Football Playoffs

The Belt Huskies wrapped up their outstanding 2017 season at home, playing at Remington Field, in the quarterfinals against The Ennis Mustangs. Belt earned their way into the second round of the playoffs with a 58-34 win over Scobey-Opheim, but fell to defending state champ Ennis 72-52 to terminate their postseason run.

On Saturday, October 28th, the Huskies carried their Northern C title into a first round playoff game against Scobey-Opheim and prevailed 58-34. It looked like smooth sailing as the Huskies jumped on the Spartans right off the bat. Belt built a 20-8 lead after the first quarter, and pushed the margin to 38-6 midway through the second. However, Scobey senior, Riley Linder led an impressive comeback with three second quarter touchdowns of over 40 yards. Belt was ahead 44-26 at halftime as a result of three Keagan Stroop touchdown runs in the first quarter and touchdown run by Troy Hennes, a fumble recovery and score by Nolan Myrstol and two touchdown receptions by Robbie Flinn in the second. Myrstol's scoop and score was the first time the Belt senior found pay dirt in his career. The third quarter was left scoreless, and Belt put the game away with touchdown runs by Flinn and Stroop in the fourth stanza to secure the victory.

On November 4th, the Belt football team stepped on the field for the last time this season in a quarterfinal game against the Ennis Mustangs. The game was the most physical that the Huskies have played, as Ennis is known for their aggressive play. But even though the Mustangs outweighed the Huskies by about 70 pounds per players on the line, Belt held their own, leading to a physically intense match.

The game kicked off with a penalty for the mustangs, one of the many that would occur throughout the game. Ennis ran for a touchdown right away, paired with a successful run, good for 8 points. The Huskies fired back with a Stroop to Heitzman 12 yard pass, but the run failed, giving the Mustangs the lead, 8-6 after the first quarter. Ennis exploded in the second time period with two touchdowns along with one successful two-point conversion run. The Huskies regained the ball and Stroop successfully threw 10 yards to Flinn in the endzone. But the Mustangs ran two more touchdowns before Vogl caught a 42 yard touchdown pass from Stroop. Ennis scored once again before the time ran out for the quarter, raising the lead to 44-18 at halftime.

Belt broke the ice in the second half with a Heitzman 4 yard pass from Stroop, but the Mustangs fired back with two consecutive touchdowns. Stroop starred in the third quarter, throwing two more touchdown passes to Hennes and Flinn. Belt shutout Ennis in the fourth quarter with a Vogl 35 yard pass from Stroop, and a Vogl 20 yard run, putting the final score of the game at 72-52 Ennis.

The Belt community is proud of the football team and how much they've accomplished over the course of the year; their record of 9-1 stands alongside some of the best in school history.

The MHSA championship series continued on without the Huskies. Last weekend Forsyth beat Ennis 50-38, and Flint Creek (Drummond/Phillipsburg) beat Circle 46-14, setting up a championship game Saturday in Drummond between the victors.

...The girls beat the Mustangs in five cut-throat matches. The Huskies took the first two matches 25-19 and 25-23. Central took the next two sets 24-26 and 19-25, but Belt rallied and won the last set 15-11 to win the game. Morgan Cooper offered 3 aces, Malek killed 20 balls, Urick blocked 3 hits, Marquis dug 26 down-balls, and Pimperton notched 49 assists in the Husky win.

Great Falls Central played their way back into the championship game to face Belt yet again. This time, the Huskies were ready and were victorious in three sets with scores of 25-23, 25-21, and 27 -25. Pimperton and Cooper combined for 4 aces and Pimperton added 35 assists as well. Gliko, Urick, Cooper, and Pimperton all supplied 1 block. Malek had 16 kills and Marquis passed 26 hits. With the three set win the Huskies captured their ninth consecutive district title.

For their first game in the Northern C divisional tournament, the Huskies dominated the Power Pirates. The Maroon and Gold easily outpaced the Pirates 25-14, 25-12, and 25-14. Pimperton and Urick battle Central came out on top in both served an ace. Urick also added one block. Malek logged one block as well as 13 kills. Urick and Cooper both contributed 11 digs and Pimperton set for 27 assists as the Huskies rolled past the Pirates.

The next Belt matchup featured the Huskies and the North Star Knights. Belt was quick to defeat the Knights, making a clean sweep in three straight sets, 25-9, 25-14, and 25-18. Pimperton led the Huskies with 3 aces, 35 assists, and

1 block, a stellar performance. Shelby Paulson also added 1 block for Belt. Cooper hammered 16 kills and secutive Northern C divisional title Marquis dug up 22 down balls as the Huskies remained unbeaten.

For a guaranteed spot in the Northern C championship, the Huskies faced district rival, the Great Falls Central Mustangs. Belt was quick to start and outscored the Mustangs in the first two sets 25-20 and 25-12; however, the Huskies were outperformed and lost the third set 20-25. After a quick timeout, the girls came back and won the fourth set 25-16. Urick, Gliko, and Cooper combined for 6 aces and Gliko and Urick both added 2 blocks. Urick continued to be a threat for the Huskies and tallied 24 digs as well. Malek put down 19 kills. Pimperton came up with 40 assists and Belt advanced to the championship game.

Once again, Great Falls Central played their way back into the championship game. After their win over the Fort Benton Longhorns, the Mustangs came out strong and proved too much for the Huskies to handle. Though it was a five sets with scores of 22-25, 25-18, 29-27, 16-25, and 10-15. Pimperton set for 36 assists and fed Malek the ball for her 15 kills. Marquis notched 31 assists. Urick and passed 30 balls and Paulson blocked 3 potential kills. Urick and Gliko added 3 aces in the Huskies' loss.

Since Belt had been undefeated until the championship game, the loss required another game due to the tournament being doubleelimination. After a pep talk from

Coach Christine Gondiero, the Huskies claimed their seventh conin four matches. Central won the first match 17-25, but Belt came back and beat the Mustangs 25-12, 25-18, and 25-12. Pimperton supplied the Huskies with 6 aces and 40 assists. Malek led the team with 21 kills. Urick blocked 3 hits and Cooper dug 30 balls. The Huskies entered the state tournament as the number 1 seed from the North.

To kick off the Class C State Tournament Belt took on the Scobey Spartans. Belt capitalized on Scobey's lack of experience at the state level and demoted them to the loser out bracket in three quick sets. Belt won by scores of 25-19, 25-14, and 25-16. Cooper served 4 aces, Malek killed 13 balls, and Pimperton notched 34 assists. Urick offered 2 blocks and Cooper contributed 20 digs as the Huskies kicked off their state tournament.

After a first round victory, Belt faced the Gardiner Bruins. The girls had not defeated Gardiner in the state tournament in 4 years; however, this year the Huskies made a clean sweep 25-20, 25-16, and 25-20. Pimperton and Urick combined for 4 aces. Urick also added 18 kills, and Pimperton Cooper both recorded 1 block and Marquis gave 16 digs. The Huskies continued their undefeated state tournament run into the undefeated game.

Last year in the state championship, Belt played the Ennis Mustangs. This year, Belt saw

Ennis in the semi-finals. Ennis had beaten all their previous opponents in three matches and while they beat the Huskies, Belt did what no other team had done. The Huskies took Ennis to four matches. The Mustangs took the first two sets with matching scores of 17-25. Belt won the next one 25-22, but the team was unable to build off the set and fell in the fourth match 6-25. Pimperton served 2 aces and set for 28 assists. Malek notched 12 kills and Cooper offered 20 digs. The Huskies loss relegated them to the loser out bracket where they would face the Bruins one more time.

The Gardiner Bruins came out ready to play against the Huskies as the third place game began. The Huskies found themselves down 2-0 as Gardiner took the first two sets 22-25 and 24-26. The Huskies weren't ready for their sea-

son to end and battled back to win the game outscoring the Bruins in the last three sets 25-17, 25-16, and 15-9. Marquis added 4 assists for Belt and Gliko notched 5 blocks. Urick dove for 32

digs. Malek notched 20 kills and the win put the Huskies back in the championship game.

After last year's loss in the championship, Ennis was ready to claim a state title. Despite the Huskies best efforts, the Mustangs won in three sets with scores of 20-25, 18-25, and 19-25. Marquis and Cooper had 38 combined digs. Pimperton tallied 22 assists and 2 aces while Malek put away 12 kills as the Huskies concluded their season.



Belt's loss to Ennis in the championship game was a heart-breaker; however, the Huskies earned 2nd place at the state tournament which is something they can be proud of. 

OSHA instructor held a class here at Belt School's shop designed to improve awareness and preparedness for Belt High School students who are nearly working age. Students that participated in the class and passed the short test, will receive an OSHA ten hour certification card, which is good for life. This card assists in finding jobs, increases the chances of being hired by an employer, and increases the chance of pay raises. This opportunity is something that fourteen Belt High students took advantage of and received their ten hour cards.

OSHA is a nationwide agency of the United States Department of Labor, which investigates companies to ensure employers are providing a safe workplace. OSHA was established in 1970 under the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

Employers are responsible for providing a safe and healthy workplace for workers. These standards include having an unobstructed pathway to exits, providing proper equipment for the job, and "fitting the job to the worker, not the worker to the job".

Fines for violating OSHA standards start at \$7,000 for many

violation, and can exceed \$12,000 for the more serious violations. Some companies get multiple violations and end up with six figures or more in total fines.

Companies are all looking for employees that have taken an OSHA class, because such an employee can point of violations before OSHA inspects the company. Having this OSHA ten hour card almost guarantees your chance of being hired by any company.

Mr. Zuhoski has been bringing in OSHA certification personal for several years and strongly recommends that students take advantage of the opportunity.

His passion for bull riding moved on into bigger and better




Lunch Charge Changes!
