Parent Involvement Policy

The board recognizes that involvement of parents and guardians (hereafter "parents") contributes to the achievement of academic standards by students participating in district programs. The board views the education of students as a cooperative effort among school, parents and community. The board expects that its schools will carry out programs, activities, and procedures in accordance with the statutory definition of parental involvement. - 1) Provide assistance to parents of children served by the school or district, as appropriate, in understanding topics such as:
- a. Washington's academic standards

- e. How to work with educators to improve the achievement of their children
- 2) Provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement.
- 3) Educate teachers, specialized instructional support personnel, principals, and other staff with the assistance of parents, in the value and utility of contributions of parents and how to do the following:
 - a. Reach out, communicate,

and work with parents as equal partners

- b. Implement and coordinate parent programs
- c. Build ties between parents and schools
- 4) Coordinate and integrate parent and family engagement strategies, to the extent feasible and appropriate, with similar strategies used under other programs.
- 5) Ensure that information related to the school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities is provided to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, and to the extent practicable, in a language that parents can understand. When necessary and upon request, this information will be provided in an alternative format.

2020-2021 School Year Republic School District Breakfast after the Bell

Research confirms that breakfast is the most important meal of the day for children's health, academic achievement, cognitive development and mental health. Lack of breakfast can be contributed to busy morning schedules, transportation schedules, or just not being hungry first thing in the morning.

How can the cafeteria in your child's school help your child to reach higher levels of achievement in math and reading, concentrate better, be more alert, retain more of what they learn, and participate in class? Provide a balanced breakfast that is at no cost to your students each morning.

Each day Republic School District offers breakfast before school. Each meal contains whole grain items, fresh fruit, and milk. For students that don't make it to school before the bell, Republic Elementary, Republic Middle School, and Republic High School are offering a "Grab and Go" menu after the bell in the morning. All students may eat breakfast for FREE. If your child eats prior to coming to school, they are still eligible to participate in the "Grab and Go" breakfast for FREE and eat the items as a mid-morning snack, which will help them concentrate until lunch.

If you struggle to provide snacks, or find your child struggles to make it from breakfast to lunch, this "Grab and Go" breakfast provides the convenience you need. Grab & Go will be served from 8:00-8:30 AM.

NATIONAL CHICDREN'S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH

Each year throughout National Children's Dental Health Month in February, the American Dental Association promotes a different campaign targeting a new dental health goal.

National Children's Dental Health Month brings together dental health professionals, caregivers, parents, and teachers to give children the best start on oral health. From brushing and flossing to healthy snacks and routine dental visits, the month also includes Give Kids A Smile Day on February 5, 2021.

Tips for Brushing

Don't skip – Making it habit requires sticking to the schedule. Even when there is a special occasion or if our child is tired, we need to reinforce the importance of brushing.

Make it fun – Songs that last 2 minutes will help. Reading to your child while they brush may help, too. Even a puppet brushing his teeth can be motivating.

Learn by example – Children emulate their parents. Brush with your children and they will want to be just like you.

Trial and error – Try different kinds of toothpaste until you find the one junior likes. Try using the smallest amount he will allow and working

ON CALL WITH CARE



Just a reminder to families with students that self carry medications at school (and don't have any in the office). If the student has a health plan at school requiring medication, they are required to have current, labeled medication available. If they are having trouble remembering to bring an inhaler or medication, then we could stock it in the office to alleviate this concern. Medication must be appropriately labeled with name and instructions. I am finding that students may not have required medication with them, or in some cases what they have is expired. It is state law that the plan AND medication are to be available BEFORE the student attends.

Also, NO medication should be at school without a plan or order (including over the counter medications). All of these rules come to us by Washington State law and are supported by district policy and procedures. I understand how cumbersome some of the requirements can seem. I appreciate everybody's effort to help us keep our kids safe while complying with state requirements!

I will soon be going back over student's immunizations. If you received a letter with requested information or missing vaccines, please try and get the immunizations done (will show in state system) and/or return any exemptions or additional requested paperwork.

Right to Request Teacher and Para Qualifications

All parents and guardians have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher(s) or instructional paraeducators. If you request information, the district will provide you with the following.

Whether the teacher has met Washington teacher certification requirements for the grade level and subjects in which the teacher provides instruction;

Whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency or other provisional status for which Washington qualifications or certification has been waived;

The college major of the teacher and any graduate degree or certificate; and

Whether your child is receiving Title I services from paraprofessionals, and if so, whether those paraprofessionals meet state/federal requirements of the Every Student Succeeds Act.



SENATE BILL 5395

I would like to share some important information regarding SB 5395 (the sex education bill) that was passed last year. Let me start by saying that before any sexual education occurs, there will always be plenty of notice given to parents and everyone has the ability to "opt out" completely. We do however, have local control over how we implement the requirements of this bill and will do so in a collaboration with parents, school staff, and our locally elected school board members.

The timeline laid out in SB 5395 is as follows:

- •In the spring of 2021 the district will invite staff and parents to come up with a curriculum that will meet the state requirements, but that also makes sense in our community.
- •Once we have designed our local curriculum, there will be opportunities for the public to view and respond to it before it is taken to the school board for approval (board approval is required before the start of the 2021-22 school year).
- •In the 2021-22 school year we are required to teach lessons twice between grades 6-8, and twice in grades 9-12.
- •In the 2022-23 school year we are required to provide social emotional learning to students in K-3 (There is NO sexual health content required for students in K-3). We are also required in 2022-23 to teach sexual education once in grades 4 or 5. (This is typically a human development

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Child Find Notice

The Republic School District is required by Washington Administrative code 392-172-100 to inform patrons of special education services and programs available within the district, including the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 1986.

The State of Washington defines special needs as having concerns with: developmental delays, vision, hearing, health, communication skills, academic performance, social-emotional status, general intelligence, motor abilities, autism, traumatic brain injury, transition services and other disabilities. People with children from birth to age 21, who have any of these conditions are encouraged to contact the Republic School District's school counselor at 509-775-3327 for more information. Families enrolled in WAVA are encouraged to contact Jamie Bouge at jbouge@republicsd.org.

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence." The McKinney-Vento Act requires schools to register homeless children even if they lack normallyrequired documents, such as immunization records or proof of residence. WAVA families experiencing homelessness are encouraged to contact the Republic School District's counselor Bonnie Grumbach at 509-775-3171 or bgrumbach@republicsd.org.
