MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Preston called the meeting to order with a reminder that the mission of the Board and Lawrence County Schools is *Every Child College and Career Ready; A Community Involved and Informed*. He then led *The Pledge to the United States Flag*.

3. STUDENT/STAFF PRESENTATIONS/RECOGNITIONS

3.A. Victoria Penix: Region 8 Winner Jim Claypool Conservation Art/Poster Contest

Ms. Kelly Hanshaw from the Lawrence County Conservation District spoke to the Board, commending Victoria Penix for a first ever achievement in the long history of the conservation district sponsoring the Jim Claypool Art and Essay Contest in local schools. Last year, Victoria was not only the county Grade 1-5 art winner but also was the Area 8 winner which consists of sixteen counties. This year she has repeated the same accomplishments being the County Winner and Area 8 Winner for the second year in a row and was recognized on March 1st in Lexington. Dr. Fletcher congratulated Victoria and presented her a certificate of recognition on behalf of the Board, also recognizing Louisa East Elementary art teacher, Ms. Sherita Akers, with a certificate for encouraging excellence in her students.

3.B. LWES Students: Thank You Card Presentation

On behalf of their fellow students at the school, Shelby Compton, Isaah Hughes, Zachary Thompson, and Zoe Vinson, students from Louisa West Elementary School, presented thank you cards to the Board for the recently installed playground equipment. Dr. Fletcher and the Board were appreciative of the cards and thanked Ms. Delong for bringing the students.

3.C. Teacher Recognition for MAP Assessment Growth

The top five teachers with the most growth in the Winter MAP testing window were presented certificates by Dr. Fletcher for their impact on the students in our district in the areas of K-1 Reading, K-1 Mathematics, 2-5 Reading, 2-5 Mathematics, 6-11 Reading, and 6-11 Mathematics. "With different groups of students, we all know you can have high scores, but where it makes a difference is the growth... where did we get the child and where did we take them." 4. COMMUNICATION

4.A. Superintendent's Update

4.A.1. Legislative update

Providing the latest legislative update from Kentucky Association of School Administrators (KASA), Dr. Fletcher shared good news. The House budget passed minimizing cuts to education. It now moves on to the Senate. He also provided a summary list of all education-related bills being considered in addition to providing an email with hyperlinks to access specific bills.

4.A.2. Commissioner Pruitt's Town Hall meetings

Commissioner Pruitt is holding Town Halls across the state seeking input on education issues including the state accountability system. The Town Hall in our region is scheduled on the day of our regular April meeting discussion of which will be later in the meeting. Everyone is invited, board members, general public, parents and students.

4.A.3. Academic team/Basketball team success

"The community support and pride at the Sweet Sixteen was phenomenal. We had the largest crowd of any school there, and we had the best students representing us." Dr. Fletcher noted that we will have a special board meeting for recognition of our academic teams and basketball team in April once all competitions are final. State Governor's Cup academic competition continued today and he just received a message within the hour that Katy Jo Cecil, a sophomore at LCHS, placed 6th in the state in

language arts. "I am very proud of our basketball teams and academic teams, as well as our other students who represent us so well on a daily basis."

4.A.4. Article for Commissioner Pruitt's Superintendent Spotlight: Lawrence County

Published in Commissioner Pruitt's weekly communication on March 4th, the Spotlight focused on Lawrence County, things going on here in our district, and Dr. Fletcher as superintendent.

4.A.5. District administration and managers to attend process training on March 24-25

Initial training has been scheduled for the \$40,000 PIPE grant the Board approved recently. District administrators and managers will be look at processes, such as bus routes, communication, and others with the aim of developing plans for improvement.

4.A.6. Track/Football field drainage project underway

So far, the repair is moving along quickly, and we are pleased with the progress on the areas of the field that have been addressed to date. The engineer will be making a final say on overall success.

4.A.7. AEP grant focus work - dual credit opportunities

Each Monday, Ms. Parsons, Ms. Webb and Dr. Fletcher meet with ACTC representative, Mia Brown, to talk about what kind of dual credit courses can be offered and what can done at the middle school level to incorporate STEM activities. Discussion has included adding a computer science track to high school offerings and who can be trained in our buildings to teach dual credit courses.

4.A.8. National NTI webinar presentation by LC staff (added to agenda)

At the invitation of the Kentucky Department of Education, Vernon Hall, Tommy Burns, Mike Muncy, and Dr. Fletcher took part in a national webinar representing Kentucky along with presenters from Corbin and Jessamine County on Non-Traditional Instruction (NTI). States that presented in the webinar were Nebraska, Tennessee, Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky and New York. Dr. Fletcher commended Mr. Hall, Mr. Burns, and Mr. Muncy for their hard work with NTI days and in preparing for the webinar. Lawrence County presented on the preparation process for NTI. "The Board has said in the past that we want to be a national model, and our NTI days are along that line."

4.A.9. Cheerleader Email (added to agenda)

Dr. Fletcher stated that the email message he shared first in a district-wide mailing is "...not a trophy or banner to be hung in a school" but it is a great testament to quality of students in our district. Dr. Fletcher received an unsolicited email on March 17 from a family who during the Sweet Sixteen dined in a Lexington restaurant at the same time as Lawrence County Varsity cheerleaders and sponsors. "I find it hard to believe that any school district in this state could have been better represented than yours by these young ladies, "Tim and Susan Sponcil stated. "We just want to say, "HATS OFF" to you, your teachers and the parents of these young ladies." Dr. Fletcher commended the cheerleaders and all students and staff for having represented Bulldog Nation so well.

4.B. The Smile Savers: Lawrence County Update

The Board was provided information and data on the implementation of the Smile Savers Grant through the LC Health Department by Rhonda Collins, Public Health Registered Dental Hygienist with the LC Health Department, and Jessie Wellman, Public Health Certified Dental Assistant. Smile Savers is a grant-based oral health initiative that the Board had approved for implementation in LC schools two years ago. Among their services are student assessments, cleanings, sealants, fluoride, nutrition counseling, tobacco counseling, sports counseling for mouth guards, and oral health education. Using mobile equipment with same high level sterilization as in a dentist office, they set up

wherever they can in a school and work closely with the FRYSCs. "It is a less threatening atmosphere especially for those students who have never seen a dentist." They also have a system for follow-up with parents and students and encourage parents and school staff to visit them in the schools.

As of 2015, they saw 630 students and placed 1,749 sealants which prevent cavities and oral decay, serving about 30% of the total student body so far in elementary and middle schools. They conducted a pre-assessment at the high school last year and plan to offer services there in the near future. There is a great need at the high school age because of the use of energy drinks and tobacco use. They have also applied for an adult education grant to increase awareness of dental health issues. "It was very much a pleasure to work with Lawrence County students," concluded Ms. Collins.

LAWRENCE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION LOUISA, KENTUCKY

AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT EMPLOYING SUPERINTENDENT

This Amendment to the Contract Employing Superintendent is entered into by and between THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF LAWRENCE COUNTY, KENTUCKY (hereinafter referred to as the "BOARD"), and ROBBIE FLETCHER (hereinafter referred to as the "SUPERINTENDENT"), and duly authorized by action at a lawful meeting of the Board of Education held on the 21st day of March, 2016.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Board and the Superintendent entered into an employment contract bearing the effective date of July 1st, 2014 which provides at numerical paragraph VII that the Superintendent agreed to relocate his family and establish full time residence in Lawrence County, Kentucky on or before June 30th, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Board and the Superintendent have mutually agreed to remove numerical VII from the Contract Employing Superintendent so as to eliminate the obligation of the Superintendent to relocate his family and establish full time residence in Lawrence County, Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, the Board and the Superintendent desire to reduce their agreement to writing and to amend the Contract Employing Superintendent, do hereby agree as follows:

First: Numerical paragraph VII titled "Relocation" is hereby eliminated, removed and expunged from the Contract Employing Superintendent bearing the effective date of July 1st, 2014 and hereafter shall have no force and effect whatsoever.

Second: Numerical paragraph VIII titled "Relocation Allowance" is hereby amended so as to hereafter provide as follows:

In the event the Superintendent determines to relocate his family to Lawrence County, Kentucky, the Board shall reimburse the Superintendent the actual amount of reasonable and necessary expenses required to relocate himself and his family based upon receipts furnished to the Board up to a maximum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00).

Third: All of the other terms, provisions and conditions contained in the Contract Employing Superintendent bearing the effective date of July 1st, 2014 shall remain in full force and effect.
