- 2. A pumpkin patch symbolizes prosperity, growth, and abundance.


Halloween Movies

All about JUPITER

The reason we are writing about Jupiter is because Jupiter is 4.603 billion years old and has never been this close to us in 59 years. Why is this happening you might ask, well here is why "So, take advantage of good weather on either side of this date to take in the sight. Outside of the Moon, it should be one of the (if not the) brightest objects in the night sky." The reason Jupiter gets closer to and further away from Earth at times is because it orbits the sun at a different speed to our planet. Jupiter is the fifth planet from our sun and is the largest planet in our solar system. It will happen every 59 years, the next time this happens I will be 70 years old. Jupiter's orbit period is 4,333 days (9.11 years). Jupiter's moons are Europa, Io, Ganymede, Callisto, Amalthea, Adrastea, and more. Jupiter's Great Red Spot is twice the size of Earth. Jupiter is covered in swirling cloud stripes. It has big storms like the Great Red Spot, which have been going on for hundreds of years. Jupiter is a gas giant and doesn't have a solid surface, but it may have a solid inner core about the size of Earth. Jupiter also has rings, but they're too faint to see very well. ("Overview | Jupiter – NASA Solar System Exploration") It is estimated that the temperature of the cloud tops are about -280 degrees F. Overall, Jupiter's average temperature is -238 degrees F. Well Jupiter is a very big planet; it has a radius of 43,441(69,911 kilometers) or scientifically 43,440.1 miles! But it isn't the size of the whole galaxy, but it is bigger than Earth (3.9588K mi), Saturn (36.184K mi), Mars (2.1061K mi), and more than just those three! That is why it looks so up close whenever the rare occurrence comes almost every 59 years.
