

"Look! There's the cafeteria!" shouted Sally. "Let's eat!"







### A Summer In The Philippines

The American Field Service is a nonprofit organization devoted to the promotion of world peace and understanding between nations of the world. Each year more than three thousand students participate in the programs of AFS. During the 1964-65 school year, more than two thousand foreigners from more than sixty-three countries came to the United States to study in American high schools. The Americans Abroad Program also sent over one thousand American students to study in foreign high schools. It was under this program that I spent this past summer in the Philippine Islands.

There were forty-five American students from all sections of the country who spent the summer in the Philippines. Santa Rita, Pampanga, a farming town on the Central Luzon Plain, was my home town for more than eight weeks.

My foster parents were both school teachers in one of the local elementary schools. My two

foster sisters were doing college work of Quezon City, the capital city of the Philippand my foster brother was a fourth-year school student at the local high school home was flooded during much of my star cause the rainy season occurs during July August.

The last ten days of my stay weres with the other forty-four students. We all in the Capital and from there took many trips to better acquaint ourselves with beautiful country.














Dave Wing drives in for a lay up against Fort Fairfield.




