

He enjoys several hobbies and recreational activities outside of school, as can be seen by his vast collection of shoes and boots. One of his many intriguing stories was that of a rock climbing trip to Slesse Mountain. In his early 20's, Hamel and a climbing partner were hiking the lower slopes of Mount Slesse when they came across littered remnants of a plane crash, including old luggage bags, clothing, and various personal belongings. A plane had crashed there in 1956, and the items had been scattered about as the glacier melted over the next 50 years. He described the experience as creepy and surreal. But they went on a ways and then camped for the night, before continuing on the next day. After more climbing, they reached the summit of the mountain and got trapped in a snowstorm, so set up a camp for the night. However, unbeknownst to them, a pack of rats had already staked their claim at the top of the mountain and didn't welcome new visitors. The rats chewed on their shoes and equipment, and peered at them mockingly with their beady eyes through the dark crevices of rock. Hamel and his friend spent most of their night swatting away the rats and trying to protect their belongings. They survived the night and made it back down the mountain safely the next day (but not without spotting more plane crash material, like a full cockpit control panel wedged into a rock face). However, that one pair of rock climbing boots will always bear the scars of that crazy two day adventure to Slesse Mountain.

Team America Rocketry Challenge, coached by Mr. Avery, are feeling pretty optimistic about the performance of their Rockets. TARC's goal is to have both teams qualify for national competition. The teams are competing against 780 other teams trying to qualify for Nationals. Only the top 100 teams get to complete at Nationals, and there some intimidating requirements. They must get the rocket up to at least 850 feet, protect a two egg payload, and have a time between 44 and 46 seconds between launch and land. During their first practice launch, the rocket made it to a height of 848 feet, but it landed in a tree on its way down. Other than that, TARC feels like it is on track to qualify. Qualifying ends April 4th and Nationals take place on May 15th in Virginia.
