A Message from Dr. Anastasia Superintendent of Schools

Welcome to the WMRSD 2019-2020 school year!

We've been working on major District projects this fall including the Strategic Plan updates, the Blueprint for Tomorrow Recommendations to the Board, and the continuation of the CTE/WMRHS renovation plans.

The Strategic Plan updates are underway; the sub committee needs a few more meetings to finalize the 2019-2020 action plan. This will be posted on our website promptly thereafter! We continue to focus on our 5 main pillars: Structure and Finance; District Culture; Communication; Educational Mission; and Leadership.

The Blueprint for Tomorrow Steering Committee completed their study and made recommendations to the Board at the September 23, 2019 School Board Meeting. The Steering Committee's recommendations will be considered by the board during upcoming Board meetings. None of the recommendations have been adopted at this point in time; we will inform the public and staff if any of the recommendations will be considered for further action. You can find information about the 7 month project on our website! The recommendations are:

- 1. Consider bringing 7th and 8th grades to the HS
- 2. Ensure consistent programming and opportunities at WES and LES
- 3. Reduce the number of sports (evaluation of enrollment and qualified people who can run the programs, cost of transportation, etc);
 Investigate Athletic programs (Divisions)
- 4. Development of curriculum to provide hands on, relevant, real life learning opportunities
- 5. Increase preparedness for college and career (includes-advisories, ELOs, seminars, online courses, etc., and push down to middle- level grades)
- 6. Consistent SEL across the District and continue efforts for sustainability
- 7. Expand the pre-k programming

The FY '21 budget season is beginning this month. We use the Strategic Plan Goals as our guide for the budget priorities. We continue to plan with fiscal responsibility to the communities, with our learners' needs first and foremost.

Mr. Scott and Mr. Berry have been traveling to Selectmen meetings to begin to share the CTE/WMRHS renovation plans and process to receive feedback. They will broaden this networking to the community in the upcoming months!

The Futures Department Enjoyed a Great Summer and Freshmen Orientation Week!



The Futures Summer Camp had a total of 91 campers who attended at least one camp, which is an increase of 18% from the 2018 camp season. The program had a total of 225 camper weeks (over the four week camp season), which is an increase of 22% from 2018.

The WMRHS staff offered 16 individual camps with assistance from the SAU 36 school district and GEAR UP grant. The Futures Camp mission is to: introduce middle school students to a variety of career pathways, stoke their passions, and create a positive and fun learning environment.

What makes this program unique is that SAU 36 is able to provide transportation, snacks, lunch, educational supplies, and more for little to no cost for families.













AMC CLASS OF 2023 FRESHMEN ORIENTATION WEEK

The White Mountains 9th grade transition team just finished its 11th year of programming. The transition team believes this could have been the best yet! With the creation and implementation of Link Crew (a nationally recognized high school orientation program) on September 3rd and the AMC freshmen overnight on September 9th and 10th, the Class of 2023 is off to a great start!

We received student feedback from 55 ninth graders from their first week of high school. The results were tremendous.

The programming was educational and fun at the AMC - 91% answered with a 4 or 5


How was the food and accommodations for this event? - 87% answered with a 4 or 5

White Mountains Regional High School has implemented the "Spartans Learning Commons" for the 2019-2020 school year. The learning space and "Learning Commons" staff occupy rooms 116, 117, and 118. There are six staff members who currently work in different roles to provide Title I services, on-line learning, VLACS, internships, work-based learning, PSAT and SAT preparation, and directed study skills to over 200 students.





The Learning Commons is a blending of services which are open to all students. You will find students receiving additional support in subjects from math to English and working to meet their ELO requirements. Students also come to the Commons to work together on projects or as a study team. The Learning Commons' overall goal is to develop a common location for all students to work together and eliminate the stigma that NOT all can learn.



- Special Education Service Delivery
- Identification Rates
- Effective Practices within Special Education

WMRSD System of Care

The System of Care office had a very busy summer supporting our (SEL) social and emotional learning work both through local and national efforts. Our SEL strategic steering committee met this summer to continue work on CASEL's (Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning) five core SEL competencies and standards for our school district. SOC office staff, along with North Country partners, presented in Nashville, TN on the benefits of rural partnerships (inclusive of SAU 36) supporting regional efforts around social and emotional learning. Everyday SEL books were purchased for all classroom staff members at WES and LES and were disseminated to administration teams this summer and will be one of many tools used to support our work and creating SEL supportive environments. WMRHS was also presented Everyday SEL books for those staff interested in this tool to support SEL efforts and equally our SOC office is happy to provide financial support for our new freshman transition program, Link Crew, including t-shirts and accessories as we begin the 2019-20 school year. Lastly, SEL themed children's/student books will be presented to our school libraries on behalf of our System of Care office as we begin to integrate this work throughout our schools.

Additionally this summer, our System of Care work plan was also reviewed by a subgroup of our community management team (CMT), where we identified many met goals and objectives to date, and prioritized those that will remain in the last year of this grant period. The System of Care mission continues to support family and community engagement activities that expand awareness and education around behavioral health and wellness. This summer we hosted two successful family and community events supporting this mission. Ivy Watts, former NCAA top female athlete presented to over 100 North Country student-athletes, coaches, parents, and athletic directors on the topic of mental health and wellness. Equally, our office hosted an event at the Weathervane Theater offering free tickets to the Patchwork Players production of "Families are Like Fudge" along with free popcorn, snowcones, and over 50 backpacks filled with school supplies were given out free of charge to families in need.

Information Technology Updates

WMRSD - Welcome Back - Information Technology Updates

Even though there are not as many students in the buildings, summer is a very busy time in the White Mountains Regional School District. The maintenance staff cleans the buildings, many projects take place, and educational leaders prepare for the new school year. In addition, our Information Technology Department does system updates, installs new technology, replaces outdated technology, organizes Chromebooks for students, updates teacher laptops, and much more. This article will outline some of the summer IT accomplishments.

The summer started out by collecting student and staff devices. Student Chromebooks were collected during the last few days of school. The IT department checked the condition of the device and cleaned them with disinfectant wipes. This year, we reassigned the outgoing senior Chromebooks to incoming 6th grade students as part of our grade 6-12 one to one device initiative. The Chromebooks were updated in inventory, re-labeled, and placed back in cases for the start of the school year. Teacher laptops were also cleaned with disinfectant wipes. They went through an imaging process that puts a software image on them with the latest security and software updates. Laptops of teachers who are leaving the District are reassigned to new teachers.

This year we added or replaced 60 security cameras throughout the District. These cameras allow for greater quality for building administration and resource officer use. The District is committed to maintaining safe and secure schools with door access controls and 120 total security cameras.

The phone server at WMRHS was old and had many issues last year. During the summer we replaced it with a modern phone system that allows for greater functionality and reliability. Another big upgrade at WMRHS was the audio/video project in the auditorium. The auditorium had a great makeover this summer with new chairs, stage lighting, flooring, and an upgraded audio/video system. The new system is run from a touch screen panel that lowers the new wide screen and allows presenters to interface with the system. Included are new wireless microphones, a blu ray player, and screencast abilities. The Bose speakers are designed so wherever you sit in the auditorium the sound is uniform.

In eleven of our classrooms we upgraded interactive projectors with 75" Promethean active panel displays. These panels have an onboard android based operating system and feature ten points of interactive touch. We are evaluating these units throughout the year, and if the feedback is good, we plan to replace more projectors in the coming years with this newer technology.

There were many other nuts and bolts type items such as new network switches, server upgrades, uninterruptible power supply unit installations, and much more that went into our typical summer work.

In closing, we are thankful for the support of District Administration, School Board Members, and Taxpayers, as we work to integrate technology into the learning environment. The WMRSD IT Department is dedicated to making sure students and staff are provided with adequate technology, support, and professional development to help engage learners through the use of technology.


Brooke Dubreuil is a **Paraprofessional** at the Whitefield Elementary School. She has worked in the district and primarily in WES since


