For the 2019-20 school year, schools were identified using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67%. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

KEY CHALLENGES

Many challenges face our district at the middle school level when it comes to accelerating student achievement and closing the achievement gap. We are in a low socio-economic area, and our students deal with many outside factors that affect them as they enter our building. We believe it is very important to build relationships with our students and show them we truly care about their needs and their education. We also believe it is essential to create a positive culture in our building allowing students to be themselves and not feel threatened. The staff in the middle school is very committed in learning new research-based strategies to help guide them in instructing and assessing

their students. We want to show our students that learning can be fun. We provide student support after school to our students who are not getting their homework done on time.

To accelerate student achievement, we continue to look for creative ways to offer more advanced classes to our students. We use our assessments to drive instruction, and provide PD based on student data.

Manton Consolidated Schools has one school for grades 5-8; therefore, Manton Middle School is the only public school in which students may be assigned in the district.

Manton Middle School is in year three (3) of its current five year School Improvement Plan. In the next year, we will continue to work on our goals in the five core areas of reading, mathematics, science, social studies and writing, and adjusting our goals due to our current needs.

IDENTIFY THE NUMBER AND PERCENT OF STUDENTS REPRESENTED BY PARENTS AT PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Manton Middle School Parent-Teacher Conferences were conducted in October and February. The school schedules specific appointments for each parent in the fall. Spring

conferences are held with parents of students selected by teachers as needing a conference. In 2018-19, 283 or 95% of parents attended in the fall and 298 or 100% of parents attended at the spring conferences. In 2019-20, 276 or 95% of parents attended in the fall and 290 or 100% of parents attended at the spring conferences.

IN CONCLUSION

Manton Middle School continues to be proud of our academic excellence. Our staff works very hard to make sure the curriculum, instruction, and assessment align with the standards by using research-based best practices and making sure the Grade Level Content Expectations are taught.
