"They, as writers, are far above where most of their peers are in their freshman year of college," Wise said. "It also gets them prepared for the way that college classes work compared to high school classes. This is a good



Pursue 16 free credits, certificate

incoln and Riverside high school seniors this fall can capitalize on a Butler County Community College and Community College of Beaver County program whose instructors and mentors will guide the transformation of students' ideas into feasible business plans, and culminate in 16 tuition-free transferrable credits – and a resume-building workplace certificate.

The Riv-Ell Entrepreneurship Program, suspended for a year with regard to COVID-19, returns this fall and be held at Joey's Event Rooms, 408 Lawrence Ave., Ellwood City.

Students who successfully complete all 16 credits will earn a BC3 Workplace Certificate in Entrepreneurship – a relevant credential while still in high school – and be prepared to launch or enhance a successful business venture or continue on an academic path to earn an associate in applied science degree in business.

Remote Options in Fall 2021

Butler County Community College will offer five courses through remote instruction as part of its Fall 2021 semester menu of College Within the High School courses.

Remote instruction includes video conferencing, email and Internet-based learning management system formats

definitely know a lot of people who are taking advantage of this opportunity, which is good," said Wasylson, whose older sisters Erin and Lauren also earned college credits at Mars High through BC3's program.

Added Bowes: "Everyone that is in the BC3 courses really enjoys them. I think everyone has my perspective in that it is a great way to challenge yourself and explore different areas."

The savings of courses through BC3's program are also popular among high school students, said Wasylson and Bowes, both seniors.

Tuition and fees this spring for a three-credit course at five regional Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education universities range from \$1,246.23 to \$1,385.60 for in-state residents. Tuition and fees this spring for a three-credit course for part-time students at regional state-related institutions' branch campuses range from \$1,495 to \$1,819 for in-state residents.

BC3 courses cost \$384 to \$414

uition and fees this spring for a three-credit BC3 College Within the High School program course range from \$384 to \$414, depending on the county in which the high school is located. BC3 high school programming credits can be applied toward BC3 associate degrees and bachelor's degrees at public, private and online four-year colleges and universities.

High school students from Butler County can save at least \$880.23 – and high school students from Clarion, Clearfield, Jefferson, Lawrence and Mercer counties, at least \$850.23 – on a three-credit course offered by BC3's program.

McKenna Bowes, Mars Area High are juniors and are scheduling (for fall) right now to definitely get ahead for the future," Wasylson said. "It's going to help you not only with cost later, but it is going to help you get ahead with those early, early classes in college where they make you take courses that are required of everybody. You can get those credits out of the way early (through BC3's program) without spending thousands of dollars. You can take them at high school for a fraction of the cost."

"Saving me a lot of money later on"

owes said BC3's courses "will be saving me a lot of money later on. And the courses allow you to explore different areas."

Among the areas Bowes explored was BC3's speech course – her favorite so far, she said, and one in which she enhanced her public speaking skills.

"I feel like, especially with technology, a lot of people don't communicate like they once did," Bowes said. "Now it's all over text and emails. I wanted to introduce myself to learning how to talk face-to-face and to a large group of people."

Bowes said has also learned through BC3's College Within the High School courses how to "prepare for more difficult tests. It's improved my studying techniques. I've also learned the importance of time management, being able to manage the workload between different

That workload may be reduced once Bowes and Wasylson enroll in college.

"I'm pretty much stepping into my first year of college with a semester of credits under my belt," Wasylson said, "which is definitely a big factor."
