



Q.2: How useful do you think your students' schooling will be to him or her in the future?








Q.3: Which of these opportunities are most valuable for your students? Please select all that apply.




Q.1: How often do professional development opportunities help you explore new ideas about how to promote equity in your practice?


Q.2: How often do school leaders encourage you to teach about people from different races, ethnicities, or cultures?






Q.5: How often do adults at your school have important conversations about race, even when they might be uncomfortable?




Q.1: How often are students given opportunities to learn about people from different races, ethnicities, or cultures?


Q.2: At your school, how often are students encouraged to think more deeply about race-related topics?





Q.1: How comfortable are you interacting with students at your school who are from a different cultural background than your own?








Q.5: How comfortable would you be having a student who could not communicate well with anyone in class because his/her home language was unique?


Q.6: When a sensitive issue of diversity arises in class, how easily can you think of strategies to address the situation?






Q.9: How easy do you find interacting with students at your school who are a different gender than your own?





Q.1: How often do you discuss evaluation scores?




Q.2: How often do you review student assessment data to make instructional decisions?






Q.4: How often do you meet with an instructional coach?





Q.1: How urgently does your school's technology need to be updated?



Q.2: How often do your school's facilities need repairs?




Q.3: How valued is your feedback related to the implementation of high-quality instructional materials?









Q.1: At your school, how valuable are the available professional development opportunities?




Q.2: How helpful are your colleagues' ideas for improving your teaching?






Q.3: How much input do you have into individualizing your own professional development opportunities?




Q.4: Overall, how much do you learn about teaching from the leaders at your school?



Q.5: How often do your professional development opportunities help you explore new ideas?




Q.6: How relevant have your professional development opportunities been to the content that you teach?




Q.7: Overall, how supportive has the school been of your growth as a teacher?







Q.2: When new initiatives to improve teaching are presented at your school, how supportive are your colleagues?





Q.3: How optimistic are you that your school will improve in the future?







Q.5: To what extent are teachers trusted to teach in the way they think is best?








Q.7: How respectful are the relationships between teachers and students?




Q.1: How positive is the tone that school leaders set for the culture of the school?




Q.3: Overall, how positive is the influence of the school leaders on the quality of your teaching?









Q.1: If your students fail to reach an important goal, how likely are they to try again?




Q.2: When your students are working on a project that matters a lot to them, how focused can they stay when there are lots of distractions?










Q.1: In your opinion, how well have students with Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) been supported in meeting the goals of their IEPs this year?


Q.2: I have received professional development training that has helped me feel more confident to respond to students who are experiencing mental health problems.










Q.1: How confident are you that you can move through material at a pace that works well for each of your students?


Q.2: How confident are you that you can help your school's most challenging students to learn?


Q.3: How thoroughly do you feel that you know all the content you need to teach?


Q.4: If a parent were upset about something in your class, how confident are you that you could have a productive conversation with this parent?





Q.6: How confident are you that you can meet the learning needs of your most advanced students?


