




Dedication Makes A Good Athlete By McKinly Kyte


Apply For Scholar \$\$\$

On Dec. 2, scholarship packets became available to all seniors interested in applying. The packets included information about 38 different local scholarships accessible students to apply for. Scholarships are a great option for students planning to go to a college or vocational school in the upcoming school year by providing extra money to go towards secondary education plans. The amounts of the scholarships start at \$125 and reach a maximum of \$2,500. The recipients are chosen based upon various requirements set by the offering contributors. Requirements for the scholarships include a wide spectrum of information from work ethic, experiences and extracurricular activities to future plans after high school graduation, GPAs, test scores and your personal financial needs. The money from these scholarships is given from a variety of groups, businesses, memorials and clubs that are looking to help students wanting to continue their ed-

Once you have looked through the packet, you must mark the scholarships you are interested in and return this sheet back to the Guidance Office. Seniors must complete these steps in order to receive the complete details to apply in order to be eligible to receive the awards. Applications must be complete by March 20, 2020 to be considered for any of the local scholarships.

When discussing scholarships, senior Isabel Ward stated, "Scholarships make college more accessible and celebrate individual accomplishments in order to help with higher education." Although applying for scholarships may seem like a pain in the moment, they are extremely helpful in the college years of your life when many end up in debt.


