Happy Holidays! As the new year begins, we see this as the ideal opportunity to check in with students, staff, and families to ensure that our learners are on track, prepared, and ready to go for the second-half of the year! When looking back to the beginning of the year, we have much to be proud of! At the high school, students are underway with 'owning their learning' through rigorous programs and a wide variety of content. Extended Learning Opportunities (ELOs), Inquiry Based Units, Spartan Steam Innovation Academy, and the Learning Commons have been a focus of their work.

The elementary schools are working on aligning the Wellness Centers and interventions for academics and social emotional learning. These interventions are referred to as Tier II and Tier III supports. Meanwhile, Tier I interventions are strategies used universally in all classrooms. The elementary schools are also crafting District –wide literacy and math curriculum documents, guides, and assessments.

Lancaster School has focused on establishing a positive school climate and school experience through various student-led events, theme weeks, and opportunities to be part of a club or team. We are continuing the framework of being a STARR student through assemblies, recognition programs and positive reminders throughout the building. Being a STARR student means being Safe, Tolerant, A Team Player, Responsible, and Respectful in all areas of their lives. Our counselors have established a regular meeting with student groups to discuss current realities in their lives and possible ways to respond and grow from the challenges of being a child in this rapidly changing digital world.

During our fall professional development days, the Lancaster School staff has focused on a number of educational, instructional, and social/emotional learning programs and initiatives. Some of the highlights from these sessions include a collaborative event with the leaders of Inquiry Based Learning at White Mountains Regional High School, Daily 5 and CAFE learning framework, best practices in student consequences in response to behaviors and using data to inform instruction.

As a school, we have made a pledge to increase our levels of communication and celebrate the positive in our daily routines. We have revived the school Facebook page (@Lancasterelementary), created a Twitter feed (@Lancasterk8nh), use riddles on our school sign to engage families around a fun topic, and compose weekly newsletters. We are working towards a live, common calendar that all events can be shared with our families. If you have an idea on how we can increase the amount of communication with parents, please feel to reach out to us at the school.

Our school continues to develop social-emotional learning models that support our students and their needs as human beings. This fall, we changed the Student Support Center over to the Wellness Center model, similar to Whitefield School. Our aim is to provide students with an area that they can reflect on their current mood/behaviors, to then find and use methods to decompress, de-stress, and then return to a learning mindset. The goal is to provide students the tools to self-regulate, so they can ensure they are ready and able to learn when they are in the classroom.

Principal's Message, Whitefield Elementary School

SAU 36 offers a wide variety of information and communication options so that parents, guardians and community members can stay up to date. Whether it is PowerSchool to monitor student grades, the website and social media to stay up to date with events, or Alert phone calls and batch emails ,we are deeply immersed in technology as our front line communication method. These are convenient and timely, but very much one way messages "pushed" out that don't allow for interactions.

Two opportunities exist that are based in mutual, two-way conversation and build those important parent/teacher connections. The first is during the fall Parent-Teacher Conferences. This is a prime opportunity to engage in one-to-one conversation with your child's teacher about who they are, and what your thoughts, questions and concerns might be. We hold a second round in the spring to review the school year, but the power of the fall conference to establish that relationship cannot be denied. During the year parents and guardians are always welcome to request a conference to monitor progress, share information, or troubleshoot a situation, so it's never too late to start.

A second opportunity is something that Mr. Cronin and Mrs. Plumley have found very beneficial; The Round Table discussion. We welcome families to come in and sit at Mr. Cronin's round table so that we can learn about your child and family. Traditionally, the visit to the Principal's Office was driven by something that went wrong. These Round Table discussions are driven by early relationship building and knowledge acquisition so as to develop a proactive partnership. The process is "old school"; parents or guardians come in and we get to know each other through face to face conversation around the table. The round table is absolutely symbolic and intentional; there is no head of the table and everyone who sits at the table has equal status. During the visit we may start by asking you to tell us about your child and we listen to the story. Inevitably, the process quickly develops into a mutual conversation and a relationship and partnership begins to build. We walk away having a deeper understanding of students, family strengths; and sometimes challenges, and we hope families walk away with a new partner in their journey.

As the 2019-2020 SY is in full swing at White Mountains Regional, we continue to see a variety of educational leaps being taken, new initiatives being rolled out, and students attending a school where they regard the building as a place where adults genuinely care about their well being and day to day lives. As I reflect on the fall, I'm grateful to be the leader of a community that works with intentionality and integrity. I see teachers doing more for more kids and I see students reaping the benefits from this type of educational environment. As stated in my last message, we continue to ask ourselves: **How do we keep our faculty and students on course as they navigate the evolution of White Mountains Regional High School?** At this point in the year, we see students "checking out" and anticipating the winter holiday. Work ethic can begin to wane as the first semester draws to a close with the anticipation of a two week break from academics. However, I am pleased to see both faculty and students and students staying the course in their efforts through strong relationships and student accountability.

On November 19th, over 200 students presented their work at Spartan Exhibition Night. Presentations ranged from passion projects about career exploration to jazz piano performances. Students engaged in focused dialogues with faculty, family, and visitors about their work and shared their "why" or underlying reason for coming to school. Highlights of the evening included grilled cheese and tomato soup made and served by Culinary Arts and a student produced robot in the Media Center. I was proud to see students engaging in real intellectual work in a professional setting and sharing their motivations, dreams, and talents with the outside community.

On December 8th, White Mountains was visited by University of New Hampshire President James Dean along with four current students. Dean spoke about the multitude of opportunities at the university and high schoolers heard first hand accounts of college life and experiences. The hour long school-wide assembly was preceded by Spartan Spotlight, where we are wrapping up the last of our promises: a new tradition started this year where each and every staff member "walks-up" onto the stage to a song of their choice to make a promise to the entire student body. This activity has been met with much enthusiasm and has covered emotions from tears to laughter and artists from Rhianna to Pentatonix.

In the building, some exciting developments: chemistry is moving towards competency based grading in an effort to focus more on skills rather then arbitrary numerical values. MS continues to bridge the gap between science and math and will engage in an exploration of viruses culminating in a schoolwide survey about vaccinations. AP Spanish is examining perceptions of reality through the magical realism of Gabriel Garica Marquez. STEAM is studying the factors that can contribute to economic inequalities such as disabilities or drug addiction in conjunction with a close look at the current candidates' economic platforms which will culminate in student campaign videos. In computer graphics, students are learning to use Adobe Photoshop to create digital matte paintings, which is a technique used in everything from film to video game design. In 3D design, students are using Autodesk Maya (Computer Aided Design & Animation Program) to conceptualize and create sci-fi inspired exploration vehicles. Students will then use the program to create a short 3D animation. In advanced Drawing and Painting, students are finishing up portraits for children in Pakistan as part of the nonprofit Memory Project Organization. Studio in Fine Art are working on anatomical study drawings of muscle structures.

Starting in January, the class of 2021 will be receiving more focused SAT preparation. Students will work in small groups focused specifically on their area of need in math and language. We continue to focus on raising student SAT scores by an average of 20 points per student. While we acknowledge this is an ambitious goal, I am confident in knowing we have the tools and faculty to help students perform more successfully on the SATs.

Looking ahead to the spring, White Mountains plans to host an in house World Travel Day where students attend presentations by faculty about the potential benefits of travel and the ways to make travel accessible and affordable to all.

I continue to be satisfied by the progress we are making, but also driven to continue our efforts. With plans for a renovation evolving and a continued relationship with Education Resources Consortium and the Barr Foundation, I am hopeful that we will find ourselves working in an even more innovative and progressive school community. It is an exciting time at WMRHS.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment


Since joining SAU 36 in early November as the Director of Curriculum, Instruction, Assessment, and Federal Grants, I have been spending quite a bit of time in the three

schools to become familiar with the people who are working to teach our students and those who support learning through a variety of roles. Certainly, having lived and worked nearby the past three years has afforded me the opportunity to be aware of the innovation that SAU 36 is known for, but getting a chance to work with the people who make it all happen has been a great experience.

While I've been fortunate to spend a good deal of time meeting with teachers and getting into some classrooms, I've also met regularly with our team of Teacher Leaders, the Superintendent, the Building Principals, and other Administrators along with the Curriculum Committees to understand how our curriculum and programs can be made even better to support the work of teachers in the education of our students. The Strategic Plan and the Blueprint for Tomorrow speak to the expectations for our students to experience equitable access to learning experiences through an aligned curriculum. With this in mind, my focus in the weeks ahead will include the areas below:

- Improving access to the curriculum by collaborating with teachers to build on the work that has already been done to provide an aligned and articulated curriculum Pre-K to Grade 8 in the areas of Math and English Language Arts. Work in other curricular areas and levels will follow. What students should know and/or be able to do at each quarter of the school year is central to this work.
- Improve access for parents to see how their children are being assessed in their learning and to track their progress. Our work here will be to identify assessments already being used and to develop new assessments that can be utilized to monitor student progress, achievement, and success and to make this readily available and accessible.
- Support the work of teachers and support staff to ensure all students are both supported and challenged. Ongoing assessment of student learning reveals some students need more time and help while others need additional challenges through a tiered model in which sometimes consists of students participating in targeted, small group instruction or individualized exploration and learning experiences. Personalization of learning ensures each student gets what he or she needs to fully realize his or her potential. There are some excellent programs in place to help all students become successful, and working together to ensure these programs become fully institutionalized into the culture of the District will be important going forward.

There is a good deal of other work that is ongoing as part of my duties, but the three areas above are where most of my time will be spent this year as I continue to learn from and collaborate with the people of SAU 36 who are so important to the success of our students.

At the District level, you can find the school year calendar (which is revised for every snow day), start of year documents and forms, PowerSchool links, lunch menus, event calendars, athletics sign ups, job openings, school board meeting dates, agendas, and minutes, and lots more on the website – **www.sau36.org**. At the bottom of the page, you can find links to our Facebook page, Twitter account, YouTube channel, and shortcuts to download the mobile app on both Android and Apple. Every school board meeting plus the deliberative sessions and budget hearings are broadcast live on YouTube plus all past broadcasts are available to stream 24/7. Simply click the link on the bottom of the website. You can subscribe to get notifications when live broadcasts start too, so you'll never miss a meeting.


Renovation Project Update



As many community members may have already heard, White Mountains Regional School District has been working diligently over the past three years to develop a renovation plan for the high school. Members of the high school staff have spent the past three months meeting with town select boards, business owners, and members of the educational community to begin marketing and providing information about the renovation

plan. As mentioned, the renovation process began about three years ago when the school district was informed that the Career and Technical Education (CTE) center was back at the top of the New Hampshire funding list.

School administrators knew it was an opportunity to take advantage of the state's funding; but, also knew that there were other areas of the building that need to be addressed. First, and foremost, the school district felt a need to examine the safety and security of White Mountains Regional High School. Through careful examination of the current facility and input from local police departments, the focus of the renovation is the relocation of the main entrance. By relocating the front entrance, school personnel would have better sight lines to the parking lots, entry road, and visitor approaches to the building. Additionally, the relocation of the main entrance and culinary arts allows for the creation of a public entrance to the dining room, without the need for dining visitors to enter the entire building.

Renovation Project Update

Relocating the main entrance and culinary arts provides an opportunity to address inadequacies in the health center and create a space to enhance special education services for our students. Currently, the health center is undersized and does not have an ADA compliant restroom. The renovation plan calls for the development of a bathroom that is ADA compliant and increased patient areas that provide more privacy for school community members who access the health care center. The special education area is designed to create areas that will allow our staff to work with students to achieve the goal of making students as independent as possible when they leave WMRHS. A kitchen and separate laundry area are included in the design so students can learn skills about independent living.


The renovation plan also includes plans to address ADA compliance issues within our JROTC program and the main bathrooms by cafeteria. Currently, the only way into the JROTC classroom area is down a set of stairs, which does not meet ADA requirements. Additionally, the main bathrooms do not have the clearance space needed for wheelchairs to access. The proposed plan includes two ADA compliant bathrooms and single-use bathrooms.



The welding and fabrication receives considerable renovations to address aging ventilation systems and concerns around the ability to provide adequate supervision. Welding booths are moved to the outside wall and windows are added to the wall between the lab and classroom, allowing clear sight lines for proper student supervision. Moving the welders to the outside wall also opens up the floor plan for mobile tables and equipment

to be upgraded and allows for more flexible space with fabrication projects.

An area that was brought up for consideration by the CTE program advisory committees, as well as several third-party assessors, is the current state of the locker rooms. he current locker rooms are used by CTE programs, physical education classes, and many of our athletic teams. The locker rooms have not been renovated in the existence of the original WMRHS building. There is a need to renovate the locker rooms to address the aging mechanical systems and to create a better floor plan, which allows the space to be better utilized. The plan calls for two changing spaces that will be primarily used by CTE during the day and updated locker rooms for physical education classes. After school, the CTE changing spaces can be used to accommodate additional athletic teams so our teams don't have to use classrooms as locker rooms on game nights.



Other areas of the building include renovating the agricultural, cybersecurity/networking, and criminal justice classrooms to better prepare students in a setting that closely mirrors industry settings. The old culinary arts space becomes a multi-purpose space that fits the needs of many programs at WMRHS and in CTE. The space will house a fitness area, which is heavily used by our physical education classes, JROTC, criminal justice, and athletics. Furthermore, the space is flexible in that it can be used for qualification components of the JROTC program, as well as a large collaborative setting for larger groups to work on projects. Through the reorganization of classrooms and other spaces, areas of the hall are opened up to provide more space for student collaboration centers. Finally, all spaces involved in the renovation will have all asbestos abated and all mechanical systems will be upgraded to meet current needs.

The WMRHS renovation project will go to vote on March 10, 2020, and will be the second article on the school district ballot. During January and February, there will be many public forums for community members to learn more about the project and the impact it will have. 


Wellness Center



Lancaster Elementary School is excited to announce that they've recently created a new Wellness Center! This center offers students self regulation skills, social/emotional support, and academic support. Their philosophy is to promote physical and behavioral health, provide access to resources, and develop social, physical, and emotional support programs to create a safe, positive, and engaging learning environment. The Wellness Center offers various stations, which allow students 10 -15 min to de-escalate and/or to focus on getting their minds and bodies ready to return to class. The Wellness Center is open to all students in grades Pre-K through 8. Their goal is to have students transfer their regulation strategies from the Wellness Center to their classrooms.

Mr. Eaton's TSA meets on Thursdays from 3-4pm at Lancaster Elementary School. Students are still welcome to join. They currently have a membership of 25 students participating this

year. Students have been working on Balsa Wood Gliders, VEX robotics, Solar Cars, and Balsa Wood Bridges so far this year. They teamed up with the Whitefield TSA and went on the NH TSA Fall Rally at Camp Cody in Freedom NH, along with other TSA teams from around the state. The students

were put into mixed groups where they learned about events that TSA offers, took part in some team building exercises, and worked on STEM events such as flight, problem solving, and more. They're now preparing for the NH TSA Spring Conference where they will compete at Waterville Valley (March 26th 27th) against other TSA teams from around the state

AMC Leadership Unified

AMC Leadership is a class that teaches students about Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and the 5 Pillars of Leadership, an AMC designed program. These concepts are taught through journaling, communication based games, and hiking in the wilderness. Throughout this quarter long class, students hike local trails, learn/perform trail maintenance on the school trail, experience overnight hiking trips, and learn about improving themselves in the areas of SEL and Leadership.

The trailwork that students actively work on throughout the year includes the creation of bog bridges, clearing out overgrown areas, collection of trash, and basic maintenance of trails located on the WES campus.

Along with these learning experiences, students also work on documenting all of their work with a GoPro camera. This footage is then used to complete a capstone project to the class - a student made documentary tracking their experiences and growth throughout their collective journey. The first group's documentary from the 2018-2019 school year has been completed and will be publicly viewed on January 15th, 2020 at WES.

Students have been utilizing their leadership based skills that have been the core learning objective to their AMC Leadership Unified and have excelled at giving back to their community by practicing the principles of leadership and maintaining a public trail. During the course of this class, students worked alongside their AMC leadership educators (Killian Sump and Allie Campbell) and their WMRSD leaders (Aaron Giragosian and Jason Lantz).




