HANDWRITING WITHOUT TEARS (K & 1 staff & support staff have been trained)

MAY 18, 2012 HWT WORKSHOP was held at BPS for all of K & 1 teachers, all SPED staff, all Title 1 staff, all speech & language staff, literacy specialists, and both occupational therapists.

Terri Foster from HWT presented - outstanding presenter and excellent reviews from staff - would like to have Terri present again for other grades.

Plan: Train grade 2 in 2012-2013 and grade 3 in 2013-2014, pending funds.

Important Note: Discuss district cursive expectations and look at alignment with HWT. What cursive expectations are in place for grades 2 & 3, 4 & 5, and middle school? HWT does not teach cursive until grade three.

<u>PHONICS LESSONS: LETTERS, WORDS, AND HOW THEY WORK, GRADE K</u> by Fountas & Pinnell PHONICS LESSONS provides scientific information about the complex, intricate relationships between letters and sounds and the ways in which they work to support developing readers.

Kindergartners are learning about written language in a broad, exploratory way. In *Phonics Lessons, Kindergarten*, students explore four main types of information, each of which is essential for developing an efficient early reading process: phonemic awareness, letters and sounds, reading words, and early reading concepts.

The 100 brief minilessons included in this program enable you to help children attend to, learn about, and efficiently use information about letters, sounds, and words. Each lesson is organized around a single language principle. These minilessons empower you to plan and teach effectively and systematically. The lessons are thorough and organized and include a range of instructional approaches, from demonstration and explicit teaching to support for children's independent work.

<u>REBECCA SITTON SPELLING PROGRAM</u> (Grades 1, 2 & 3 use Rebecca Sitton Spelling – grade 4 was to purchase Rebecca Sitton Spelling program for 2012–2013 school year – now pending final approval of school budget...TBD Nov. 6, 2012) An overview video and grade-specific videos were purchased last spring for grades 1, 2 & 3.

LUCY CALKINS (K-5)

Units of Study for Primary Writing: This K-2 series is comprised of nine small books and a CD. The first book, The Nuts and Bolts of Teaching Writing will equip you to teach a productive, well-managed writing workshop, introduce you to the methods which underlie all writing instruction, and help you plan a yearlong curriculum in the teaching of writing. Then, each of the seven unit books will support 4-6 weeks of that yearlong curriculum, helping you plan goals, minilessons, and shares for that unit. The Conferring Handbook offers you support in your conferring in each unit, and the CD offers resources and reproducibles to support you throughout the year's writing workshop. Each unit is divided into approximately fifteen sessions. In each session, we provide a detailed description of one day's teaching, and share ways in which that one day could be extended into several days. In the Biddeford school district, most grades K-5 staff has been trained. BPS Literacy Specialist, Judy Huot, is conducting training at this time for new staff at BPS.

Units of Study for Teaching Writing, Grades 3-5 offers crystal-clear advice on how to lead strong, efficient writing workshops in upper-elementary classrooms. Organized within a carefully crafted spiraling curriculum, these six sequential units of study help you teach narrative and expository writing with increasing power and intimacy. Like Units of Study for Primary Writing, this series provides minute-by-minute, live-from-the-classroom coaching as Lucy teaches students how to write with greater clarity and focus. By detailing the way Lucy teaches writing—the choices she makes (or could make), the theories and experience she draws on, and the resources she uses-each unit of study will enable you to extrapolate guidelines and methods so that you will feel ready to invent your own clear, sequenced, vibrant instruction in writing.

The books are intended to be read and used in sequence, each book standing on the shoulders of the books that go before it. (The order of *Fiction and Literary Essays* could conceivably be flipped; other than that, they must proceed in order.) A few homemade units can be inserted between the fifth and the sixth book. I suggest one of these be a unit of study on poetry, and I will later direct you to sources of support for that unit and others. Together, these units (including the ones you author yourself) will combine to provide the curricular support necessary to take a class of upper elementary students on a learning journey.

The series can also provide the backbone for a second or third year of study, as long as teachers in the succeeding years are increasingly willing to tailor their teaching to take into account what children already know and can do. That is, children profit from a spiral curriculum in writing: for example, in third grade they learn to write detailed, chronological personal narratives, but then in fourth grade, they have opportunities to deepen their knowledge of narrative writing. Because the teaching in these books is highly predictable, and because each bit of it draws on principles that are clearly articulated, you will find that these books will take not only your students but also you and your colleagues on a learning journey. Our school libraries from K-5 have purchased multiple copies of most of the recommended mentor texts to support this writing program.

WRITE SOURCE (Used in grades 6, 7 & 8.)

Write Source is a group of teachers and writers who develop materials for students and instructors from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Write Source materials are published by Great Source, a division of the Houghton Mifflin company. Need more information from BMS as to which WRITE SOURCE materials they are using.

<u>CONTINUUM OF LITERACY LEARNING</u>, 2ND <u>EDITION</u>, <u>BY FOUNTAS & PINNELL</u> (Will be used by district to coordinate curriculum maps with Common Core State Standards - book is already aligned to the standards.) Mary Capobianco

<u>DIRECT LITERACY INTERVENTION</u> Full-time Literacy Specialists are available for grades K-8. Part-time Literacy Specialist is available for grades 9-12.

GUIDED READING and READER'S WORKSHOP STUDY GROUPS - FOUNTAS & PINNELL (Guided reading study groups using Guided Reading: Good First Teaching for All Children, K-2, and Guiding Readers & Writers: Teaching Comprehension, Genre and Content Literacy, 3-6, and Teaching for Comprehending and Fluency: Thinking, Talking, and Writing about Reading, K-8, have been offered in the Biddeford district for staff from K-5 since spring, 2010. All books are by Fountas & Pinnell.)

A reader's workshop format with a guided reading component is an expectation in grades K-3 - many teachers are using <u>Guided Reading: Good First Teaching for All Children, K-2</u> and <u>Guiding Readers & Writers: Teaching Comprehension, Genre and Content Literacy, 3-6</u> by Fountas & Pinnell or <u>The Daily Five, K-5</u> and <u>The CAFÉ Book, K-5</u> by Gail Boushey & Joan Moser as guidelines. The expectation is that grades 1, 2 & 3 teachers will use leveled texts and a guided reading component in their reader's workshop model in order to differentiate effectively for each of their students by January, 2013. Basals are to be removed from the BPS building at that time.

<u>GLENCOE LITERATURE</u> (Used in grades 6 & 8.)

<u>LEVELED LITERACY INTERVENTION (LLI)</u> (Leveled Literacy Intervention is used by Title I, Literacy Specialist and SPED interventionists in grades K-3).

The Fountas & Pinnell Leveled Literacy Intervention System (LLI) is a small-group, supplementary intervention program designed to help teachers provide powerful, daily, small-group instruction for the lowest achieving children in the early grades. Lessons across the three systems progress from beginning reading in Kindergarten or Grade 1 (Level A) to beginning reading for Grade 3 (Level N).

- LLI is designed to be used with small groups of young children who need intensive support to achieve grade-level competency.
- Participants include low-achieving children who are not receiving another supplementary intervention.

- A combination of reading, writing, phonics and word study
