Alumnus Ben Novak Clones Endangered Ferret The Comet News Staff

Ben Novak, a member of the Alexander Class of 2005, has made worldwide headlines as the first scientist to successfully clone an endangered animal.

At the Fish and Wildlife Services
Black-Footed Conservation Center in Colorado, lead De-extinction Biologist, Ben Novak and his team of biotechnical scientists from Revive and Restore became the first to clone an endangered North American species, the Black-Footed ferret.

The cloned ferret, named "Elizabeth Ann," was born on December 10, 2020, via C-section, and was the result of seven years of intensive research in genomes and cloning.

Sample cells taken from two Black-Footed ferrets, Willa and Studbook Number 2, were used to generate Elizabeth Ann. The scientists performed an embryo transplant into a domesticated ferret surrogate. The cells implanted were originally frozen back in 1988.

In 2008, a study was done on the population of Black-Footed ferrets which showcased their lack of genetic diversity.



Five years later, the cloning project began. It wasn't until November 14, 2020, that Ann's heartbeats were first detected. DNA samples proved that she was indeed a Black-Footed ferret, on her 65th day of living. The team is planning to clone more ferrets to increase the Black-Footed ferret population.

The Fish and Wildlife Service contacted Revive and Restore, to see if their work in biotechnology could improve the diversity of these ferrets. According to his Twitter account, Ben Novak was featured on Jimmy Kimmel Live, and the now famous scientist thanked the late-night talk show host for his interest in their work.

Ben Novak spoke in his hometown, Alexander, in 2019 and discussed his team's work with cloning and the Carrier pigeon.

The biologists at Revive and Restore have also cloned a Przewalski horse. Kurt, the horse, was born at a veterinary clinic located in Texas on August 6, 2020. They made him using the sperm from a deceased stallion and used a domesticated mare as a surrogate.



A rich Moor goldsmith bought Joyce and began to train him in his craft. Joyce became a master craftsman. After learning this craft, Joyce forged the first ever Claddagh Ring in thoughts of his love. The heart embodied love, the clasped hands expressed friendship, and crown represented loyalty and fidelity.

A little later, in 1689, King William agreed to free all of his people in slavery. Joyce was once again a free man. Before going home to Galway, his former master tried to convince Joyce to stay. He suggested that Joyce take half of his wealth and marry his daughter, but Joyce declined.

Once in Galway, Joyce discovered that his love awaited his return. Joyce gifted his love the Claddagh Ring and they were finally and officially married.

The Claddagh Ring design, an example of a Fede ring, kept pride within the family, and was passed down through generations. The outline of the ring enhanced popularity world-wide

Recipe: Stuffed Jalapeños Santos Riggs

Ingredients:

- Salt and pepper
- 1 brick cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup of mozza-
- 1 package of sweet Italian sausage (mild)
- 1 tablespoon of sour cream
- Big Jalapenos

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees
- 2. Cut jalapenos in half lengthwise with stem attached, and scrape out the
- 3. Remove the sausage from the chasing and put on a frying pan on mediumhigh heat. Break it apart like loose hamburger with a spatula. Once cooked through, drain excess fat and set aside to cool.
- 4. Mix the softened cream cheese with a tablespoon of sour cream. Add 1/2 cup of mozzarella and the sausage to the cream cheese mixture. Slowly fold in; **DO NOT OVER MIX**
- 5. Add salt and pepper, a little at a time (the sausage is already salty.)
- 6. Pack the jalapeño halves with the cream cheese mixture and bake on a foil-lined cookie sheet. Check every 5 minutes until you've reached your desired doneness.

Artist of the Month Zoe Beall

Piet Mondrian was born March 7, 1872 in Amersfoort, Netherlands. Mondrian was a well-known creator, and leader in the modern abstract art movement. He was also an important member of the Dutch abstract art movement, De Stijl ("The Style.") In his later art-works, Mondrian utilized simple mixes of straight lines, right angles, primary colors, and other colors

like black, white, and gray. Around the age of 14, Mondrian was headstrong about becoming a painter. However, his family wanted him to receive a degree in education, so he taught art in secondary schools in 1892. Aside from teaching, Mondrian took lessons from a fellow painter. In 1893, Mondrian's art was showcased for the first time.

Later on, for Mondrian's

50th birthday, some of his friends put together an organization of his projects at the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam. Mondrian passed away on February 1, 1944 at the age of 71.*


