^ \$1.05B generated by 112 districts that have passed Mill Levy Overrides. Of the dollars generated, 18 districts generated 85.3% (\$896.2M) of the revenues. They include Academy, Adams 12, Aurora, Boulder, Cherry Creek, Colorado Springs, Denver, Douglas, Durango, Eagle, Falcon, Jeffco, Littleton, Mesa Valley, Poudre, Roaring Fork, St. Vrain, and Thompson. The remaining 94 districts generated 14.7% (\$153.9M) of the Mill Levy Override dollars. 66 districts have no Mill Levy Override.
