Red Boiling Springs School is centered upon the idea that the purpose of education is to prepare our students for the post-secondary world. Our goal is to provide students with the skills and experience to succeed in life after high school.

Macon County Schools are 100% accredited by AdvancED.

The Macon County School System has eight schools with a total population of approximately 3,700 students. All schools have a website that is maintained locally by a teacher or principal of the school. To see a list of all of the schools and a link to each school's website, five of our eight schools have a school-wide Title I program. Those schools are Westside Elementary School, Red Boiling Springs Elementary School, Fairlane Elementary School, Lafayette Elementary School, and Central Elementary School. Three schools participate in a voluntary Pre-K program. Those schools are Fairlane Elementary School, Red Boiling Springs Elementary School, and Westside Elementary School.

Macon County Schools has a Teacher Center open from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 8:00 a.mn. - 3:30 p.m. Friday. Please call before using the Teacher Center in order to intake sure it is available. Anyone who wants to use the Teacher Center *AFTER* 4:00 p.M Monday or Thursday must contact Emma McKinney at 615-666-2125 at least one day in advance.

Macon County Schools has a Technology Learning Center used to train teachers in the use of technology. The Technology Learning Center was originally funded by a Goals 2000 Grant written by Patricia Ferguson, The Technology Learning Center is open from 7:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 7:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Friday. Red Boiling Springs School Parent Involvement Plan

- I. The school system will have annual meetings with the Family Engagement Advisory Committee to review the Parent Involvement Policy and District Plan. The Advisory Committee will include parents from the district. The committee will review any surveys or comments from parents and the community in order to improve our existing policy and plan and promote more effective parent involvement.
- II. The Macon County School District will assist schools in planning and implementing parent-involvement activities.
- III. The Macon County School District as well as all schools will keep their website updated with important parent involvement issues. Each will have a link for parents to access important things relevant to their child's education.
- IV. The Macon County School District as well as the schools shall implement programs, activities, and training for the involvement of parents in all of its schools. Activities and/or strategies in the TCSPP, the District Consolidated Plan, or the School District Parent Involvement Plan have been put in place. These activities and strategies will also include the involvement of parents to help implement our Pre-K program as well as coordination with the Head Start Program.
- V. Each school will hold an Annual Open House at the beginning of each school year. This will give parents and family members an opportunity to visit their child's school and meet the teachers and principals.
- VI. Each school will hold Parent-Teacher Conferences twice per school year. When possible, the schools will have flexible times for the conferences to give all parent and family members an opportunity to attend. The conferences will be held when deficiencies are handed out or at the end of the first nine weeks of each semester.
- VII. The district and schools will work towards promoting family involvement within each school. Several activities should be put in place at each school. Trainings for parents to learn more about curriculum Restrict barriers for limited English proficient parents, economically disadvantaged, or disabled from participating in activities. Activities to promote academic improvement, good discipline, and increased attendance by all students. Other activities such as Read across America, BINGO for Books, Breakfast with Grandparents, Internet training for curriculum, bulletin boards at Wal-Mart, and Interpreting Test Scores for parents are good examples.
- VIII. Keep parents informed of various issues including Parent Involvement Policy. Parents' right to access their child's records. Board and school policies. Calendar of events for the district and individual schools
- IX. The Macon County School District shall provide funds for teachers to receive one extra day of in-service by conducting home visits with their students and parents. The teacher must follow the regulations set forth by the school district.

ZERO TOLERANCE OFFENSES

In order to ensure a safe and secure learning environment, the following offenses will not be tolerated:

WEAPONS & DANGEROUS INSTRUMENTS

Students shall not possess, handle, transmit, use or attempt to use any dangerous weapon in school buildings or on school grounds at any time, or in school vehicles and/or buses or off the school grounds at a school-sponsored activity, function or event. 1 Violators of this section shall be subject to suspension and/ or expulsion from school.

Firearms (as defined in 18 U.S.C. \$ 921) 2

In accordance with state law, any student who brings or possesses a firearm on school property shall be expelled for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year. The director of schools shall have the authority to modify this expulsion requirement on a case-by-case basis.3

DRUGS

In accordance with state law, any student who unlawfully possesses any drug including any controlled substance or legend drug shall be expelled for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year. The director of schools shall have the authority to modify this expulsion requirement on a case-by-case basis.

BATTERY

In accordance with state law, any student who commits battery upon any teacher, principal administrator, or any other employee of the school, or school resource officer shall be expelled for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year. The director of schools shall have the authority to modify this expulsion requirement on a case-by-case basis.4

NOTIFICATION

When it is determined that a student has violated this policy, the principal of the school shall notify the student's parent or guardian and the criminal justice or juvenile delinquency system as required by law.5

Students Leaving School Under no circumstances are students to leave the building or school property without permission.

- 1. Students will not be allowed to leave the school for any reason without verbal communication between the parent and the office,
 - A. Notes will only be accepted if there is a phone number where the parent can be reached.
 - B. If a parent is unreachable he/she should contact the school before the student may leave.
- 2. A student may not be picked up by someone other than his/her parent unless that parent has spoken to the office.
- 3. A student must sign out when leaving school for any reason.
 - A. Signing out does not give the student permission to leave.
 - B. A student cannot sign out unless he/she has permission from the principal.
 - C. The student must have a note or verbal communication from the principal.

Punishment for leaving without permission is at the discretion of the principal.

CAFETERIA POLICY

- 1. Meals are to be eaten in the cafeteria.
- 2. Students are to remain in the cafeteria during the assigned time.
- 3. Keep the cafeteria as clean and neat as possible.
- 4. Each student is responsible for what they bring to the cafeteria; do not leave trash lying around.
- 5. Be sure to return travs to the proper area.

HALL PASSES

Students must have a ball pass to be in the hall during class. If you are caught in the hall without a pass, you will be sent back to class.

INAPPROPRIATE PUBLIC DISPLAY OF AFFECTION

Visiting in secluded areas with arms around the other person, kissing, or any other public demonstration of affection between a boy and a girl through physical contact is forbidden at school.

First offense -Counseled by principal or guidance counselor.

Second Offense -Notification of parents—2 days BI.

Third offense -Suspension from school until a parent conference is beld.

STUDENT DRIVER POLICY

- 1. Student driving will be limited to secondary students who possess a valid Tennessee driver's license.
- 2. All students driving vehicles to school must register at the principal's office and obtain a parking permit.
- 3. Students will be required to park in designated areas.
- 4. Vehicles should be locked and are not to be moved during school hours unless approved by the principal.
- 5. Vehicles should be operated at a safe speed, not to exceed school zone speed limits.
- 6. No student or non-student is to sit in a vehicle from the time of arrival at school until the time of departure.
- 7. All vehicles are subject to search as provided by TCA 49-6_4206. The principal shall make provisions for controlling the use of the parking areas on school property. When students have been assigned a specific parking space, cars parked in unauthorized parking spaces shall be towed away at the owner's expense. Further, driving to school is not a right, it is a privilege. As such, the privilege to drive to school may be revoked at the principal's discretion.

*Parking space for student drivers is very limited. Spaces will be assigned by grade, beginning with Seniors, followed by Juniors; then, if any spaces are still available, Sophomores. The only exception shall be in the event of a hardship license.

** A learner's permit is not considered a valid license!

BEHAVIOR INTERVENTION

The maximum a student will be allowed to serve PER TERM in Behavior Intervention is 10 days. Any student exceeding the 10 days will be assigned 5 days' alternative school for each Behavior Intervention offense thereafter.

ALL OF THE ABOVE POLICIES APPLY DURING THE SCHOOL DAY, ON SCHOOL PROPERTY, ON THE SCHOOL BUSES, OR AT ANY SCHOOL-RELATED EVENT.

SAFE SCHOOL CHOICE

At Red Boiling Springs School, every measure is taken to ensure that each child is safe from harm. At any time, should your child become the victim of a violent crime at school, your child has the right to attend another grade-appropriate public school in the school district. For a full description of this policy developed by the State of Tennessee, please log onto the website for the Macon County School System at www.maconcountyschools.com and click on policies. A full description of the Tennessee Department of Education's Unsafe School Choice policy can be downloaded from this website. If you do not have Internet access available for you to view these policies, please contact the school and copies will be made available to you.

Parents will receive written notification that their child has the right to transfer to another school within the district if they are the victim of a violent crime at school.

Truancy Plan

According to T.C.A., 49-6-3007, a student who has been absent five (5) days with unexcused absences throughout the school year may be deemed habitually truant. A written notification of (5) unexcused absences will be sent to the parent/guardian that the child's attendance is required by law and a new notice will be sent after each successive accumulation of five (5) unexcused absences.

Tier 1: After 5 unexcused absences the student and parents will be required to meet with the school attendance committee to discuss reasons for student absences. Students and parents will be required to sign an attendance contract that includes attendance expectations, time periods, and interventions for continued absences.

Tier 2: After any additional unexcused absences the student and parents will be referred to the Truancy Board for a "Truancy Hearing." The Truancy Board will conduct an individualized assessment on the reasons the student has been absent from school. Team members will vary between schools, but will include as many of the following as possible; students, parents, administrators, counselors, teachers, attendance coordinators, graduation coaches, and attendance supervisors. Interventions for students who continue to be truant may include one or more of the following:

- Referral to the school's at-risk designee
- Referral to a school guidance counselor or social worker
- School-based community service.

Tier 3: After Tier 2 interventions, additional unexcused absences, and failure to respond to the interventions and recommendations of the Truancy Board, truant students will be required to attend before or after-school tutoring. If tier 3 is unsuccessful, the parent/guardian and student will be petitioned to court for "truancy."

Students shall dress and groom in a clean, neat, and modest manner so as not to distract or interfere with the operation of the school.

Macon County School Health Services

Dear parents/guardians,

School Health Services would like to remind parents of Macon County School children and also inform our new families of the county-wide school guidelines used for assessing sick children. It is our goal to keep the school environment as healthy as possible for all children.

A child will be sent home if he or she has:

- 1) a temperature of 100 degrees or higher
- 2) a rash/skin eruption, with or without drainage, of unknown origin
- 3) active vomiting or diarrhea
- 4) suspected contagious illness
- 5) a serious injury or appears obviously ill
- 6) head lice or nits
- 7) flea(s) or bedbug(s)

Please be aware that we encourage students to stay in class when possible. The nurses do not routinely notify parents of minor illness or injury.

Guidelines for parents to follow to avoid exposing other children to possibly contagious illness and to help prevent excessive clinic visits in school are as follows:

- 1) Children with a temperature above 100 degrees must be fever-free for 24 hours before returning to school. Please do not give your child a dose of fever medication and then send them to school.
- 2) Injuries that happen at home or over the weekend should be taken care of prior to returning to school.
- 3) A.) If a child vomits or has diarrhea during the night or in the morning before school, child should be kept at home for 24 hours from the last episode.
 - B.) If a child vomits or has diarrhea while at school, they must be picked up from school and cannot return until 24 hours after the last episode.
- 4) If a parent or guardian is called by the school nurse, please pick up your child in a timely manner. The nurse will only call home if she feels the child really needs to leave school.
- 5) Encourage your child to eat a nutritious breakfast and lunch as this prevents many stomachaches, headaches, poor concentration, and fatigue.
- 6) Encourage your child to get adequate rest.
- 7) Teach your child to wash their hands frequently-before and after meals, after using the bathroom, etc.
- 8) Children sent home due to head lice/nits must be checked by the nurse before returning to class. They must be brought back to school by a parent/guardian and **are not** to ride the bus until rechecked.

Parents will be notified if a child is seen frequently in the clinic with minor complaints of illness or injury that tend to be chronic and contributes to a lot of missed class time.

Please update your emergency card throughout the school year!

Often parents will have changes in work numbers, cell phone numbers, emergency contacts, etc. Valuable time is frequently spent by school nurses or office staff trying to locate a parent for a sick child.

We encourage that all medication be given at home, but for those children requiring medications in school, a Medication Consent Form must be completed. Over-the-counter medicines may be given with parent permission only for up to five days. Ongoing medications require a physician's order. Please make sure that the form is filled out completely. Medication that is to be given twice a day should be given before school and after school. Medication that is to be given three times a day should generally be given before school, after school and at bedtime.

***PER TN STATE GUIDELINES, WE DO NOT ADMINISTER DAILY ADHD

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL, THIS MUST BE GIVEN BY THE PARENT OR GUARDIAN
BEFORE SCHOOL.***

If your child complains of being sick in the morning, but does not have any symptoms, use your best judgment regarding sending them to school. Please do not tell your child that you will come to get them if they do not feel better or tell them to see the nurse as soon as they get to school. Do tell them to go to class and try to make it today. If they really are feeling sick, their teacher will send them to see the nurse.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation. If you have any questions, you may call the school where your child attends.
