POLICY: 7023

SUMMER SCHOOL

A student may attend, at parent's expense, a summer school program which is approved by the State Board of Education. A student may enroll in summer school only for courses they have failed to pass during the regular school year in Pleasants County Schools. Granting credit for courses not taken in an approved summer school program in Pleasants County Schools will be evaluated on a case by case basis.

The exceptions to the rule are:

- Students who are ineligible to participate in extracurricular activities due to grades may
 become eligible by attending summer school and achieving a letter grade which when
 tabulated with all other credits attempted that semester will tabulate to a 2.0 grade point
 average. The ineligible student may take only courses they have failed or electives offered
 in Pleasants County that are not required for graduation or warranty.
- Should the approved summer school not offer the course(s) the ineligible student has
 failed or an elective not required for graduation, a request for a course exemption may be
 submitted to the Principal for approval of such course not currently part of the St. Marys
 High School curriculum.
- Students who wish to take a required core class (English, science, social studies) in order to take an upper level elective course in those curricular areas. Students requesting an exemption under this option must:
 - Maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.25 through the current semester (minimum of four semesters),
 - o Have approval of the building Principal, and Pleasants County Board of Education
 - o <u>Must achieve a minimum of a 3 or 4 on the WV General Summative Assessment in the previous grade.</u>

Once the building Principal receives notification of successful completion of the summer school course, the student will receive credit. The grade received will be computed in the cumulative grade point average of the student and be noted on the student's transcript.
