I started out teaching tumbling and realized that I really enjoyed working with kids. I taught physical education for many years before I switched to science.

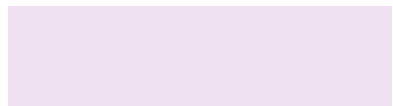
9. How long have you been teaching?

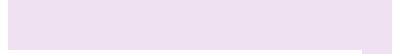
1. *What is it like being student of the month?* It isn't much different than before I was. Everything pretty much stayed the same.

6. *What's your favorite color?* Purple.



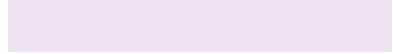

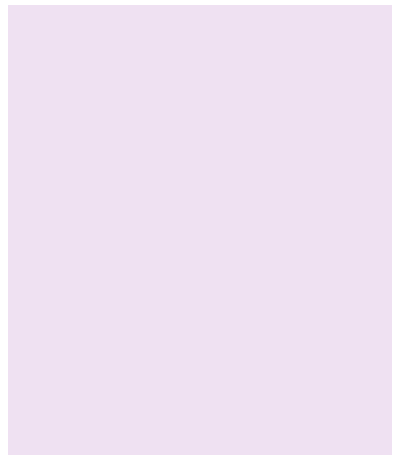

Since the inauguration is such an important event there is always security, but this year due to the reascent raid of the White House there was more security than other Inaugurations. They have many guards watching to make sure that no one tries to harm the president. PSAT Testing

By 8th grade each student will take the PSAT Test helping you get ready for taking the PSAT Test in 10th and 11th grade. The difference between the PSAT Test that you take in 8th or 9th grade now compared to other times is that this one has a lower scoring and there will be no scholarship associated with it. Highschool teachers use the PSAT Test scores to determine what classes you will be taking and how high leveled the classes you will be taking are. They don't look at lower grades, so it is suggested that you do try your hardest when taking the PSAT Test. Once you reach 10th and 11th grade, you'll be taking what's called the PSAT Test and later taking the SAT Test. Scores for the PSAT Test range from 430 EBRW and 430 Math, 50% (Ok); getting a 500-510 EBRW and 490-500 Math, will give you a 75% (Good); getting a 570- EBRW and 540-550 Math, will give you a 90% (Excellent), to finally a score of 650+ EBRW and 660+ Math, will give you a score of 99% (Top). Taking the PSAT Test not only tests your knowledge from both your strengths and weaknesses but it also helps set you up for high school and college years. For 10th-11th graders you will take the PSAT Test and will take it in the spring rather than the fall. This test will help determine your college classes and how high leveled they will be much like the PSAT Test 8th-9th is testing your knowledge for high school. However, the PSAT Test for 10-11th does not qualify for those of the National Merit Scholarship Program. 10th-11th graders are also given the chance to do the PSAT/NMSQT Test to measure readiness for college, access scholarships, and practice for the SAT. The SAT Test is to measure a high school student's readiness for college and to provide colleges with one common data point that can be used to compare other applicants. The total score range for the SAT is 400-1600 in 10-point increments, this consists of two sections EBRW and Math, whose scores ranges are each 200-800. If you were to get a score of either 1460 you would be at the below average scores for Harvard but would still be taken into consideration while as if you have a 1580 score you are at the above average score and have a better chance of being accepted into Harvard.
