

If anyone is unsure of the scholarships available, information is available from Mr. Ron Pray or Ms. Lorna Squire in the Counselor's Office.


Trina Mykleby said, "The scholarships are a lot of hard work and a lot of writing but hopefully all of the work will pay off in the end."

If you walk down the second floor hall during first or seventh hour, don't be alarmed if you see students doing things out of the ordinary.

Students have recently been busy building toothpick bridges. They were given one box of toothpicks, one bottle of Elmer's glue and three weeks to finish the project.

On Monday, Dec. 4, the bridges were tested. Mrs. Rose Emanuel placed a dowel with a bucket attached, to the bridge's road bed. After the dowel was placed on the road bed weights were then put in the buckets to see how much weight they could hold. The bridge had to have a road bed a minimum of three centimeters wide, to travel on, and had to have supports on the bottom of the bridge thirty centimeters apart. Jeremy VanDeest and Charlie Steger took the extra credit points. Their bridge held 98 pounds and also broke the rope on Emanuel's bucket. They set a record with their bridge.

This is only one of the labs the physics class has experienced. Students took part in a skateboard lab. They divided into four groups and were able to pick out one skateboard. One student sat or stood up on the skateboard, while another student pulled the skateboard to a specific weight for ten centimeters with a spring scale. After the student reached ten centimeters the one who was pulling let go of the spring scale and the other two measured how long it took the skateboarder to stop.



When the speedometer hit 10 mph Brent honked the horn and coasted to a final stop. Each team then took a turn riding in the back of the truck while the other team pushed.

Ten straws and twenty centimeters of masking tape made up another lab. Students divided into groups of two and were told to build a straw structure that would hold their physic book. Narissa Stahl and Angela Sukstorf received the extra credit because theirs was the tallest. Austin McNall came in directly behind taking second place.

Recently the students were given 50 straws and 30 cm of tape. In this experiment students were to construct an object that held a raw egg. The students took their designs into gym #2 and tested them to see how strong they really were. The winner received extra credit points.






