CAMERON MAY- PENELERICK NAMED SEAHAWKS PLAYER OF THE WEEK!!

The Seattle Seahawks, CenturyLink, Inc. (NYSE: CTL) and Q13 FOX (KCPQ) announced Cameron May-Penelerick of Cle Elum Roslyn High School as the Week 10 CenturyLink High School Athlete of the Week. Cameron will be recognized on the field at CenturyLink Field during the December 4 game vs. the Carolina Panthers.

Cameron, a senior at Cle Elum Roslyn High School, was selected Athlete of the Week based on his dedication to academics, community involvement, leadership, and athletic performance. He maintains a 3.87 GPA while taking Advanced Placement classes. Cameron is Treasurer of the Honor Society, Vice President of Interact Club, and a member of Academic Club. He helped raise \$10,000 for Interact Club's trip to Ecuador where they built a well for a community that needed fresh water and he is currently raising money for a similar project in the Dominican Republic this spring. Cameron helped bring the traveling Vietnam Wall to Cle Elum and was part of creating Cle Elum's Flag Pole Park. He has also been a major contributor for Shop with a Cop in Ellensburg where he raised money to purchase dinner for all participants. Cameron is a captain of his football team and a First Team All-League linebacker.

Cameron will be recognized at his school in front of families, peers and teachers, as well as at a Seahawks game. He will also receive a \$1,000 equipment grant to the school from the Seahawks for the school's Athletic Department along with media recognition, tickets and sideline passes to a Seahawks game, a customized football, and a customized 2016 Seahawks jersey. A total of \$10,000 will be awarded to high schools over the course of the program.



ATHLETES OF THE MONTH



This month we decided to shine the spotlight on the college in the classroom courses. Our school provides the unique opportunity for high school students to earn dual credits from both the high school and college. What does this mean? Current sophomores have the opportunity to graduate high school with 43 quarter credits and 3 semester credits. The quarter credits would be through Central Washington University while the semester credits would be through Washington State University. When asked about the benefits of taking these courses, Mrs. Harper stated, "The main benefits to taking these classes while in high school are discounted prices for credits, a longer period of time to cover the same amount of content, more contact with the instructor, and no commuting during adverse weather." These classes are not like other classes. The grades for these courses will permanently be on your college transcript and they are not completely free. Sixty percent of the money paid for the courses will be refunded but only if the student receives a C or better in the course. When asking whether or not to enroll in these courses one must ask themselves if they are ready to take on that responsibility and put in the work necessary to be successful.
