## District News

I wanted to give an update of our current COVID protocols at school. Our kids and staff have done a tremendous job in keeping things as safe as we can in our buildings. Please note that we get new information all the time so things can change quickly.

We continue to monitor the number of positive cases, positivity rates, and numbers of quarantines within our county and within our school buildings. As part of an ESU 6 Superintendents' Zoom meeting we hear from Public Health Solutions each week to discuss what they are seeing within the county and health district and to ask questions. As area superintendents, we also discuss what all of us are seeing in our districts and what we are doing to prevent quarantines.

I have also recently reached out to Fillmore County Hospital about current protocols and what we should be doing now based on current numbers and COVID spread. On Tuesday, March 30<sup>th</sup>, we (state superintendents) heard from Governor Ricketts and Dr. Gary Anthone (Chief Medical Officer/Director, Division of Public Health for Nebraska) that although positive cases and hospital numbers are improving in Nebraska, schools should continue their protocols. At this time, we are planning to continue doing what we have been doing based upon recommendations from these various groups.



One thing to keep in mind is that the health district quarantine rules from the beginning of the year still apply. If you remember, if someone that is unmasked tests positive, those within 6 feet, even if masked, will need to quarantine. There recently were new guidelines from the CDC that allows for children in masks to be seated within three feet of each other, but that is in masks and the 6 feet quarantine rule still applies for non-mask wearers. We are hoping to avoid quarantines for our students and teachers. Most of our staff should be finished with their vaccines by April 3rd. It is my understanding that people will not have to quarantine due to a high-risk exposure that occurs more than 14 days after their final vaccination shot. This would allow our staff that has received their vaccines by April 3<sup>rd</sup> the ability to not have to quarantine if exposed after April 17<sup>th</sup>.

I appreciate everyone's efforts to keep our students learning in school, to protect our staff members and students, and to allow our students to participate in athletics and activity competitions. There were obviously things that were missed last spring and I'm excited that we have so far been able to not have to miss many things or have students miss many events. Our goal continues to be to do school safely and to continue keeping as many students in school and activities as possible. With things like Prom and Graduation coming quickly we will continue to assess our protocols weekly. I know we will all be glad when this is over.

#### CLASS ROSTERS FOR 2021-2022

The principal and the classroom teachers develop the class rosters for the following year. Parent requests for particular teachers are not accepted, but information pertaining to your child will be considered. This information must be given to Aaron Veleba, Elementary Principal, in writing, on or before Thursday, April 15th.

Creating class lists requires time and consideration. For example, Student A is a leader; Student B is reading above grade level; Student C thrives in a nurturing environment; Student D has a learning disability; Student E is an excellent math student. Development in all areas: academic, physical, social, and emotional is considered when we build class rosters.

### KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION for 2021-2022

Kindergarten registration for the 2021-2022 school year began in February. A packet of information was sent to parents of children considered age eligible for kindergarten (5 by July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021). If you have not registered your kindergarten aged child for the 2021-2022 school year, or if you did not receive a packet of information, please call the school, 759-3184.

Per Nebraska Department of Education guidelines, students who are kindergarten age eligible (5 by July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021) are not permitted to enroll in the TYKE program.


# MAKE ONLINE SAFETY A PRIORITY IN YOUR HOME

Technology has changed how students learn and how they socialize. Millions of kids in all age groups are online every day – at home, at school, as friends' homes, at the library – and many are creating online content.

To keep your child safe online:

- **Discuss rules and expectations**. Use software that helps to protect kids, but supervise carefully too. Only allow your child to communicate with people you both know when he's online.
- **Set limits on screen time.** Set a limit such as 10 hours or fewer per week. Remember that screen time includes TV, computer, and video game use.
- **Do not allow your child to reveal personal information.** Help your child understand that their name, phone number, school, passwords and current location should not be revealed online.
- **Keep Internet access out of your child's room.** Only let your child go online if you can see what he's doing.
- **Learn about websites.** Know what your child visits online. Are they safe? Do you approve of their content?
- Encourage your child to be honest. If something inappropriate occurs online, react calmly, and report your concern to the authorities.
- **Stay informed.** Visit such sites as <u>www.fosi.org</u> (Family Online Safety Institute) and Netsmartz.org for more tips.

### Middle School News

#### 8th Grade Graduation

The 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Graduation and Honors Ceremony is an opportunity to honor our 8<sup>th</sup> grade students for their academic work during their years at the middle school. The 2021 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Graduation and Honors Ceremony will be held on Wednesday, May 19 beginning at 2 p.m. and should last about one hour. The normal bus and supervision routines for a 3:20 dismissal will take place. This will be the first year that the ceremony will be live streamed on the district's STRIV channel.

### Last Day Of School

The final day of school will be Thursday, May 20<sup>th</sup>. School will dismiss at 11:10 a.m. that day with no lunch being served. The 8<sup>th</sup> grade students will be placing their handprint on the wall as part of the middle school tradition. Students will need to have all materials and books checked in and all fines paid before being allowed to checkout. Students generally know if they have any book fines prior to the last day of school. Please visit with your student about paying all fines and returning all materials.

### 4th Grade Step-Up Days

Step-up days for 4<sup>th</sup> grade students will be in May. These days present an opportunity for next year's 5<sup>th</sup> grade students to visit the middle school, meet teachers, and tour the building. Students will have the opportunity to visit classrooms and ask questions to our current 5<sup>th</sup> grade students.

If you have a student who is transitioning to the middle school next year, it might be useful for you to visit with your student prior to their step-up day. It could be very beneficial for you and your student to identify a list of "Things I Want To Know." This will help your student as they tour the facilities and listen to various staff members talk about the transition. It will also help your student know what to ask when given the opportunity to ask questions.



### Early Development Network Services Coordination

### What is Early Development Network Services Coordination?

Services Coordination helps families of children with special needs below age three:

- Find services to meet developmental, educational, financial, health care, child care, respite care and other needs
- Work with multiple providers to make sure services are provided as needed

### Why is Service Coordination Needed?

Nebraska families of children with special needs have found it difficult to locate needed services for infants and toddlers with disabilities and then to coordinate the services with the providers.

### Who is Eligible for Services Coordination?

Eligible families are those with an infant or toddler below age 3 who has a disability or developmental delay and qualifies for special education through the public schools.

Year round services coordination is provided.

There is no cost to families.

### How Can Families Apply?

To request Early Development services for your child or to refer a child, call the local number below. With prior parental permission, referrals may be made by anyone who suspects a developmental delay in an infant or toddler.
