The Symphonic and Jazz Bands presented their Winter Concert Jan. 15, in the auditorium. The Symphonic Band kickedit off playing five songs and the Jazz Band closed it out playing four songs.

The first piece of music played was *Blue Ridge Saga*, which was written by James Swearingen. This piece was originally commissioned by the Northwestern District Bandmasters Association and dedicated to the 1989-90 AA District Junior High School Band in Morganton, North Carolina. All of the different

patterns and rhythms are repeated throughout this piece. It starts with a very slow sustained sound and then goes into a bright march style section. Krissi Sack was the trumpet soloist of this song. There were a few variations in between, with the song returning to the same themes. It ends with a slow sustained sound.

Encanto was played after Blue Ridge Saga. Encanto begins with a brassy and stately opening. The full band enters and, like Blue Ridge, it goes through repetitions and

variations. Sack also had a trumpet solo in this song. The end is almost exactly like the beginning but has a presto ending

A doxology is defined as form of praise to God. Doxology was the next piece was played. The three doxologies played were "Duke Street," "Lasst Uns Erfreun" and "Old Hundredth." As in past concerts with conductor Mr. Pat Jones, a Disney tune was played. Which was Colors of the Wind from the movie "Pocahontas." The song featured Krystal Erdmann with a

flute solo and Kristy Eastman in an alto saxophone solo.

Dixieland Bash was the last song played. It featured a Dixie combo that featured Sack on trumpet, Amber Volner on clarinet, Josh Robinson on trombone and Beth Slaughter and Cass Novotny on percussion.

The Jazz Band started their set with a tune arranged by Larry Norred, Wipe Out. It featured Jaron Cockrum as the percussion soloist. I Will Follow Him, a religious tune,

This question was often asked while walking to class each day. OSE is a developing program, that is currently offered to seniors in Mr. Larry Nelson's Practical Composition class.

The intent of OSE is to encourage students to commit themselves to a career field by evaluating their interests, abilities, and achievement

The students had to spend eight hours in that career field. When they went to work at the business they had to work a total of eight hours.

During the second semester of this class students evaluated interest aptitude and achievement tests that they had taken in the past. Students tried to decide what they would like to do with their life in the future.

Many students had changed their minds from what they were interested in as a fresh-

"Have you completed your man. Some students thought about fields of medicine and now are thinking about teaching or something else they like.

After you sort of made up your mind, you had to tell Nelson what you had decided to do. He tried to match job interests almost perfectly to a business, trade or profession around the area.

During class time students worked on making our resumes, cover letters and filled out a training agreement.

They worked on this for a few days to make sure that everything sounded profes-

After Nelson checked the packets over, students had to send it to the business that he had chosen to match the students interests.

Many businesses did not respond right away so people had to make telephone calls to remind them that they needed the training agreement signed and dated before they could do their On-Site-Experience.

After receiving the training

agreement in the mail the students then had to call the company they had chosen and set up a time to work.

It was a challenge to get a time set up because some of the businesses are only open on the weekdays and if you wanted to work that meant you had to miss school that day. If your parents excused you, there was no problem at

"The cooperation of local businesses, agencies, trades, and professions contributed greatly to the success of this program," stated Nelson.




