LCAP Goals, WASC and SPSA Action Plans:

Our first staff and PLC meetings of the 2017-2018 school year were spent editing and updating the WASC Action Plan (WAP). The plan was shared to our PLC teams and reviewed and discussed. Teams/PLC leaders were then able to make suggestions and corrections via Google Docs and then edits were discussed as a staff and many times incorporated in the revised document. This work is still in process. I am also working with the ICSOS to revise and update the SPSA which correlates all of its goals to both the WAP and the LCAP. I have attached the WASC Action Plan for your perusal; however, because the WAP in its present format does not cite correlations to the LCAP,, I thought I would list some of the major strategies being implemented through the WAP under the LCAP goals. Some strategies crossover and address more than one LCAP goal and the list is not comprehensive of the entire WAP and therefore may not be organizationally numerically sequential.

2.1 Tasks: Identify high impact instructional strategies and then develop appropriate supporting instructional norms that will be implemented school-wide with fidelity.

Strategies:

- 1) Implement EDI strategies district-wide with fidelity
- 2) Start discussion in PLC Leader meetings (2016-2017) about developing a Writing Across the Curriculum strategy and develop plan in 2017-2018,
- 3) Continue schoolwide Close Reading
- 4) Continue implementation of CCSS/NGSS/CTE aligned curriculum
- 5 Focus best practices discussions on instructional research and driven by data collected from all assessments
- 6) Include close reading and vocabulary strategies with focus on academic language in weekly lessons throughout all departments and review effectiveness through performance data with colleagues during PLC time

- 2) Identify students in the Math 1 course who are struggling and assign them to a Math Support class with their same teacher
- 3) Math and Language Arts teachers identify and write prescriptions for students who are in need of additional targeted support during Homeroom period; students may request to be placed in the intervention program
- 4) Allow students to get support in other courses during Homeroom through Yellow Pass protocol
- 5) Create after school program to provide avenue for Credit Loss Recovery (CLR) using same staffing that provides after school tutoring in all subjects.
- 4) Identify students reading below grade level and provide support through the *Newsela* online reading program during Homeroom, Access, Learning Center, and/or their grade level Language Arts class.
- 5) Utilize BSC during and after school for study sessions, tutorials, and team projects or Project Based Learning (PBL)
- 6) Utilize BSC and Media/Library Technician to provide enrichment opportunities like virtual field trips, guest speakers both face-to-face and online, extra-credit movie nights, and other online events to personalize enrichment activities and increase student engagement.

- 3) Provide t-shirts to Link Crew and PLUS students to improve visibility as well as increase future interest in program
 - 4) Link Crew yearlong activities to support freshmen
 - 5) Link Crew Advisor training to improve year long program
 - 6) Link Crew monthly socials

- 1) Promote new clubs or organizations through daily bulletin (read aloud daily over the intercom) and flyers , Google Classroom around campus, and Homeroom presentations

November Guidance and Counseling Report: Lara Andersen

Link Crew: The Link Crew field trip to the Leader conference was a success, 17 students attended. We took an official tour at UC Riverside and had BUHS 2017 graduates show us around Redlands University. This week, Link Crew is holding freshman 1:1 academic check in conferences (:5 min) with every freshman during homeroom. The Scary Movie night that was 10/13 had good attendance.

PLUS: Plus meetings have begun and next week Kathleen and Kati Kress are taking 2 vans full of PLUS leaders to a PLUS student leader conference in Modesto, CA.

Freshman & Deprise amp; sophomore Guidance:

Trotter and Stout held quarter report card conferences with all the 9 th /10 th graders who received D or F on quarter report card. Referrals to homeroom intervention and after school Math tutoring were generated. A grade level PLC meeting took place on 11/1 staff meeting to discuss high risk students, share strategies for success and initiate SST meetings. Freshmen participated in the California Healthy Kids Survey on 11/2; Karen Kong administered

Junior and Senior Guidance:

Andersen and Kane also held quarter report card conferences with all the 11 th /12th graders who received D or F on quarter report card. Referrals to homeroom intervention and after school Math tutoring were generated. At the grade level PLC meeting that took place on 11/1 staff meeting to discuss high risk students, share strategies for success and initiate SST meetings. Andersen visited all senior English classes on 10/26 to provide overview of financial aid application process. FAFSA worksheet, guides to financial aid terminology and "understanding your financial aid award letter" resources provided.

Randy, Dave & Dave & Samp; Lara took 21 juniors and 2 seniors to UNR on 10/20. Campus tour and football game.

Success Program: Success 104 ended on 10/13 for the seniors. All but 2 seniors completed the "Senior Portfolio" preparations which include: a cover letter, resume, brag sheet responses, letter of recommendation, junior year interview comments, graphic of strengths/values/passions/future goals, definition of success paragraph and students are able to discuss What do I want and How do I get it. This is in preparation for the Senior Exit Interview that are being planned for the week before the February break. Lara is working on a letter of invite to community members to make up 3 person panel for each senior to present their portfolio.

College application assistance has continued with Homeroom on W/Th/F being a "drop in" for assistance to complete any application. No takers on this for the first 2 weeks. College Entrance Testing:

PSAT: 74/80 students showed up for PSAT; results expected in December ACT: October ACT students were diverted to Mammoth High school (not enough registered at BUHS).

SAT: December 2; so far only 14 students registered though late registration still open.

October SAT results: BUHS mean score 1120, State Mean 1065, National Mean 1095. Of the 17 seniors who took test, 3 did not meet college ready benchmark in Evidence Based Reading/Writing while 11 did not meet the benchmark in Math. Only 2 did not meet either benchmark. Of the 5 juniors who tested, 1 did not meet the EBR/W benchmark while 3 did not meet Math benchmark.

ASVAB: results arrived 11/8 so the plan is for Lara to have students complete the Find Your Interest: FYI to learn down career clusters that match with personal preferences and skill levels.

Social Emotional: following the suicide attempt on 11/2, district counselors and Inyo County behavioral staff provided support to students on 11/2. Probably 20 students either self-reported for support or were sought out as known to be at risk by BUHS counseling staff. On Monday, Stout & Andersen provided brief update to each of the student's classrooms re: her being in a

place now where she can get the intensive help she needs and any student wanting to get a note or get well card to her can bring those to the Guidance Office this week and we'll get them to the student. Additional support outreaches were made to students identified by teachers or parents who remain worried.

Kathleen is planning a new group of "Hurt to Hope" the structured counseling group to help students with grief issues.

Tennis completed their fall season with Lily McGrale being named the High Desert League Individual

Champion. She met her defeat in the first round of CIF individual play offs October 27 th . Volleyball finished the High Desert League in third place and fell in the first round of play offs to #1 seed Kingsburg. Cross Country will complete league finals on November 8 th . Their performance at the finals will determine first or second place for both boys and girls. CIF play offs for cross country is November 16 th in Fresno. Football finished the High Desert League in second place and face Hanford West in the first round of CIF play offs on November 9 th . Only 4 fall athletes were removed from their teams due to grades at the end of first quarter. All four of our Varsity fall sports had a team GPA of over 3.0 and were recognized by the CIF Central Section.

Winter sports are in full swing with daily practices. We have over 44 boys eligible and participating in soccer so we will have a JV team with a limited schedule.
