Where has the time gone? Christmas and the end of the first semester are upon us. We are still very active with making changes and working to move the district forward.

Strategic Plan

The strategic plan committee has sent out a survey to students, staff and community. We received 274 replies back so far. The committee met on December 7 to review survey results and to start working on goals for the next five years. The following focus areas will still be part of the next five year strategic plan. Academics & Accountability, Staff Retention & Attraction, Well-Being, Community Relations, and Academic Expansion. The group has added Student Retention & Attraction, and Buildings & Grounds Updates as new focus areas. Once the goals and action steps are added to the plan, it will be approved by the school board and released to the public.

Master Athletic Plan

The master athletic plan committee met December 21 to discuss next steps. Point of Beginning (a civil engineering/landscape architecture company that focuses on athletic fields) was present to view options with costing. The committee will use this information to determine next steps and to develop a long-term plan for our facilities.

Personnel

We hired a new Buildings and Grounds director who started on November 14. Robbie Lashua joins our team after working for TDS, Portage County Highway, and Lashua Farms. He has a background in electrical, welding, and motor control just to name a few areas. Please congratulate Robbie and welcome him into our district.

Building

Our update to our Technology Education classroom is in the ordering stages. The required materials for the upgrade have been ordered and construction will begin when school gets out in June. All the old ventilation will be removed along with two concrete half walls. A new HVAC system will be added along with new welding booths that will be properly vented.



Our new CNC plasma cutter has been installed and stu-

dents are using it. The six new 3D printers are in place and a couple of different classes are using them. The plasma cutter and printers were purchased with Fab Lab grant funds.

High School Update


Dear Students, Parents, and Community Members:

Happy 2023!! I hope you enjoyed your winter break with family and friends.


For most students there are many activities during the day that need to be balanced with their academic classes. Prepare for Winter

Winter is here and there are many things that come along with it. The most obvious is the cold weather. Please take care to ensure that your children are dressed appropriately for their wait for the bus and their trip to school. If you have a student driver, remember to have them pack a cold weather kit in their vehicle in the event that something would happen on their trip to or from school. Big winter boots and gloves may not be fashionable, but they certainly come in handy when you are stranded in a snowbank.

Winter also brings the cold and flu season. Please remind your students to wash their hands on a regular basis, get a proper amount of sleep, and encourage healthy eating habits. If your student is ill and is not going to attend school please call the Middle/High School office (715)-445-2411 prior to 8:00 a.m. and let us know that they will not be in. It is very helpful for us to know prior to school starting. If the phone is not answered please leave a message saying who the student is and why they will not be in school.

Testing

Late winter and early spring is standardized testing season for students in Wisconsin. Our students will be taking various tests in grades 7-11 January through April. iReady is a diagnostic test for students in grades 7 and 8. The Forward Exam is a state assessment that will be administered in English, Language Arts, and Mathematics in grades 3 through 8, and English, Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies in grades 4 and 8. All 9th and 10th graders will be taking the PreACT in April. The PreACT tests the students in English, Math, Reading, Science and Writing. All 11th graders will have taken the ACT on March 7.

These exams will test the skills of the students to find what they are doing well and where they need improvements. The exams will also allow schools to evaluate their overall educational programs, compare their scores with other schools, and give them data to use to make plans for



growth.

It is important that students take these tests seriously and put forth their best efforts to give local districts the most reliable data to make academic program enhancements. The scores that our students receive on these tests have a direct impact on the district's comparative assessments on a local and national level. The administration and staff have made preparations for these tests by aligning curriculum and providing students with examples of questions and the tools they will need to successfully complete the exams. We are anxious to see the impact of the hard work. Each year it is important for students to perform their best so that we may assess the impact of curricular changes that have been made and get a true picture of what skills they may need extra focus in the 2023-2024 school year.

Food Service Update

Iola-Scandinavia is participating in the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) National School Lunch Program and the School Breakfast program for the entirety of the 2022-23 school year. This means that meals provided will be charged to students based on their eligibility for free, reduced price or paid.

Students that are eligible for reduced meals will receive breakfast at no charge. Households are encouraged to apply for free or reduced price meal benefits at any time throughout the year.

We are still dealing with the same challenges as we had last year, which includes nationwide supply chain and product availability. Some food and beverage products don't always arrive as scheduled, or do not arrive at all. Due to these unforeseen circumstances, last-minute menu changes and product substitutions may occur. Be assured meals will remain balanced, healthy, and plentiful. We ask for patience and understanding as we do our best to meet your children's needs.

The goal of the I-S Gardening Group is to equip students with knowledge and skills to grow and propagate their own food and other plants for their own use as well as (for students who are interested) explore what it takes to grow in a smallscale agriculture setting for farmer's markets and community supported agriculture (CSA).

Mr. Bassett, Mrs. McCartney, and Mr. Shulfer will be meeting with students during TREK (last thirty minutes of each day) over the course of the school year to plan a garden, learn how to propagate houseplants, develop a seeding and planting schedule, learn greenhouse management skills, run a plant sale, and so much more!

This opportunity is made possible by the generous support of the Waupaca Rotary Club who provided a grant of \$700 to help with start-up costs of seeds and soil.

The school district already has a greenhouse and a great deal of planting and greenhouse supplies and equipment that has been sitting relatively unused to its full potential for a number of years.
