Enough about that, a couple of weeks ago I provided some information on the proposed Illinois teaching standards and provided some links. I continue to be asked about the progress of those standards by some concerned staff and parents. To close the loop for now, I would like to provide you a link to an announcement sent out this week from the Illinois State Board of Education: ISBE Weekly Message

One very exciting announcement that I failed to mention in last week's update was the return of many athletics and activities due to the region's change in phases. It is unbelievable how this has impacted our student athletes, parents, coaches and staff in a positive way. However, all is not necessarily rosy. IHSA has worked with the Illinois Department of Public Health to create guidance for the return of athletics. Again, these are rules created for us, not by us[©] Some of the rules are particularly difficult to accept, like the spectator capacity limits, currently 50 under certain conditions (even outside events). In some cases, spectators are not allowed at all. Many districts have taken different approaches.

I can't imagine having a child participating in an activity or athletic contest and being told I can't attend. Actually, I can imagine it because I have lived it, having a senior athlete this year. I have been asked by parents what the ramifications are for not obeying the rules. Let me just say, this puts our administrators in a very difficult position. We have attempted to follow the guidelines since Day 1 so that we can keep kids in school.

If you are a parent put in a difficult situation, my hopes are that your child's coach and/or athletic director is communicating clearly what the expectations are. If the expectations are not followed, please do not judge our administrators, coaches, and athletic directors when they are forced to take action to enforce the rules. We are extremely happy that kids are able to return to the activities they

love and we will not do anything to jeopardize their ability to do so. Of course, the rules change from time to time and we will adjust accordingly.

COVID Numbers for the week: Highland Primary reported 1 positive staff resulting in 11 quarantines, 18 students and 3 staff on quarantine due to exposure within and outside of the building. Alhambra Primary reported 1 student quarantine due to outside exposure. Highland Elementary reported 1 positive staff member resulting in 3 quarantined staff and 6 students. Grantfork Elementary reported 1 student in quarantine due to outside exposure. Highland Middle School reported 2 students quarantined due to outside exposure. Highland High School reported zero cases this week.
