E-SPLOST Information and Frequently Asked Questions April 25, 2022

1. What is an EDUCATION SPLOST (E-SPLOST)?

An Education Special Purpose Location Option Sales Tax (E-SPLOST) allows local school districts the option to collect a one percent sales tax to help fund schools. It can be used to pay for capital projects, equipment, and to retire debt.

2. When is the E-SPLOST vote?

The election is Tuesday, May 24th, 2022. There will be an early voting period beginning May 2, 2022.

3. Is the proposed E-SPLOST a new tax?

This is <u>NOT</u> a new tax or an increase. The 1% sales tax for education has been in place continuously since 1998. The proposed E-SPLSOT continues the current 1% sales tax for education for five more years. Collection of the E-SPLOST extension would begin only after the current E-SPLOST ends on December 31, 2022.

4. Why do we need to extend our current E-SPLOST?

E-SPLOST will fund system-wide repair, maintenance, and improvements (roofs, HVAC units, etc.) at all facilities. Additionally, the E-SPLOST will fund purchases of technology, buses, and safety/security equipment for all facilities. Additionally, proposed projects include:

St. George Elementary - playground equipment and a bus canopy.

Bethune Middle - canopy at the parent pick/drop off area.

Folkston Elementary - a redesign of the parent pickup/bus loading area to improve traffic flow, additional shelving/cabinets/storage for classrooms, possible bus canopy in front for early buses if the redesign does not resolve early bus pickups being in front of the building.

Construction of a new **Charlton County High School**.

5. Why an E-SPLOST?

The E-SPLOST helps fund the cost of educational improvements in a way in which everyone contributes. The sales tax is paid by <u>everyone</u> who makes purchases in Charlton County, not just property owners.

6. How much money would be raised and how long would this sales tax be in place? The E-SPLOST would raise approximately \$6.5 million based on current collection rates, and would last five (5) years.

7. Why isn't the money being used for teacher salaries or curriculum development? State laws prohibit using E-SPLOST proceeds for salaries or instructional materials. However, passing this sales tax will free up funds to meet required financial obligations without having to rely on excessive ad valorem taxes.

8. Has the current E-SPLOST been a success?

YES! Below is a list of projects accomplished with the *current* E-SPLOST funds:

- Complete renovation at St. George Elementary School
- Construction of the new Board of Education building
- Replacement of lights at the Baseball and Football fields
- Construction of the livestock barn at Charlton County High School
- Playground equipment at Bethune Middle School
- Purchase of school buses and maintenance equipment

Funds from *previous* E-SPLOST collections funded numerous projects, including:

- -Construction of **Bethune Middle School**,
- -Construction of a Pre-K facility at St. George Elementary School,
- -Renovation of kitchen/cafeteria and roof replacement at **St. George Elementary School**,
- -HVAC replacements at Folkston Elementary School
- -New Track at Charlton County High School
- -Replacement of lights at the softball field at Charlton County High School
- -Technology and equipment upgrades at all schools
- -Purchase of new school buses and maintenance equipment
- -Dozens of additional projects

9. Why should people who do not have children in school support the E-SPLOST extension?

The E-SPLOST extension keeps ad valorem taxes (property taxes) stable. Additionally, the children are not the only ones who benefit from good schools. The social and economic strength of a community are greatly influenced by the school system. Good schools mean well-prepared citizens, a strong labor market, and an inviting atmosphere for both living and working. One of the key questions asked by industrial /commercial or residential prospects looking to move into a community is, "what is the quality of the schools?" Our citizens have actively supported education for years, and the passage of this E-SPLOST extension would be a strong demonstration of continued school support by our community.

10. Is this E-SPLOST different from the Charlton County Commission SPLOST?

YES! The Education SPLOST is a special purpose tax approved by the citizens for improvements of *school* facilities, debt reduction, and equipment. The County SPLOST is a special tax designed to fund county projects identified by the Charlton County Commissioners.
