"I want basketball like no other. It is my passion," *Bovd stated. "There are safety* concerns, but if we have these activities, I guarantee the kids will get their grades up. They want to be with their friends. They are craving that. A lot of our students have already left us. If you want to keep these top students, you have to do something to keep them. It is hard for them to see other schools playing."

"Girls Basketball practice starts Thanksgiving Basketball week, Bovs November 30," Wilson noted. "These kids have been out of activities so long it would take at least 30 days to get them back in shape. We could just come in and condition and see how it rolls, with no games until after the first of Ianuary. anvwav."

Wilson also mentioned Middle School Music Director Brock Persson, who thought it

would be a good idea just to be able to play music, maybe during school hours. National Honor Society could be handled virtually.

"There is so much we can do as a school district to *aet through this thing," he* said. "I know it is tough for you auys, but look at these kids, and you'll know we need to do something."

**Board Vice President** Shelley Means asked High School Assistant Principal Mike Hammer if the lack of extracurricular activities has an effect on the amount of work turned in by the students.

*"Our* numbers are pathetic," Hammer replied. "If araduation was today, we would have 20 graduates."

Board Member Tim Cournover asked if the Board would be ready to accept the responsibility of what might happen by having winter activities and not in-person classes.

More discussion continued the on issue. including bus etiquette. spectators or not, live or virtual games.

In other matters, the Board:

- heard a presentation from Foster Cournoyer (2017 TCHS Alumni), representing the 4Rosebud organization. He brought a petition, signed by 200 persons, asking the District to strengthen the Lakota Language, Culture &

History curriculum.

- hired Desiree Luedke as Principal at He Dog Elementary.

- accepted, with regret, the resignation of DeAnn Eastman-Jansen RN.

- Board Member Sage Fast Dog requested data showing the amount of work coming back from each student, "So we can get an idea of where we are at each school," he said.

Following а brief Executive Session, Superintendent Galbraith announced that a \$1,750.00 bonus has been approved for every permanent Todd County School District employee. The bonuses will be given on December 15 for employees of record on December 10. Is it too early to say "Merry Christmas?"

Board Members also thanked staff for their dedication:

Member Michelle Allen - "Thank You to all staff for what you are going through. We know what you do for our students and for energizing the District."

Member Sage Fast Dog - "Thank You staff. Just keep on reaching out to parents and kids. Find ways to give feedback to the kids so they know what they are doing to meet their goals and objectives for this year. We can't control the way things are, but we do know how to deliver education and are really good at borrowing from each other to make sure our students are successful."

Member Tim Cournoyer - "Thank You staff. I am proud of you all."

Vice President Shelley Means – "We have come a long

way since last March, and you continue to do your very best for our students. Thank You again, it's been a tough nine months. Let's wrap up 2020 and keep plugging away."

Superintendent Carol Galbraith - "Our staff members are unbelievably flexible, and their determination to reach out to families and kids is amazing. We really appreciate it. We need to continue that through these trying times so we can make sure our students succeed and get the academics they need. It is so important that they know we are there when they reach out to us." President Debra Boyd (via phone) – "We are all in this together. Thank You Staff! Goodnight Everyone."

## *Kernit Eugene Grimshaw* **1949 - 2020** *April 11, 1949 - November 17, 2020*

As the sun's rays break through the clouds of another day, a man we deeply love and cherish is now watching the view from another perspective.

Kernit Eugene Grimshaw of Mission passed away on November 17, 2020, due to COVID-19.

Kernit was born in Valentine, Nebraska on April 11, 1949, the son of Dorthy and Walter Grimshaw. He was a 1967 graduate of Todd County High School and a lifetime resident of Mission, who dedicated his considerable talents to his family and his community.

Kernit was a student of hard knocks and divine grace, who never quit learning and exploring. He loved to share his knowledge, opinion, hugs and photos with everyone who was lucky enough to cross his path. He was fiercely loyal to his family, band of brothers, area sports teams and the best loved dog in the whole world, "Bear."

A banker extraordinaire, for over 51 years, Kernit held court and council at 112 N. Main. The bank's name may have changed a few times but Kernit as a stalwart fixture never did. He began his career in banking at the age of 14, sweeping up after hours, and by the age of 27 was made the Mission branch manager, and soon became bank president. Known for common sense and a level head, he was a mentor to many young bankers who dubbed him "The Godfather".

A true Renaissance man, Kernit appreciated fine artwork, low literature and the selected stylings of Bob Marley and Pink Floyd. He was a man of many passions and spent much of his life running, motorcycling, and taking pictures. Over the years he served on the SD Arts Council, and the boards of Winner Regional Hospital, REDCO and Northern Plains Tribal Arts, to name a few.

This last year Kernit embraced retirement to become a "Gentleman Farmer" and delighted in felling trees and mowing his Iowa acreage into walking paths for he and Bear. He enjoyed making daily posts filled with his musings and photos and hearing back from all his friends.

Kernit is survived by his wife, Michele; his children: Joe (Dawn), Jennifer (Travis), Julie (Justin), Elijah, Lottie, Eireann and Sam. His grandchildren: Zachary, Sasha, Naomi, Alexandra, Jillian, Gabriel, Jacob, Nathaniel, Payton and Ethan; and his great-granddaughter Maya. He is also survived by his brothers: Kelly (Linda) and Gregg (Jo). He was preceded in death by his parents, Dorthy and Walter and his sister, Patricia.
