

<u>Art</u> -





CLEAR Social Emotional Program:

Dr. Beth Cunningham is a Clinical Psychologist, from Florissa, that has been trained by CLEAR to provide Washington and Madison Schools a variety of Social Emotional supports throughout the school year and beyond. Dr. Cunningham will provide a one hour training with all Washington certified and non-certified staff on January 21st. Dr. Cunningham also will conduct consult sessions with staff on various students' issues on January 7th and 21st. This ongoing student/staff training, and consultation, will continue in February.

Upcoming Staff Trainings

My Math Training will occur January 15th and February 3rd during the District's School Improvement Days. The My Math series has been used by K-5 teachers for a number of years. Staff will learn about updates to this series and any technology improvements.
