#### MINUTES

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER

## 3. STUDENT/STAFF PRESENTATIONS/RECOGNITIONS

# 3.A. All-District Band and All-District/All-State Choir

Dr. Fletcher, noting how rich with musical talent our county is, introduced LCHS Choir Director, Doug Farrell, and LCS Band Director, Scott Smith. They spoke of the district and

state's dedication to providing musical opportunities to students and explained the rigor of competition events. Certificates presented by Dr. Fletcher on behalf of the Board: LCHS Anna Grayson, KMEA All-State Choir, Soprano for Mixed Choir, All-District Choir, 12<sup>th</sup> Grade; FES 8<sup>th</sup> Grader Waylon Burgess, All-District Band; LMS 8<sup>th</sup> Grader Katelin Robinson, All-District Band; LMS 8<sup>th</sup> Grader Gabbriella Music, All-District Band; BES 8<sup>th</sup> Grader Evelyn Martin, All-District Band; BES 8<sup>th</sup> Grader Jazsequa Fountain, All-District Band; LCHS 10<sup>th</sup> Grader Hollie York, All-District Band; LCHS 9<sup>th</sup> Grader, Andrew Evans, All-District Band; LCHS 10<sup>th</sup> Grader Emily McCreary, All-District Choir; LCHS 12<sup>th</sup> Grader Logan Stafford, All-District Choir; LCHS 12<sup>th</sup> Grader, Alexandra Burgess, All-District Choir; LCHS 12<sup>th</sup> Grader, Madison Cassell, All-District Choir; and LCHS 12<sup>th</sup> Grader Kirsten Cook, All-District Choir. Dr. Fletcher thanked Mr. Smith and Mr. Farrell for their leadership and work with our students and thanked parents for their support. In closing, he stated that two of his favorite things this year was seeing the volunteer Marching Band at sporting events and the joint choral presentation of LCHS and Blaine students.

Dr. Fletcher also shared that two LCHS students just returned today from State Academic Competition with Top Ten honors. Carrie Jo Cecil placed 8<sup>th</sup> in Language Arts and Kate Cecil placed 10<sup>th</sup> in Language Arts.

# 3.B. LCHS Implementing BARR: Building Assets Reducing Risks

Freshman Coordinator Myram Brady provided the Board with an overview of the first year implementation of the Building Assets Reducing Risks (BARR) grant the high school received as one of five schools last year. The BARR model, a national program with the goal of empowering all students to thrive within and outside the classroom, is currently being implemented in more than 80 schools across 13 states. The BARR grant's specific target at LCHS is the transition issues experienced by incoming freshmen. During their first year in high school, they struggle with interactions in classes because they don't know other kids in the class making it hard to have much needed in-depth discussions in classes such as social studies and science. All needs of the students are addressed by the Freshmen Team. Mrs. Brady stated, "As any teacher knows, if basic needs aren't met then educational needs can't be met." As part of BARR grant support, the high school has contact with a personal coach every two weeks, a monthly webinar with other BARR schools, professional development and lesson plans, and a yearly visit and audit on implementation. Freshman teachers meet every week to discuss students, and each Monday administrative meetings are held. Dr. Fletcher reiterated how important building good relationships are to the success of students. "Thank you, Lawrence County High School, for taking this on to help our students."

## 4. COMMUNICATION

# 4.A. Superintendent's Update

# 4.A.1. Legislative Update

SB 1seems to have lost its momentum; however, parts of it are expected to show up in other bills. One big concern with SB 1 is the elimination of cost of living adjustments which older retired teachers depend upon tremendously. Another concern is the additional costs being passed along to current employees and local school systems. Other bills to watch are HB 539 Shared Responsibility Plan, HB 200 on Budgets, SB 73 which seeks to phase out Non-Traditional Instruction, which would be our NTI days, and would be detrimental to

Lawrence County Schools. Dr. Fletcher stated that anytime the state has reviewed NTI programs, our district has been held up as a statewide model for other school districts.

The decision has been made to call off school on Wednesday, March 21<sup>st</sup>, to give the opportunity for teachers and staff to attend the EKEA Call to Action Day at Frankfort to voice their support for pension and education funding. The Eastern Kentucky Educational Association encourages both members and non-members to come and support fully funding promised pensions and public education for our students. Note: Later in the meeting, Chairman Preston thanked teachers for their professionalism throughout the conversations on legislative issues further stating on behalf of the Board, "We're behind teachers always."

# 4.A.2. USDA Inspection at Blaine Elementary

Dr. Fletcher provided an update on a complaint at Blaine Elementary on how cooked hamburger patties looked this past week stating that he had eaten a hamburger along with many others and had no ill effects. However, to address the complaint, Food Service Director Cindy Hay asked the USDA to investigate since it was USDA certified beef. The investigation included cooking hamburgers from the same batch and research on how bubbles of fat rise to the top during the cooking process. Everything with the process was found to be within regulation. Dr. Fletcher also noted that beef menu items had been suspended for the rest of the week and will not be served again until we order and compare beef from another company. "Nothing is small when it comes to our students."

# 4.A.3. Local Planning Committee Public Forum

On Thursday, April 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Local Planning Committee will be holding a public forum at 5:00 p.m. at the Lawrence County High School where anyone may ask questions and offer input to facilities planning. Discussions will include potential for renovations, new buildings, LWES, other recommendations by the engineering company, and safety measures for our schools. Dr. Fletcher stated that anyone interested in offering input is encouraged to attend.

# 4.A.4. Operation Preparation

Dr. Fletcher expressed thanks to community and business partners for their continuing support for the upcoming annual Operation Preparation on March 28<sup>th</sup>. Volunteers counsel students on career options and opportunities and the requirements for jobs. He also thanked Sharon Parsons and all of the guidance counselors for their hard work in organizing the annual mentoring event.

# 4.A.5. Potential Appointment to the Executive Board at KEDC

Dr. Fletcher stated that he has been asked to serve on the Executive Board of the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation (KEDC). He thanked the Board for the other regional and state opportunities he has had to offer input on different decisions that impact Lawrence County Schools including currently being the KVEC Chairman and member of the KASS Executive Board. "I think it's very important for Lawrence County to let our voice be heard. I don't like the news to come to us. I like to go find it."

# 4.A.6. Regional Collaboration with Morehead State University

On March 9<sup>th</sup> superintendents across the region including Dr. Fletcher met at Morehead State University to provide input into the university's vision moving forward. One item discussed was the need for trauma-informed care for our students and possible trainings to be provided by the university.

# 4.A.7. School Safety Measures - Appreciation for Local and State Officers

Dr. Fletcher stated he felt that relationships, such as the BARR program mentioned earlier, are the most important frontline measure to school safety. Measures taken by the Board previously include the installation of buzz-in systems in our schools and installing lights in the LCHS parking area. Schools have set up rotations of checking that outside doors are locked throughout the day. Dr. Fletcher thanked law enforcement for their support. The Kentucky State Police (KSP) had informational meetings with students and has provided Active Shooter/Aggressor Trainings to our schools and teachers. Louisa City Police has donated one officer for the rest of the school year for the four schools in city limits with most of their presence being at the high school and middle school. The Lawrence County Sheriff's Office has provided two people, one each at Fallsburg and Blaine Elementary, to start off each school day there and to monitor periodically. "This is the plan for officers in our schools for the rest of this school year." Dr. Fletcher also stated that plans for next school year, including contracting for school resource officers with local law enforcement, is being discussed in meetings with local city and county government officials.

### **6.B.1.** Standard 7: Influential Leadership

Dr. Fletcher stated that the Board has challenged him to stay current on the latest issues and opportunities for our students and district and to become an influential leader in the region and state. He briefly reviewed examples of his influential leadership including being the current chairman of Kentucky Valley Educational Cooperative (KVEC) which represents twenty-two school districts, his membership on the Kentucky Association of School Superintendents (KASS) Board of Directors representing the Ashland regional area, and his upcoming appointment to the Executive Board of the Kentucky Educational Development Cooperative (KEDC) with a membership of sixty-eight districts. "This is not about Dr. Robbie Fletcher. This is about the students of Lawrence County. It is my role not only to try to do our best educate our kids and keep them safe but also to have an influence on the decisions made regionally and statewide for the betterment of the whole Commonwealth."
