What you need to file the 2020-2021 FAFSA

GET YOUR FSA ID NOW!

- The FSA ID is the user name and password students will use to access all Federal Student Aid websites, including FAFSA.gov. It takes about 10 minutes to create an FSA ID. We strongly recommend creating FSA IDs ahead of time. For dependent students, at least one parent will also need to create an FSA ID to sign the FAFSA.
- To create and learn more about the FSA ID, go to FSAID.ed.gov. Keep track of your FSA ID information using FAME's FSA ID Information Tracking Sheet.

When Is Parent Information Required?

Students are considered dependent and required to provide parent information unless they can answer YES to one of the following questions:


- Were you born before January 1, 1997?
- As of today, are you married?
- graduate program? At the beginning of the 2020-21 school year, will you be working on a
- Are you currently serving on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces for purposes other than training, or are you a veteran of the U.S. Armed
- their support from you between July 1, 2020 and June 30, 2021? Do you have children or dependents who will receive more than half of

- At any time since you in foster care or were you a dependent or ward of the court? you turned ر ع were both your parents deceased, were
- As determined by a court in your state of legal residence, are were you an emancipated minor or in a legal guardianship? you or
- At any time on or after July 1, 2019, were you homeless or at risk of being homeless?



Dependent students are required to report parent information on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). For reporting purposes, "PARENT" means your legal (biological or adoptive) parent or stepparent, or a person that the state has determined to be your legal parent.

Use this guide to figure out which parent's information to include (depending on your family situation).

Report information on the FAFSA for the parent who provided more financial support over the past 12 months or in the last year you received support.

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Has this parent remarried?

You do not need to report additional parent information.
