# Welcome to the 2023-24 school year!

We are excited to welcome students back into the building for another year of learning and growth. You'll notice several exciting projects and initiatives happening in and around the school as we prepare for another year serving our communities' future. Here are a few we'd like to highlight:

## **Familiar Faces in New Positions**

There has been some reorganization of the administrative team, and while there aren't any new faces, there are some people in different roles. Mr. Josh Tarrell will be taking over all of the superintendent duties, and Mrs. Ashley Halvorson will be taking the principal position. Mrs. Lynn Michek will remain the Activiites Director, but will also take on some Dean of Students duties and will be our district At-Risk Coordinator. Christa Pierick (formerly Christa Dilley), will transition into the District Title I and Intervention Coordinator.

# **Student Safety**

Student safety has always been and will continue to be our number one priority. As a reminder, Highland School District has the following safety measures in place:

**Drop-off and Pick-up Lanes** – We will continue limiting traffic in front of the school during drop-off and pick-up times. This allows students to safely enter/exit buses in front of the building and allows traffic to continue flowing smoothly in the drop-off/pick-up lines.

**Buzz In Security System** – Any visitor between the hours of 8:00-3:20pm will need to enter through the main doors, request entrance through the security system, and sign into the office. All visitors must wear a visitor's pass so they can clearly be identified by students/staff.

**Emergency Drills** – The district regularly practices fire, tornado, evacuation and intruder drills. Instructions are located in every classroom and reviewed with students/staff annually.

**Professional Development** – Our staff receives annual training on the most up-to-date strategies involving school emergencies. We work closely with the Highland Police Department and Iowa County Emergency Management to provide relevant trainings.

**Safety Plan** – The district also has an established safety plan that provides guidance for personnel responding to emergency situations. The safety plan is a joint effort between the school district and emergency response personnel such as local and county law enforcement.

**Student Resources** – We continue to provide a wide range of student resources to address student needs and concerns.

**Taking Care of Each Other Form** – Anonymous submission for students to report concerning behaviors/ issue they see at school.

**Mental Health Supports** – We offer both in-house and third-party counseling support for student with mental health needs.

Sources of Strength – Elementary students are exposed to the Sources of Strength curriculum which promotes community connection, their personal strengths, emotional regulation, asking for help, and empowering students to make change.

**Energy Bus** – For the second year in a row we are providing MS and HS students with character education through Jon Gordon's Energy Bus curriculum.

# **District Wide Reading Initiative**

We are actively taking steps to refine and improve our reading instruction to provide the best possible support for all students. You may notice additional data being collected, a common Rtl time added to the elementary schedule, and support in classroom that looks different from years' past. This is all part of a district wide plan to improve foundational reading skills. Reading is the root of all other learning, we want to do our best to ensure we have done everything in our power to secure these skills as early on in the academic careers of our

students as possible.

#### **Attendance**

We will have a district-wide initiative on improving attendance this school year. Currently, Highland Community Schools falls below the state average in habitually truant student statuses. Furthermore, our data shows that truancy is impacting student academic achievement. We want to provide every educational opportunity possible, but in an effort to do so we need students present in the building.

## **Social Media & Communications**

Our school social media page will return to in-house posting for the entirety of the 23-24 school year. We transitioned from a third-party vendor back to in-house posting last year. Our main objective is to tell our school story in a platform that people naturally go to; however, we also rely on social media posts to get out last minute information that will impact student/family plans. Please be patient with us as we continue to streamline the processes that are involved with managing a social media page. If you have any suggestions, please feel free to forward them to administration.

#### **Athletic Restrooms**

You may notice some construction taking place near the north end of the building when you return (Tyler Field area). Please help us ensure all persons remain a safe distance from the active construction site while work is in progress. We are excited to tell you more about this project in the near future.

# **Drive Slowly and Carefully**

School buses will soon be sharing the roads with us again, and many children will soon be crossing streets to get to school. # Student Drop Off and Pick Up for School Year 2023-24

Dear Parents,

With the new school year upon us, we want to make sure that we do our best to make sure all students arrive and leave school safely. With this in mind, we will continue to follow the protocol listed below.

#### **Elementary Students:**

All elementary students will be dropped off and picked up in the south parking lot. Please enter on the far south side of the parking lot and drive around to the sidewalk facing west. This will allow all students to leave the vehicle and go directly to the sidewalk to enter school. We ask that the same process be followed for student pick up. Please do not park in a stall and have your children meander through the parking lot to your vehicle. If parking is necessary, please utilize the lot and escort your child(ren) to the sidewalk. Do not park in the drop-off/pick-up line. All students will stay on the sidewalk and wait for their ride to meet them at the sidewalk. We will have staff on duty to help identify vehicles and ensure safe loading.

#### Middle/High School students:

All middle and high school students will be picked up and dropped off in the north parking lot. Please enter the parking lot at our farthest north entrance and leave exiting the drive south of the north parking lot.

#### For Families With Elementary Students and M/HS Students


We ask that you use the south parking lot for drop off and pick up.



#### PLEASE HELP YOUR BUS DRIVER

If your child will not be riding the bus to school in the morning, please telephone your bus driver by 6:15 a.m. (please see phone numbers listed on routes). Children riding the bus to a place other than home MUST have a written note from their parent giving such permission. Thanks for your help.





#### SCHOOL BUS REGULATIONS

#### Loading on the Road and at School

- 1. All children of the same family must be at the stop at the correct time. If you are not riding the bus be sure to let the driver know beforehand.
- 2. You should stay off the road at all times while waiting for the bus. Bus rider should conduct themselves in a safe manner while waiting.
- 3. Do not attempt to enter the bus until it comes to a complete stop.
- 4. Always approach the bus with care.
- 5. No student will be allowed to get off the bus except at his home unless he has a written note from his parents that has been approved by the Administrator.

#### While on the Bus

- 1. All the students must assist in keeping the bus safe and sanitary at all times.
- 2. Treat bus equipment as you would valuable furniture in your home. Damage to seats, etc., will be paid for by the offenders.
- 3. Help look after the safety and comfort of smaller children.
- 4. Bus riders are expected to be courteous to fellow students, the driver or driver's assistants.
- 5. Horseplay is not permitted around or on the school hus
- 6. Keep hands and head inside the bus at all times after entering and until leaving the bus.
- 7. Do not throw anything on the bus or out the bus windows.
- 8. Bus riders are not permitted to leave their seats while the bus is in motion.
- 9. Remember that loud talking and laughter or unnecessary commotion diverts the driver's attention and may result in a serious accident.
- 10. When the bus approaches a railroad crossing stop, all students must be absolutely quiet.
- 11. Do not leave any books, packages, or other articles on the bus.
- 12. In case of road emergency, all students are to remain in the bus.
- 13. No bus riders are allowed to use the back door except in case of emergency and only when told to do so by the bus driver.
- 14. Any seating arrangement on the bus is up to the
- 15. The bus driver will enforce discipline on the bus. The names of all students who misbehave will be turned in to the Administrator. The student may not be allowed the privilege of riding the bus until a meeting of his parents with the Administrator and/or the Board of Education.

#### After Leaving the Bus

- 1. Cross the road, when necessary after getting off the bus, (at least 10 feet in front of the bus) but after looking to be sure that no traffic is approaching from either direction.
- 2. Always help your younger brothers and sisters across the road.
- 3. Be alert to the danger signal from the driver.
- 4. The driver will not discharge riders at places other than the regular bus stop, at the home, or school unless by proper written authorization from parent and school official.

#### **BUS DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES**

#### 1. First violation of bus regulations

- a. Driver documents violation and reports it to school administration.
- b. The situation will be reviewed with the student, discipline will be administered, which may include suspension from bus riding privileges, and the parents will be notified.

#### 2. Second violation

- a. Same as above.
- b. Discipline will be administered, which may include suspension from bus riding privileges.
- c. Parents will be called in for a conference with school administration.

#### 3. Third violation

- a. Same as above.
- b. Discipline may be a suspension from bus-riding privileges.

#### 4. Additional violations

- a. Same as above.
- b. Suspension from bus-riding.
- 5. Continuation of violations of bus regulations could lead to indefinite loss of bus-riding privilege. Such continuation would involve a hearing, including due process, with the School Board.
- 6. Any behavior that endangers the safety of others shall permit the immediate removal of the student from the bus.
- 7. Depending on the nature of the violation, students who fail to comply with the bus regulations are subject to detentions, in-school suspension, and/or loss of bus-riding privileges.
- 8. Students traveling on the bus for educational trips shall conduct themselves appropriately or forfeit their rights to go on additional trips planned by the school.

# Confidentiality of Personally Identifiable Information Obtained Through Child Find Activities

This information in this publication also appears in Spanish and Hmong.

ighland School District is required to locate, identify, and evaluate all children, with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools in the school district, and homeless children. The process of locating, identifying, and evaluating children with disabilities is known as child find. This agency conducts developmental screening of preschool children annually. This notice informs parents of the records the school district will develop and maintain as part of its child find activities. This notice also informs parents of their rights regarding any records developed.

The school district gathers personally identifiable information on any child who participates in child find activities. Parents, teachers, and other professionals provide information to the school related to the child's academic performance, behavior, and health. This information is used to determine whether the child needs special education services. Personally identifiable information directly related to a child and maintained by the school is a pupil record. Pupil records include records maintained in any way including, but not limited to, computer storage media, video and audiotape, film, microfilm, and microfiche. Records maintained for personal use by a teacher and not available to others and records available only to persons involved in the psychological treatment of a child are not pupil records.

# The school district maintains several classes of pupil records.

- (1) "Progress records" include grades, courses the child has taken, the child's attendance record, immunization records, required lead screening records, and records of school extra-curricular activities. Progress records must be maintained for at least five years after the child ceases to be enrolled.
- (1) "Behavioral records" include such records as psychological tests, personality evaluations, records of conversations, written statements relating specifically to the pupil's behavior, tests relating specifically to achievement or measurement of ability, physical health records other than immunization and lead screening records, law enforcement

officers' records, and other pupil records that are not "progress records." Law enforcement officers' records are maintained separately from other pupil records. Behavioral records may be maintained for no longer than one year after the child graduates or otherwise ceases to be enrolled, unless the parent specifies in writing that the records may be maintained for a longer period of time. The school district informs parents when pupil records are no longer needed to provide special education. At the request of the child's parents, the school district destroys the information that is no longer needed.

- (i) "Directory data" includes the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, photographs, degrees and awards received, and the name of the school most recently previously attended by the student.
- (1) "Pupil physical health records" include basic health information about a pupil, including the pupil's immunization records, an emergency medical card, a log of first aid and medicine administered to the pupil, an athletic permit card, a record concerning the pupil's ability to participate in an education program, any required lead screening records, the results of any routine screening test, such as for hearing, vision or scoliosis, and any follow-up to the test, and any other basic health information, as determined by the state superintendent. Any pupil record relating to a pupil's physical health that is not a pupil physical health record is treated as a patient health care record under sections 146.81 to 146.84, Wisconsin Statutes. Any pupil record concerning HIV testing is treated as provided under section 252.15, Wisconsin Statutes.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), and section 118.125, Wisconsin Statutes, afford parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") the following rights with respect to education records:

(i) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of receipt of the request. Parents

or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the records(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. The school district will comply with the request without unnecessary delay and before any meeting about an individualized education program, or any due process hearing, and in no case more than 45 days after the request has been made. If any record includes information on more than one child, the parents of those children have the right to inspect and review only the information about their child or to be informed of that specific information. Upon request, the school district will give a parent or eligible student a copy of the progress records and a copy of the behavioral records. Upon request, the school district will give the parent or eligible student a list of the types and locations of education records collected, maintained, or used by the district for special education. The school district will respond to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of the records. A representative of the parent may inspect and review the records.

(1) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes is inaccurate or misleading. Parents or eligible students may ask Highland School District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the district decides not to amend the record, the district will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

- (i) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information in the student's education records, except to the extent that federal and state law authorize disclosure without consent. The exceptions are stated in 34 CFR 99.31, Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act regulations; Sec. 9528, PL107-110, No Child Left Behind Act of 2001; and section 118.125(2)(a) to (m) and sub. (2m), Wisconsin Statutes. One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosures to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school board; a person or company with whom the district has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the district discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Also the district discloses "directory data" without consent, unless the parent notifies the district that it may not be released without prior parental consent.
- 1 The right to file a complaint with the U. S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. Application forms are available on the district website. To apply for free/reduced meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the district office. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

# **Homeless Children/Unaccompanied Youth**

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homelessness children and youth (twenty-one years of age and younger) as:

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and unaccompanied youth who are:

- (i) Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (sometimes referred to as "double-up");
- ① Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations;
- (i) Living in emergency or transitional shelters;
- (1) Abandoned in hospitals; or
- (i) Awaiting foster care placement.
- ① Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for, or primarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings;
- (1) Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- (1) Migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances listed above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the Highland School District provides the following assurances to parents of homeless youth:

- ① There shall be immediate enrollment and school participation, even if educational and medical records and proof of residency are not available.
- ① All educational opportunities and related opportunities for homeless students, including unaccompanied youth, shall be the same as for the general student population.
- (1) Enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled.
- Meaningful opportunities for parents to participate in the education of their children. These shall include: special notices of events, parent teacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.

(i) Written explanation of a youth's school placement, other than school of origin or the school requested by the parent, with the right to appeal the local dispute resolution process.

# School District of Highland Annual Notice of Special Education Referral and Evaluation Procedures

pon request, the Highland School District is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made. Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability, may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Lindsay Jackson, School Psychologist, Highland School District, at (608) 929-4525, or by writing her at 1030 Cardinal Drive, Highland, WI 53543.

# **Seals-On-Wheels Dental Health Program**

Your school's FREE dental health program will return next school year! Seals-On-Wheels Oral/Dental Health Program will continue to provide children with dental screenings, cleanings, sealants, and fluoride treatments. It is free for all students in any grade. All clinicians follow protocols and guidelines put in place for mobile programs. Please reach out if you have any questions.

Seals-On-Wheels targets 2nd through 6th grade children, but we encourage all students to sign up. These grades are especially targeted due to the eruption pattern of the first and second molars. When the molars erupt, they have deep grooves that easily catch bacteria and sugar, and it is difficult even with regular brushing to reach the bottom of these tiny deep molar grooves. The sealants we offer act as a coating to help prevent cavities by filling in the grooves to create a smoother surface, making it easier to keep clean. The sealants do not completely prevent decay, so we recommend parents or guardians help their children brush and floss until they are at least 9 years to ensure proper technique.

The health history questions being asked are required by Seal-A-Smile for data entry purposes only and the dental hygienist's knowledge to provide the best care possible. Please fill out as much as possible so we have a better understanding of the children we are providing service to, which allows Seal-A-Smile of Wisconsin to continue funding programs like Seals-On-Wheels.

If you would like your child to be involved in the dental program, please apply online now or look for the permission form that will be sent home the first week of school. #### Athletic Insurance for 2023-2024

- 1. Athletic insurance coverage provided by the school district is through Student Assurance Service, Inc. It is a supplemental program of insurance.
- 2. This insurance offers protection for all students enrolled in the school while
  - A. Practicing for or competing in interscholastic sports, which are exclusively sponsored and supervised by the school, and while the student is under the direct supervision of a school employee.
  - B. Traveling directly to or from such practice or competition in a vehicle designated by the policyholder and under the supervision of an employee of the policyholder.
- 3. Student must be treated by a licensed physician within 60 days of the date of injury.
- 4. Claim Filing Procedures—Filing of the claim is the parent's responsibility.
  - A. Parents notify the school and obtain a claim form immediately. The school completes Part A of the claim form if it's a school injury.
  - B. Parents complete Part B of the claim form. Answer all questions.
  - C. Parents submit copies of the student's itemized bills to the student's family medical or dental coverage first, even if there is a large deductible. The other insurance plan will send a report called an Explanation of Benefits (EOB).
  - D. Parents send the completed claim form, copies of the student's itemized bill and the EOB to:
