

#### MENA SUMMER ALE PROGRAM

The summer program was created during the 2020-21 school year and designed around service learning projects throughout the community. Students have worked at CMA, Humane Society and throughout the city as needed. This year students will have the opportunity to visit various businesses as well as attend informational sessions with guest speakers.

The program was created because service learning opportunities provide students with the opportunity to serve the community and allow students to see their role as a change agent. They are able to see themselves as part of a community rather than a community against them. Community service has proven to positively affect students' problem solving skills, responsibility, and social skills. Summer programs provide students with a safe, supportive environment when school is out for break. For students who are at risk, summer programs are imperative for their social emotional wellbeing. This summer program will continue to reinforce what each student has gained during the school year and provide further learning opportunities. For students who are on probation this would be an opportunity to grow in the community as well as grow as an individual. Summer programs are proven to reduce crime among adolescents and increase desired behaviors. After school programs will also provide our students with community relationships, mentors and a sense of belonging. Studies show that students who are engaged positively within their community are more likely to transition into adulthood successfully, compared to those not surrounded by uplifting mentors or youth programs.

This program is an effective experience for Mena's most vulnerable population. This program provides students with a "Big Audience," enhancing our students' internal desire to achieve greater outcomes. They were able to make significant progress and gain achievements. Five students successfully participated and completed the program during the 2020-21

school year. Each student gained 32 volunteer hours, collectively earning 160 hours. Students were able to gain employment, interpersonal skills, personal gains and community resources that will be invaluable in their future endeavors.

This year the program runs through the month of June for two to three days a week from 9am-2pm. Transportation is provided for all students as well as lunch and snacks. The snacks have been provided for students by Mena Insurance Agency. Our schedule for this year is as follows:

- Copy of Child's Shot Record (child must be up to date on shots)
- Current Physical/Well Child Check Up
- Copy of Current Utility Bill (showing proof of address)

Children must be three or four years of age on or before Aug. 1, 2022.

#### AR THRIVE LEADER ACADEMY

The academy will prepare participants to support behavior and mental health in their schools both reactively and proactively and strengthen current educational structures to systematically teach academic and social behaviors.

This academy will provide 11 days of face-to-face professional learning that will directly benefit the school district of its participants. #### MENA SCHOOL DISTRICT CELEBRATES 125 YEARS

Mena School District began 125 years ago and here is the story of how it came to be.

In 1896 when the Kansas City Southern Railroad came through Mena and the people began to come to work on the railroad, the first thing they were interested in was a school for their children. So, at the site where the Polk County

Library is now located, a one room tent was set up with wooden boards around the bottom. One teacher taught all the children who enrolled in the new school.

Later, a small school was built on the site where the First Baptist Church is now, and another teacher was added. These two teachers taught all the children.

for his earnestness and zeal in the cause of education.

The Mena School District was organized in April 1897 by the election of six directors. The district comprised the entire town of Mena which was about two square miles. W. M. Pipkin was elected as superintendent of this first school. Superintendent Pipkin was a young man who had several years of successful teaching experience. He was a graduate of Peabody Teachers College in Nashville, Tennessee. He was noted

The town was growing rapidly but there was no data available as to just how many pupils there would be when school opened in the fall. Pipkin said that on the first morning when he walked into the primary teacher's room there were 125 children crowded into every available inch. To meet the emergency, the school board arranged for the building of three temporary rooms on the grounds and secured the use of the Baptist Church.

In spite of over-crowded conditions and lack of any special equipment, Superintendent Pipkin was able to arrange and use a well-balanced course of study and to practice many modern methods of teaching and management.
