Renaissance to modern times. Students will also learn important skills relating to success in the social studies, including research and writing, higher level thinking skills, and historical interpretation using historical documents. Students will use technology daily as they continue to develop general academic and 21st Century skills, which they can apply throughout their coursework at CHS. Students completing this course will be well-prepared to take future advanced offerings in the social studies that challenge their academic abilities."

SSD301 US History 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies

Open to Grades 11

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED JUNIOR CLASS

"US History is the study of American History from the Civil War to 1980. The course will focus on the causes and effects of important events in the history of the United States, with an emphasis on political, economic, social, military, and cultural events."

SSD311 AP US History 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies

Open to Grades 11 Prerequisites: B or better in World History

NOTE: This class fulfills the US History requirement. Students enrolled in this course are expected to take the AP exam in May at a cost of approximately \$93. Financial assistance may be available for those who qualify. Possible college credit can be earned with exam passage.

"The Advanced Placement US History class is an intensive college level course designed not only to fulfill Washington's US History requirement, but also to prepare students for the College Board Advanced Placement test. The course requires responsibility, self-motivation, dedication and a strong commitment to complete the work requirements of the course. Most of the work consists of careful, detailed analytical

reading of college texts and primary sources. Additional assignments include writing detailed essays on historical topics. "

SSD421 Civics 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies

Open to Grades 12

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED SENIOR CLASS

"This course deals with civics, national, state and local governments; historical and philosophical foundations for today's governmental systems and the student's role within that system. Most material deals with the federal level of the government, with a unit of study devoted to state and local government. Current issues in American government and society are also a focus of the course."

SSD431 Current World Problems 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Social Studies

Open to Grades 12

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED SENIOR CLASS

"Current World Problems deals with current and ongoing events around the world, with an emphasis on the political, economic, geographic, historical, and environmental factors that influence people around the world. In addition to assignments about current events, each student is expected to research, write about, and deliver a speech about an important topic that can be considered a controversial issue or a current world problem."

SSD101 Leadership 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12 Prerequisites: None; instructor approval may be required.

NOTE: Recommended for ASB, club, or class officers.

"This class will build leaders for life and teach students about The Bruin Way. This course contains curriculum to develop leadership traits and characteristics in students. Attention to public service, exemplary school behavior, and modeling appropriate decisions among peers will be encouraged. Attendance and participation are vital components of a student's grade which will be evaluated each term for continued enrollment."

Department: Special Education

SKP201 Social Skills 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Ed. approval is required

"This course will focus on building self-esteem, self-advocacy, and social communication skills. Students will learn about the unstated rules in social situations and strategies to help them achieve social success across a variety of situations."

SKP121 Life Skills - Math 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Ed. approval is required.

"This course will focus on math skills commonly used in real life situations, at home, at work and in the community. Concepts related to geometry and algebra will be addressed. This modified curriculum is aligned with the common core state standards in math. Community-based instruction may be included."

SKP131 Basic Math 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics
Open to Grades 9 10
Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Education approval is required

"This course will focus on math basics commonly used in real life situations. Concepts related to geometry and algebra will be addressed. The modified curriculum is aligned with the common core state standards in math. This class is used as a bridge to students preparing for Algebra Enrichment or Algebra 1."

SKP151 Language Arts 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan. Special Ed. approval is required.

NOTE: Designed for students on IEPs who are qualified in the area of reading and/or written expression. "In Language Arts, students focus on reading and writing in a modified format. They read contemporary and classic literature while addressing the skills needed to improve reading comprehension, vocabulary, and fluency. Pearson's Basic English composition curriculum is used in combination with the 5-step writing process to communicate ideas in all four writing modes. Curriculum is aligned with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in the English/Language Arts (ELA)."

SKP101 Life Skills - English 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: English

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Ed. approval is required.

"This course will focus on reading and writing skills used for daily living, letters, memos, form completion and summarization of written material. Students will learn strategies used to generate ideas and plan written work. This modified curriculum is aligned with the common core state standards in writing. Community-based instruction may be included."

SKP081 Community Based Instruction / Careers 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Ed. approval is required.

"Employability skills as well as specific job skills are addressed. Students will spend time at a job site in the community anywhere from 1 to 5 days a week.

SKP171 Study Skills 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10 11 Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Ed. approval required.

"For students on an IEP needing specialized instruction in study skills and organization. This course is designed to give students the instruction in key skill areas needed to be successful in all core general education classes. Students will also receive instruction on how to maintain a Google Calendar to assist them in organizing, planning, initiating, and completing assignments and other large projects."

SKP181 Senior Study Skills 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: REQUIRED for seniors on an IEP. Special Ed. approval is required.

"Designed to support seniors. Community- based instruction may be included. Senior Study Skills supports students through their culminating project, as well as addresses the transition (post-secondary education and employment goals) process on their IEP. Students will also have time to work on other assignments from other classes."

SKP261 Consumer Math 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Mathematics

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Education approval is required

"Consumer math will focus on real world math applications. Earning money, buying food, shopping, managing a household, buying and maintaining a car, budgeting and traveling. Community- based instruction may be included."

SKP301 Life Skills 3 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Individual Education Plan

NOTE: Designed for students on an IEP. Special Education approval is required

"This course provides students with information about a wide range of subjects to assist them in becoming wise consumers and productive adults."

Department: Woods

SHP131 Woodworking I 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: \$20 materials fee required per trimester.

"This course is designed to teach woodworking skills and techniques to beginning students. Students will develop their woodworking skills by designing and building small projects such as stools, cutting boards, boxes, audio storage racks, shelves, etc. Approximately 6 weeks will be spent learning the following topics: power tool safety and operation, project sequencing, leadership, applied math, finishing techniques, and problem solving. Students will have time during the course to develop and work on individual projects."

SHP301 Woodworking II 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: CTE

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Woodshop I with a B or better. NOTE: \$20 materials fee required per trimester.

"This course is designed to teach additional woodworking skills and techniques for continuing students. Students will further develop their skills by designing and building projects which may include cabinetry, carpentry, composites, or another specialty. Student projects are selected based on individual skills and personal engagement. Approximately 4 weeks are spent enhancing student skills in drafting, more advanced joinery, project design, and project portfolio. The remainder of the course is reserved for individual projects."

Department: World Language

SPA101 Spanish I 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: World Language

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

NOTE: Required for graduation unless otherwise stated in your High School and Beyond Plan.

"The course is designed to teach non-native speakers to understand, speak, read and write basic, practical Spanish. Students are given the foundation for further study and are exposed to the Spanish culture."

SPA201 Spanish II 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: World Language

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: Minimum of C in Spanish I and English. Freshmen admitted with permission of instructor.

NOTE: Required for graduation unless otherwise stated in your High School and Beyond Plan.

"Open to students who have completed Spanish I or are native Spanish speakers. Students increase understanding of vocabulary and grammar. More emphasis is placed on advanced reading materials and advanced conversations."

SPA301 Spanish III 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 10 11 12 Prerequisites: Minimum of C in Spanish II and English.

"Students who have had two years of Spanish and native Spanish speaking students will read Spanish authors, study the characteristics of the authors, and study the elements of writing as presented in their works. They will collaborate on projects incorporating literary criticism and demonstrate an understanding of the works/authors selected in a written and oral presentation. Individual reading response essays will also be required."

SPA304 Spanish III for Heritage Speakers/Literature 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 10 11 12

Prerequisites: 80% or higher on the Spanish placement test.

"This is the third level of Spanish for native Spanish speakers. The main goal of this course is the analytical and interpretative study of the Spanish literature. This course also emphasizes the study of Hispanic history. Particular emphasis is given to the significant philosophical, political, social, and cultural movements that molded or influenced the literature of Hispanic authors. Students at this level write advanced paragraphs, five paragraph essays, and outlines. Students are also required to give formal speeches, oral presentations, and participate in debates."

SPA351 AP Spanish Language 2 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: B or better in Spanish III and/or teacher recommendation

NOTE: Students enrolled in this course are expected to take the AP exam in May at a cost of approximately \$94. Financial assistance may be available for those who qualify. Possible credit can be earned with exam passage.

"An AP Spanish language course is comparable to an advanced level college language course. Emphasizing the use of Spanish for active communication, it encompasses listening/oral skills, reading comprehension, grammar, and composition. Objectives are to understand Spanish spoken by native speakers at a natural pace, develop an active vocabulary, and express themselves by describing, narrating, inquiring, and developing arguments in Spanish. In this course, emphasis is placed on using authentic materials and integration of language skills."

Department: Elective

AID111 Teacher / Office Assistant 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 11 12

Prerequisites: Accepted by application only; see the counselor or main office for an application or for more information.

"Students may serve as teacher or office assistants if they have a minimum GPA of 2.0, are not credit deficient, have a solid attendance record, and are a student in good disciplinary status (no skips, discipline problems, vehicle infractions, etc.) Graded with Pass or Fail. I s not calculated in GPA.

Advisory

ADV101 Advisory 1 Trimester

Graduation Credit: Elective

Open to Grades 9 10 11 12

Prerequisites: None

REQUIRED CLASS FOR ALL STUDENTS

"This class is designed to follow the Career Guidance Washington advisory program and is based around a series of themes. The themes cover academic preparation and improvement; planning and goal setting; career and college preparation; community service and leadership; and basic life skills, such as using money wisely. CHS staff members act as advisors for groups of 15-20 students for their entire four years of high school. Advisory groups meet several times a month to complete projects and discuss upcoming deadlines. Each year students use skills gained from this course as they organize materials for their student led-conferences and as part of their culmination project presentation their senior year. A required High School and Beyond plan is completed and updated at each grade level."
