First of all, I hope everyone had a restful and relaxing break!

As we return to school, I need to ask for everyone's help in ensuring we can continue in-person instruction. We have been very fortunate thus far in that we've not had to close the school even for a short time and use remote learning for all students. While we've been lucky, we've also taken many intentional precautions and had the support of staff and students in following safety guidelines.

I ask that everyone continue to follow the safety guidelines that have allowed us to remain open. We will continue to follow health department guidelines. One of the most important guidelines requires an extended quarantine for people exposed to a confirmed positive case. While we do our best to limit "close contact" at school, the more positive cases that are discovered in our community the more people who will be forced to quarantine (with or without symptoms). In many other districts in our area, too many staff members have been required to quarantine which has led directly to short term building closures (usually 2 weeks at a time).

Although I know mask use may be a controversial topic for some, I want to be clear that it is a requirement for us to be open. Please reinforce with your student(s) that this is not optional at school or on the bus. I would also ask that when possible please send your student

# MONITORING STUDENTS' ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Partnership development with parents, teachers, students, and the school district are necessary to achieve academic success. In a rural location, cooperation is a must between all these parties. The make-up of Ferry County and the City of Republic, where the Republic School District is located, draws a blueprint of what 'real life' offers for its' citizens.. Washington states' median income is \$73,775 (U.S. Census Bureau), Ferry County is \$41,939 (U.S. Census Bureau), while the City of Republic is \$32,917 (Data USA). Plus a global pandemic struck early in 2020 leading to higher unemployment. "The preliminary county unemployment rate for the first nine months of 2020 was 12.4 percent. In 2019, the rate was 11.7 percent for the same time period. The unemploy-

Keeping an eye on how students' progress is comparable to a basketball game. Early education begins at home with the parent(s) or guardian(s) reading to their child(ren). This promotes an early love of listening and reading for the student. The parents are in the 'warm-up' stages of the game.

Next, the teacher begins coaching the 'regulation' game. Plays are executed with precision to elevate the students' skill level and to push them to the limit. Coach K, also known as Mike Krzyzewski says, "Champions play as they practice. Create a consistency of excellence in all your habits." Teachers will push students to a higher level of excellence.

Resolving to take this 'championship' attitude to academic studies creates a rich and rewarding environment for the student. In this analogy, the student is the basketball player. Each day Republic School District offers breakfast before school. Each meal contains whole grain items, fresh fruit, and milk. We will continue to offer a fully remote option for any student and family that prefers that.

In this difficult year, I want to remind everyone that not every community is sending students to school. Some students around the state are coming up on a calendar year of remote learning. ## ON CALL WITH CARE



To clarify what families can expect as COVID increases in our area:

- -Continued daily temperature check/screenings.
- -Following Tri-County Health quarantine guidelines for COVID positive and identified close contacts.
- -If a student/staff is positive, carefully protecting your personal information, while notifying close contacts and those at risk of exposure. NOTE: if a close contact was quarantined or away from school long enough prior to a positive COVID test (per guidelines) then no notification would be necessary.
- -Work with families to keep student's education on track throughout any necessary absences.

We appreciate everyone's cooperation with our COVID requirements to stay open. We have thus far had no known cases associated with school spread. We need everyone's continued support to continue avoiding school spread as local cases rise.


Please remember - we cannot have your child at school if they have had a fever of >/=100.4, cough, shortness of breath, chills, unusual fatigue, body aches/muscle pain, loss of taste/smell, sore throat, congestion, runny nose, nausea/vomiting/diarrhea or other signs of new illness not related to a preexisting condition.

Also: 1. If a close contact with any confirmed positive COVID-19 persons (>15 minutes within 6 feet - whether masked or not).

- 2. Anyone who has tested positive for COVID-19 in the past 10 days (unless a healthcare provider certifies symptom onset/10 day quarantine started prior to test date).
- 3. Anyone recommended by a healthcare professional to quarantine in the last 14 days.

IF a student must quarantine due to testing positive, close contact or otherwise, the school will work with you to get any needed homework, etc. If there is a positive case within a household - PLEASE DO NOT ENTER THE BUILDING. We will make arrangements to bring any necessary work to the car. Thank you for helping us continue to stay open and keep students and staff safe!







## COUNSELOR CORNER

#### Habits of Highly Effective People

#### Habit #1 Be Proactive

This time of uncertainty and transition during this pandemic has presented various challenges to all families, but has also brought about opportunities to rise to those challenges and show our strength. Rather than sit and observe the crisis and let it just happen, we can be an example of a leader and a change maker to our families and others. Despite our fears and the possibility of becoming frozen by our fear of the uncertainty surrounding us, we all have the ability within to rise to the occasion and take control and lead.

Leadership is not an abstract or vague concept. It is simply the act of promotion of some common good or purpose. And good leadership begins with being proactive, or taking action and control of our environment. Can we control as much as we'd like? Of course not; however, focus on the things we CAN control. Meaning our attitudes, our choice to focus on the positive, focusing on what is within our realm of control and do those things. To be proactive is to take responsibility for our own lives. And setting this example for your children is how we then teach them to be responsible, motivated, and successful.

You can develop your proactivity by paying attention to your daily frustration. The more you realize what doesn't work in your life, the more inclined you are to want to fix it as soon as possible.

#### Here are some ways to practice this:

- 1. Pay attention to what frustrates you in your daily life and find a way you can address it. By fixing the small issues of every day life, we then start taking responsibility.
- 2. Spend 5 minutes at night reflecting on your day and identify those frustrations and consider a potential solution. The next day, try to actually apply what you cam up with.

#### How to teach this to your child:

1. Share those things that frustrate you and the ways you have found to fix them in ways that they can understand. Relate it to the things they become frustrated with. Problem solve with them the different ways they can take control and fix their own challenges. Talk to them about responsibility for self and becoming their own problem solvers.



#### **ASK THE SUPERINTENDENT**

*QUESTION:* Are we going to have any after school clubs/activities?

ANSWER: We are able to have after school clubs and activities as long as we follow the same safety rules as during the school day. Clubs are ASB activities. To start a new club, it would first have to be approved by the ASB. In addition, you would need an advisor, to create bylaws, and elect officers.

QUESTION: Will seniors be able to have a senior trip and if not, what will the seniors do instead?

ANSWER: Great question. I certainly hope so. This will depend on state guidelines and what the senior class proposes for the trip. Overnight (or out-of-state) trips MUST be approved by the school board in advance of the trip.

QUESTION: What will happen if school goes all online for students that don't have good internet?

ANSWER: If we are forced to remote learning, it is my hope we can find creative ways for most students to access the internet. For students that can't, my goal is to provide weekly instruction on a thumb drive and set-up a weekly exchange for work and a new thumb drive. We'll all have to be flexible as we work out the kinks.

QUESTION: Will there be Chromebooks for students to check out if school goes online?

ANSWER: Yes. We are receiving 150 Windows' devices from the state in the next few weeks (for free!) and we have 150 Chromebooks that should finally arrive at the end of November (they were ordered in the spring).

Every student will receive a device if we must go to remote learning.

### WHAT IS STACC?






