If you ever fly to Ireland this is the first thing you will notice about the country from the sky, so make sure you have a window seat! Ireland has its own

language, Gaelic Irish. Some Irish children will learn Gaelic before English and everyone is taught how to speak and write in Gaelic at school.

A lot of our street signs will have the Gaelic translation, as well as the English on them.

The most popular Gaelic Irish phrases you will see are "céad míle fáilte" meaning "a hundred thousand welcomes" and "go raibh maith agat", used to say, "thank you", but translates to "may you have goodness". Often people will



say, "Go raibh míle maith agat", used to say "thanks a million", but it actually translates to "may you have a thousand good things".

The Irish for Ireland is Éire. I will link a video of someone speaking Gaelic Irish in the Calm Corner. The Official Emblem of Ireland is the harp and it is on our currency (Euros). I usually have a few euros in my purse so if anyone would like to check them out, stop by my office. The Shamrock is also a well known emblem of Ireland and was used by St. Patrick to teach the Holy Trinity. It's leaves also represent faith, hope and love. The fourth leaf is where we get our luck. Each year, on 17th March, the people of Ireland celebrate St. Patrick's Day, to observe the death of St. Patrick, the Patron Saint of Ireland.

Legend has it that St. Patrick chased all the snakes out of Ireland and to this day I have never seen or heard of anyone spotting a snake in Ireland. St. Patrick's Day is also known as Paddy's day (Paddy is short for Patrick), not Patty's day, as Patty is the short for Patricia.



Last fun fact: The Titanic was actually built in Belfast, Northern Ireland. If you ever visit you should check out the Titanic Quarter in Belfast. The Titanic Museum is built to look like the front of the ship and inside you can find a replica of the famous staircase on the Titanic.

Outside you can walk the slipways where the Titanic was built. It's pretty cool. I challenge you to learn more about the culture of Ireland.




East Brookfield Elementary School
