October 16, 2020 Board of Education Approves African American History Edits to History & Social Science Standards RICHMOND — The state Board of Education yesterday approved a series of edits to the commonwealth's History and Social Science Standards of Learning and SOL Curriculum Framework to implement recommendations from Governor Ralph Northam's Commonwealth.

The curriculum framework details the essential knowledge and skills students must attain to meet learning objectives in the Standards of Learning for each grade level and course. The edits recommended by the commission will lead to changes in instruction in grades K-2, Virginia Studies, U.S. History to 1865, U.S. History 1865 to the Present, and Virginia and U.S. History.

"Incorporating additional context about African American history into the larger historical narrative has never been more important. The approval of these edits to the standards and curriculum framework begins Virginia's effort to change the course of history and social science instruction to ensure inclusive and culturally relevant content in all grades and courses," Board of Education President Daniel Gecker said. "I thank the members of the commission for their recommendations and for their commitment to supporting teachers as they implement these revisions in their classrooms."

The edits approved today by the board expand the content of Virginia's history standards by adding additional depth and context. For example, the addition of Old Point Comfort to the framework for Virginia Studies (typically taught in the fourth grade) provides more specificity to the standard about the arrival in 1619 of the first African Americans in British North America.

Another recommendation approved by the board is the addition of content about the history of lynching in America to the high school Virginia and U.S. History course. This new sub-standard provides opportunities for deeper exploration and synthesis of primary and secondary documents, including more than 200 pieces of legislation related to lynching proposed over the past 102 years.

Northam established the African American History Education Commission in August 2019. The commission comprised educators, historians, museum curators, school board members, faith leaders, school administrators, teachers, parents, and other citizens from across the commonwealth.

The governor charged commission members with recommending:

- Technical edits to and recommendations for enriched standards related to African American History
- Broader considerations for the full History and Social Science Standards of Learning review process scheduled to begin in January 2021; and
- Necessary professional development and instructional supports for teachers to ensure culturally competent instruction.

The commission released its report on August 31. Following a review of the report by Virginia Department of Education instructional staff, Superintendent of Public Instruction James Lane recommended that the Board of Education follow a two-step process to implement the commission's recommendations, with the edits made Thursday representing the first step.

"It is with appreciation and gratitude that we acknowledge the contributions of the historians, educators and stakeholders that contributed to this momentous occasion," Lane said. "The adoption of these recommendations support efforts already underway at VDOE to advance the cultural proficiency and deepen the cultural inclusivity in our Standards of Learning. This marks a historic milestone for the commonwealth and our mission to ensure inclusive and supporting learning environments for all students. Our priority now is to provide the instructional resources and professional development support Virginia educators and the learning communities they serve will need for successful alignment of classroom instruction to the revised standards and curriculum framework."

"With the approval of these edits, the board moves Virginia's history standards to being more inclusive and providing opportunities for students to engage deeply by drawing connections between African American history and its relevance in our contemporary communities," Board of Education Vice

		President Jamelle S. Wilson said. "These edits help ensure that all Virginia students develop a comprehensive understanding of all of the voices that contribute to the commonwealth's story." "Most importantly, these edits acknowledge and amplify the resistance, resilience, innovation and sacrifices of African Americans and their continued contributions to American society," Gecker said.
		The Board of Education will also consider commission recommendations that would represent the introduction of new content and areas of study during the comprehensive, regularly scheduled review of the History and Social Science Standards of Learning, which will begin next year. The review will culminate with the adoption in 2022 of new history and social science standards.

 [Update] 77. What are the considerations for homebound instructions as schools reopen?
 Local school divisions should ensure that students receiving <u>homebound instruction</u> are receiving access to virtual and remote learning opportunities with careful consideration of

		providing equitable access and support for a variety of students. Strategies such as distance learning can be accessible to students confined to their home or health care facility. As school divisions enter phase two and phase three, they can begin to plan for safe and effective delivery of face to face instruction for homebound students. Consistent with the Phase Guidance for Virginia Schools, (PDF) during phase 2 school divisions may provide face-to-face homebound instruction to K-3 students, students with disabilities, and English Learners. In phase three, schools may begin to plan for safe and effective face-to-face delivery of instruction for all students on homebound.
		It is important to note that students who are at high risk of severe illness due to the pandemic should be provided with options for remote learning that is comparable to the learning opportunities of the rest of the student population. Homebound instruction is designed to be supplemental and is not a sufficient substitute for long-term instructional needs. VDOE	 Board of Education Approves African American History Edits to History & Social Science 	 The state Board of Education has approved a series of edits to the Commonwealth's History and Social Science Standards of Learning and SOL Curriculum Framework to implement recommendations from Governor Ralph Northam's <u>Commission on African American History</u> <u>Education in the Commonwealth</u>.
	Standards	 The curriculum framework details the essential knowledge and skills students must attain to meet learning objectives in the Standards of Learning for each grade level and course. The edits recommended by the commission will lead to changes in instruction in grades K-2, Virginia Studies, U.S. History to 1865, U.S. History 1865 to the Present, and Virginia and U.S. History.

		 "Incorporating additional context about African American history into the larger historical narrative has never been more important. The approval of these edits to the standards and curriculum framework begins Virginia's effort to change the course of history and social science instruction to ensure inclusive and culturally relevant content in all grades and courses," Board of Education President Daniel Gecker said. "I thank the members of the commission for their recommendations and for their commitment to supporting teachers as they implement these revisions in their classrooms."
		• The edits approved by the board expand the content of Virginia's history standards by adding additional depth and context. For example, the addition of Old Point Comfort to the framework for Virginia Studies (typically taught in the fourth grade) provides more specificity to the standard about the arrival in 1619 of the first African Americans in British North America.

Research on prolonged traumatic stress shows that if not addressed it has the potential to leave students and staff with impaired ability to learn and react, heightened anxiety, and lifelong health problems. By creating a marginal shift to incorporate small mental health practices in daily interactions, we can help the people we serve to move past a feeling of surviving to thriving. Aligned to Virginia's 5Cs of EdEquityVA—Continuous Reflection, Compassionate Student and Family Engagement, Curriculum Reframing, Courageous Leadership, and Cultural Responsiveness—the *Equity Audit Tool* aids schools and divisions in identifying inequities and establishing equity priorities.

School division leaders are encouraged to dedicate time, and the resources necessary, to conduct a comprehensive equity audit. Its use will establish a data-informed understanding of policies, procedures, and current practices that may induce disparate outcomes, opportunity gaps, and non-inclusive school culture and climate. The essential questions, which are based on the core competencies necessary to advance equity, will help leaders gather equity-framed data about student achievement, family engagement, personnel competencies, disproportionality, instructional equity, and more. Key takeaways:

Start in your own backyard!

Look to members of your school community- think caregivers and teachers and then invite them to open up their networks as well. Are there local organizations or businesses that might provide insight, opportunities, or financial support? Do they know their proximity to local schools? Do they have a clear picture about many potential graduates are close by? Have they been invited to be a part of your learning community and/or journey?

Leverage Social Capital on Behalf of Students

Executive Director of CodeRVA Kume Goranson shared that organizations want to have social capital with schools but don't always know what that means or looks like. She suggested giving organizations different entry points for partnerships (financial, sharing expertise, donation of time, thought partnership around curriculum relevance, etc.) and then share with partners how students have benefited because of that partnership.

Clarify the ask

Know something about who you are asking and what is important so you can be specific about what you need. This will help the organizations know what they are saying yes to. Though you may arrive at a different outcome for your partnership than initially intended, your ask may just be the entry point people need to engage.

NASA • Moon Pod Essay Contest

On Sept. 15, 2020, NASA, in partnership with Future Engineers, launched the <u>Artemis Moon Pod Essay Contest</u>. The contest, which is open to all (public, private, and home school) students in grades K-12, asks participants to imagine they are leading a one-week expedition to the Moon's South Pole. In the essay, students will need to describe to NASA what (and who) they would bring to help make their expedition a success.

The Moon Pod Essay Contest is presented in support of NASA's Artemis program. The student challenge is part of NASA's efforts to engage the public in its missions to the Moon and Mars. NASA is returning to the Moon for scientific discovery, economic benefits, and inspiration for a new generation. Working with its partners throughout the Artemis program, the agency will fine-tune precision landing technologies and develop new mobility capabilities that allow robots and crew to travel greater distances and explore new regions of the Moon.

The challenge will require students to imagine and share their thoughts on leading a one-week expedition at the Moon's South Pole. Additionally, participants must include the types of skills, attributes, and/or personality traits they would want their Moon Pod crew to have and why. Every student who submits an entry will receive a certificate from NASA and be invited to a special NASA virtual event – with an astronaut!

Moreover, nine finalists will travel with a parent to NASA's Johnson Space Center in 2021 to learn about lunar exploration, and the national winner in each grade division will win a family trip to see the first Artemis test launch to watch the most powerful rocket in the world launch from Kennedy Space Center in Cape Canaveral, Florida.

Over time, both teachers and students should feel more comfortable with increased student voice. For teachers who struggle to let go and promote student voice, consider helping those teachers think about the outcomes they have for students and/or the question "how else can a student demonstrate this?"
