The team finished 8-14 on the season after their loss against Mead (18-56) in the first round of subdistricts. Despite facing many obstacles throughout the season, the team consistently showed up and worked hard. At one point, they only had 5 players available. This group of 5 went undefeated in the two conference tournament games they



played. Their irst win came over College View Academy, 34 -33. Senior Skylar Shanahan led with 23

points and junior Madison Patyk contributed 6 points to that win. Freshman Shelby Samek also added a career high 4 blocks. The group's second win was over Cornerstone Christian, 40-39. That win awarded them 5<sup>th</sup> place in the Frontier Conference Tournament. Junior Elly Campbell contributed 7 points and 7 rebounds to go along with senior Skylar Shanahan's 20 points and 20 rebounds. Skylar leaves the program with exactly 1,100 career rebounds. She also broke the girl's single game scoring record with 35 points on February 1st. Head



coach Mr. Brian Dunker shared: "The girl's basketball team was able to achieve success despite facing some unique roster situations and some setbacks. We started the year with a roster of ten and we finished with a total of 9 players. Five of those players were freshmen so we experienced a learning curve and toward the end of the year really started to experience some success. Skylar was our lone

senior and did a great job leading us throughout the year. She is a great role model and example for



the younger players. She has shown the younger girls that determination and effort can lead to success."
