


In addition to being so loyal, Walt has been the custodian of the Hubbard Elementary School for the past 13 years, after previously farming.




The Class with "CLASS"





The "BIG DOGS"


The Seniors had one commitment that was even greater than that of "excellence", that of "fun". This year's class had the capability of creating their own enjoyment, wherever they went.



They knew the taste of the playoffs from the '83 season, finishing 10-1. and they wanted it again. They started the season in the heat of fall, not knowing they would finish the year in the snow of winter. The Pirates practiced hard, tuning themselves, knowing it would all pay off. The Pirates proved their worth



Emerson-Hubbard then rolled over its next two conference opponents, Laurel and Ponca, but the team had to be content with a co-championship after bowing to Osmond, a disappointing first loss. E-H must now win their final game to make the playoffs in the tough C-1 class. They did win, convincingly, using a swarming defense in the second half.


E-H made the playoffs, drawing Wisner-Pilger at home. But the Pirate future looked dim trailing at half time and going into the fourth quarter, 11-0. They, then, excited the crowd. Scoring two quick touchdowns and then holding off the Gators in the final minutes. E-H, then, had to travel to Lyons-Decatur to play under the adverse conditions of snow and cold. Turnovers proved costly for the Pirates, falling to the ranked Cougars 18-7. E-H ended the season at 9-2, receiving the district trophy for their win in the playoffs, another respected season.

Sport Support









Pirates Never Quit


After the successful football season, basketball was expected to be more of the same. With four returning starters and the winning attitude carrying over, the Pirates were expected to take the season by storm.

Lady Pirate Tracksters Molded Themselves






grade and a few others like in the 7th grade.










Next was Mr. Thieman with his Outstanding Senior Award in art going to Theresa Merical.




On December 19th the annual Christmas Concert was where the Concert and Jazz Bands made their first appearance of the season.

FFA Sets New Pace











The year-end wrap-up of events in Emerson for 1985 and 1986 begins in July with a proposal to remove the Emerson viaduct. The proposal included the removal of the current viaduct, and the building of an urban roadway to replace it. In college basketball, the Louisville Cardinals defeated the Duke Bluedevils for the NCAA basketball championship.


In early 1986, the space shuttle *Challenger* exploded in midair, killing all seven of the crew members, one of whom was a teacher who volunteered to ride in the craft.


