

Once Pollock was older, he studied under Thomas Hart Senton for a while before Pollock's path led him to discover abstract expressionism. The artist took paint and splattered or poured it on to the canvases, which commonly expressed (his) emotions. During the Great Depression era, Pollock found work in President Franklin D. Roosevelt's

Works of Art Project (PWAP.) Even though Pollock had plenty of work to keep him occupied, he still had an issue with drinking. Despite his problems, he still tried to make time for his art, especially after being inspired by Picasso. Pollock's most famous paintings started to appear around 1947-1950. Yet, by 1956, Pollock gave up art. He passed away on August 11, 1956 due to a car accident.*



CHOCOLATE DROP COOKIES

Cookies:

2 cups brown sugar

1 cup butter

2 eggs

8 Tbs. cocoa powder

1 cup sour milk (1 tablespoon of vinegar or lemon juice and add milk to make 1 cup)

1 tsp. baking soda

3 cups flour

1 tsp. vanilla

Frosting:

1/2 cup butter 3Tbs. cocoa powder 1/4 cup milk

3 1/2 cups powdered sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix all cookie ingredients and drop by tablespoons onto a greased baking sheet. Bake 8 minutes. Frost the cookies while warm.

To make the frosting: Mix together ½ cup of butter, 3 Tbs. cocoa powder and a ¼ cup of milk. Boil, then remove from heat and add 3 ½ cups powdered sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Enjoy.
